Washington, Oct. 14.—The Twentleth Amendment to the Constitution, abolishing the so-called "lame-durk session" of Congress, will become effective Sunday with two unique records in American history.

Besides changing the dates for the inauguration of the President and the beginning of congressional sessions. the amendment established a record for being the only change in the Constitution that had the unanimous approval of the 48 states. The speed the ratification set another mark.
