52. According to the 568 students 63% of their older brothers and sisters finished the 8th grade, 65% the 9th grade, 48% the tenth grade, 30% the 11th grade, 13% one year of college, 7% two years of college, 3% three years of college and 3% finished or graduated from college.

This report was sent to the county superintendent of schools and the accompanying letter shows Colmesnel rated high in the report. Paragraphs 16, 17, 20 and 51 give information that applies directly, also, to the Colmesnel school.
