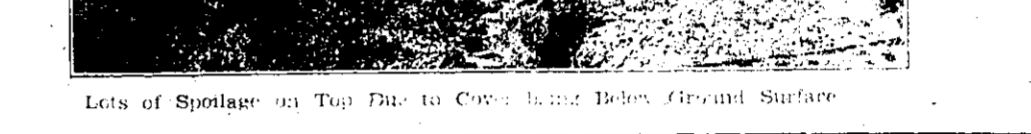

A Method of Conserving Feed That is Going to Become Universal With the Better Class of Texas Feeders



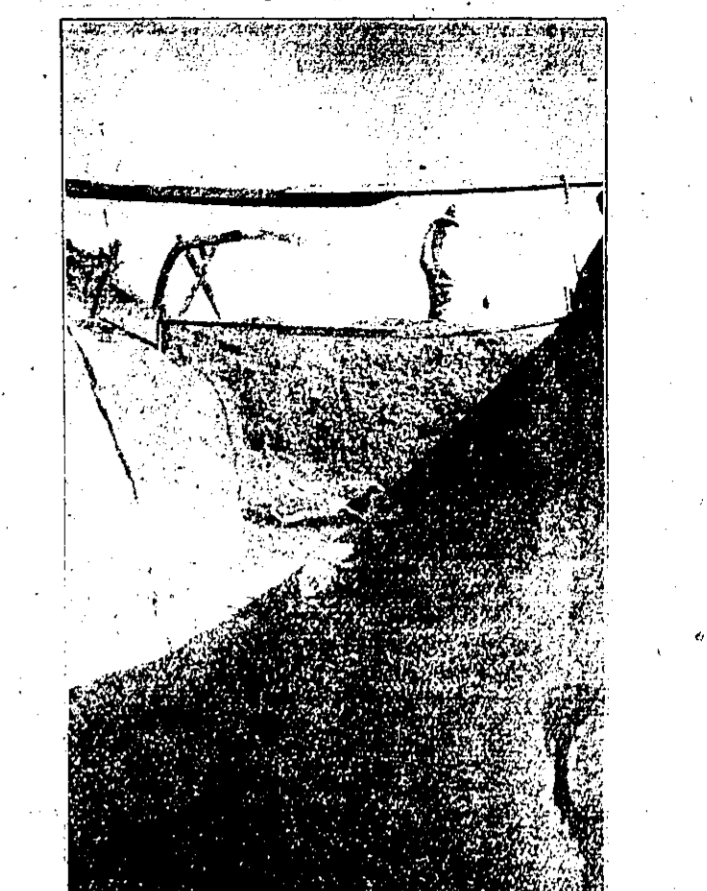

All farmers who have tomatoes and other fall truck crops that are ready for market are requested to attend a meeting at the Court house, Saturday, September 10th at 1:30 p. m. This meeting is of importance, so be sure to come.

It appears from examination of the farms hereabouts there are many fields that have crops that can be marketed provided a market can be procured. This is what this meeting is called for. If there is enough truck stuff to procure a buyer—that is enough to make it pay, some one can be induced to appear on the Woodville market. In this connection, however, County Agent B. B. Martin reports to The Booster that in the event enough stuff can not be secured for a buyer, he has made arrangements with a buyer in Livingston to come here and buy and ship by truck to Livingston where the stuff will be loaded for foreign markets.

The call for this meeting was issued by L. M. Wilson, president of the growers' association, and also by B. B. Martin, County Agent.
