## For Governor Vote for R. S. Sterling—For Representative J. E. Sturrock

### STERLING ANSWERS JIM ON OUSTING MOORE LYNN

Dallas, Aug. 23.—Gov. Ross Sterling, in a statement Saturday issued by his campaign headquarters here, answered the announcement of Jim Ferguson that if his wife was elected governor she would remove State Auditor Moore Lynn from office. The governor said Ferguson made this announcement at San Angelo when speaking in behalf of his wife, Mrs. Ferguson, Sterling's opponent in the Aug. 27 runoff.

"Lynn, you know," the governor's statement to the headquarters said, "has uncovered graft and thievery in high and low places in the state government. That alone was enough to make him a marked man to Ferguson, who does not like watchful men in public places."

The statement quoted Ferguson as saying if his wife was elected one of the first acts would be to "boot State Auditor Moore Lynn out of office."

### SCHOOL NEWS

Supt. S. B. Owens has just received a letter from the State Department of Education, which gave the following facts in regard to school finances for another year.

- The state per capita has been reduced from \$17.50 to \$16.00.
- The state will supplement the state aid schools to help maintain 6 months instead of 6 1/2 months.
- The schools will not receive any more transportation aid than they got this year, which will be less than \$200 per truck.
- Consolidated bonuses will be part on a percentage basis.
- High schools will not receive more than 50% of the high school tuition.
- All salaries for teachers in all state aid schools will be reduced. The

### ONLY CHANCE FOR TAX REDUCTION

The only chance for any substantial relief from the tax burden in these East Texas Counties is Governor Sterling's plan that he will submit to a special session of the legislature that will convene next month in what is known as a law to relieve the counties of the payment of bonds issued to build highways. Practically every legislator has declared in favor of the Sterling plan and the county commissioners courts are delaying the setting of the tax rate for next year in anticipation of the relief this legislation will give. In Harrison County will mean a reduction of more than one-third of our county taxes. This plan can be brought about by diverting a portion of the gasoline tax for this purpose and at the same time leaving a sufficient amount to carry on the state's highway program.

### A FERGUSON CHALLENGE

"I challenge them to prove that Federal aid was ever denied under the Ferguson administration or that any will be withdrawn because a Ferguson is Governor," said James E. Ferguson in his speech at Colman, Aug. 12. The News desires to show in this editorial that "Federal Aid was denied under the Ferguson Administration," and in a subsequent editorial, that it will be withdrawn because a Ferguson is Governor," if Mrs. Ferguson carries out her own platform.

The date of the Washington announcement of the suspension of Federal aid was Jan. 4, 1927, the order having already gone from Thomas H. McDonald, then chief of the Federal Bureau of Roads, to District Engineer A. R. Losh at Fort Worth. Report of the suspension was then available from James E. Ferguson's office. A "Muskville" notice of the suspension had already gone to Eugene T.

Smith, chairman of Mrs. Ferguson's Highway Commission, under date of Jan. 3, 1927, and signed by Mr. Losh, who stated that the withdrawal "has become necessary due to the financial situation and our withdrawal of these projects will be effective until it has been satisfactorily shown that contractors on Federal aid projects are receiving all payments due them promptly and further that funds are available free from other obligations, to do the necessary reconditioning of completed Federal Aid projects and the maintenance of projects already completed."—Dallas News.

### PRIMARY ELECTION SUPERVISORS

The Election Law (Article 2942) authorizes "any one-fifth of the candidates whose names appear on the official ballot," on or before the day preceding the election, to agree in writing signed by them upon two supervisors of election. The two persons so selected are required to take the oath as elective officers, whether the presiding judge of the election before the opening of the polls. They must be qualified voters

of the county and election precinct in which they serve and subject to none of the following disqualifications:

1. Must not be a holder of an office or profit or trust under the United States or this State, or in any city or town in Texas (except a notary public), nor have held such an office within the last thirty days.
2. Must not be a candidate for office.
3. Must have paid poll tax.

While the election is being held they are required to remain in view of the ballot boxes until the count is concluded. When any voter permanently disabled from marking his ballot is assisted by the presiding judge of election, they are required to be present to see that the ballot is marked in accordance with the wishes of the voter, but such supervisors must remain silent except in cases of irregularity or violation of the law while so in attendance. It is also made their duty to see that each ballot is correctly called, and if there are not any fraud or irregularity whatever in the conduct of the election, they are required to report it to the next grand jury."

### FAULK DENIES FERGUSON CHARGE AGAINST MOODY

The campaign statement of James E. Ferguson that Dan Moody inherited \$5,000,000 in the treasury when he became governor succeeding Mrs. Ferguson in 1926 was denied Monday by Hubert T. Faulk, now County Attorney of Wood County and a member of the Fortieth Legislature, the first during Governor Moody's administration. Mr. Faulk visited State headquarters of Gov. Ross S. Sterling Monday.

"The first thing the Legislature had to do when it met," Mr. Faulk said, "was to pass an \$11,000,000 deficiency bill. Of this, \$6,500,000 was for the Highway Department, \$2,500,000 for the penitentiary system and \$2,000,000 for general revenue. This was Gov. Moody's inheritance from Mrs. Ferguson's administration, not a \$5,000,000 treasury balance. This is all a matter of record."

Plans are now being made for Highway No. 45, and a bridge at Town Bluff and for hard surfacing the entire system of 90 miles.

2. A tax of \$1.00 on the hundred was levied in Tyler County for road bonds for last year. Sterling agrees to retire these bonds out of the gasoline tax and a Special Session of the Legislature has been called for that purpose. This will save the taxpayers of Tyler County one million dollars in paying bonds and the interest thereon. It was with this understanding that we voted the last issue.

3. Under Ferguson's Administration but little maintenance work was done in Tyler County. Under Sterling's Administration the State Highways are maintained in good condition by the State and Federal Governments, releasing all County Money for lateral roads. Although the Ferguson Administration spent more money in Texas for maintenance than any other subsequent administration the Federal Government withdrew Federal Aid, because the work was not being properly done.

4. In carrying out this work, employment is given now as follows—

**EGYPT COMMUNITY ORGANIZES FARMERS INSTRUCTIONAL NIGHT SCHOOL**

The farmers of the Egypt community met at the school house in that community on last Thursday evening at 8 and organized an instructional school on local farm problems with the aid and assistance of the Vocational Agricultural department of the Colmesneil high school. Egypt is one of the most recent consolidated schools to be admitted into the Colmesneil independent school district. This new department of agriculture is only one of the many advantages which this school will enjoy by becoming a part of a larger school system. It will be the duty of the agriculture department to offer courses of this nature to each of the rural schools that have come in to this school. The following problems were listed by the farmers present as desirable problems for discussion at subsequent meetings:

1. The production of cream for market. Controlling of orchard insects and diseases. Controlling chicken mites, lice, fleas, and worms. Controlling squash bugs. Controlling parasites and pests of hogs. Controlling goat lice. Root rot and wilt cotton, tomato wilt. Growing permanent pastures for East Texas. A prolific crop rotation. Growing cover crops and soil improvement crops. Controlling weeds in corn, peas, and other crops. Storing sweet potatoes. Controlling cane borers. Feeding baby chicks. Culling hens for winter egg production. Terracing and draining farm lands and pastures. Budding and grafting trees. Controlling turnip and other plant lice. Controlling tomato worms and corn drill worms. Problems other than these will be taken up by this group as time and necessity demands. The enrolled members included S. B. McBryde, W. A. Allen, J. E.
