He reviewed the "New Deal" program from the beginning, stressing money policies, and especially the Dies Silver Law. Under the provisions of this act the government will have three and half billion dollars additional funds to carry on the recovery program.

He stated that "one of the principle causes for the depression was labor saving machines, and that he intended to introduce a bill to bar the granting of such patents. He explained the difference between inventions for constructive purposes and those that caused people to suffer."

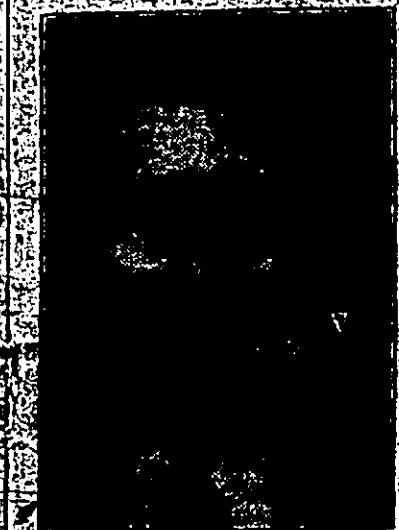
Your state representative cost the tax payers \$1,000 a year, and he is only required to serve about one-fourth of his time.

EAST TEXAS PLANS SIX ONE-DAY CONVENTIONS

One-day conventions of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce in early September have been called by President Chas. P. Ashcroft of this city to consider the Federal Housing Program and pending amendments to the Texas Constitution.

The schedule of these conferences is as follows:
District 5, at Woodville, Wednesday, September 5th.
District 6, at Navasota, Thursday, September 6th.
District 3, at Palestine, Friday, September 7th.
District 4, at Hillsboro, Wednesday, September 12th.
District 1, at McKinney, September 13th.
District 2, at Pittsburg, Friday, September 14th.

The Federal Housing Program a good community undertaking? How can the best use be made of it? What are the terms of the loans?
Will local banks cooperate? These and other questions will be considered at the morning sessions which are all called for eleven o'clock.

Members and friends of the regional chamber will have an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the merits of the several amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted on this fall. These include: the abolition of the fee system for compensating district and county officials; limiting the collection of State revenue and State expenditures in any biennium to \$22.50 per capita; reorganization of county government; and the merging of counties.

FAIR TO EXHIBIT BEST DROUGHT CROPS

Dallas, Texas. Results of many years' experimental work in drought resisting crops will be one of the principal features of the farm show at the 48th annual exposition, State Fair of Texas, it has been announced here by J. A. Moore, superintendent of agriculture, who has been working with officials of Texas A. & M. College and other agricultural agencies of the state in gathering such exhibits.
Special preparation of the soil, special drought resisting seeds, and special means of cultivation are necessary for these crops, and all of these methods and results thereon will be shown in the State Fair Agricultural show. One feature of this method of farming will be an exhibit of corn where under the terrible drought con-

ditions the farmer raises a thirty-five bushel corn crop while his neighbors corn across the road was a total failure. Agricultural agencies of Texas have been experimenting with such crops for several years; but the 1934 season has provided the first real experiment for them; and the results will be exhibited for them for the first time at the fair, opening Saturday, October 6, and extending through Sunday, October 21.
