FLORIDA GROVES

Miami, Fla., Dec. 11.—Subfreezing weather and extensive damage to trucks and fruit groves in the Everglades area of southern Florida Tuesday night were reported to the Miami weather bureau Wednesday.

Miami escaped freezing temperature but the mercury was reported as low as 30 degrees at places a few miles from the city.

Reports reaching here told of farmers and fruit growers working all night with smudge pots and water pumps to protect their crops.

The larger farms and groves, which are well equipped for combating frost and cold, were said to have escaped with minor damage, but growers on a smaller scale were described as suffering great losses, especially in bean and eggplant crops.
