WARREN FARMERS VACCINATE HOGS

Ten farmers of Warren district saw the economy of vaccinating pigs for cholera instead of large hogs, Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 9-10, when five herds, totaling 88 hogs were vaccinated by B. B. Martin and A. D. Carson, teacher of vocational agriculture.

There is no cure for the disease. The only thing that can be done is to vaccinate to prevent it. The double treatment was used. It consisted of an injection of hog cholera serum and a smaller injection of virus. Serum is prepared from the blood of immune hogs and is harmless. Serum alone will immunize hogs for only 60 days.

Warren high school is securing vaccination, milk fever, and other veterinary instruments for use in the community.

A canning campaign in Bastrop county directed by Mrs. Gurtha Vest, home demonstration agent, is helping hundreds of people who never earned before to secure a supply of home raised food and is resulting in the filling of thousands of cans.

A community garden of seven acres in addition to individual gardens in South Houston Community in Harris county has been furnishing vegetables for a community canteen plant where hundreds of containers have been put up this season by home demonstration methods.

The seed house at the gym in Ricardo Community in Kibberg county has been converted to Mr. and Mrs. Ben Weir into a canning kitchen where families of the community who have no canning equipment can come to can.

COLMESNEIL FARMERS IN A SERIES OF MEETINGS

A meeting is being held at the Egypt school which is a part of the Colmesneil Independent school district Thursday evening of this week for the purpose of discussing the current farm problems that are confronting the farmers of this district at the present time.

According to the consensus of opinion thus far such problems as rationing, culling hens for egg production, feeding hens for egg production, vaccinating calves for blackleg, vaccinating hogs for hog cholera, treatment of milk fever, canning, controlling insects and diseases of the fields, garden, and orchard, and other problem worthy of consideration will demand attention of the meeting.

WARREN WOMEN IN NIGHT SCHOOLS

The women and girls of the Warren school district are very enthusiastic over the evening schools. These schools are being conducted in three different communities of the Warren district - Nell, New Hope and the Pipe Line.
