Wilburn Best, vocational agriculture student of Woodville high school, won second place in the livestock judging contest sponsored by the Houston Fat Stock show recently, according to R. A. Shaw, instructor. Young Best contested against 203 other high school boys from the different sections of Texas.

His total score was 1014 points compared to the first place winner with 1018. For this achievement the show awarded Best a \$7 prize. In addition to the sweepstake placement Young Best placed second in the swine division with a score of 282 points compared to first place winners score of 283 points. His award in this division was \$3. This makes a total of \$11 in awards that the student received for his work.

40,000 65 YEARS OLD

Austin. There are more than 40,000 persons 65 years old or older on the relief rolls of the state, results of a survey conducted by relief authorities for the state of Texas, 1934, showed 41,787 persons in that age classification, receiving public aid.

President Roosevelt returned to Washington today to face a critical test of his administration policies as he announced his firm support for a wage clause in a dredging contract. The clause, which would allow the government to raise wages at will, has been a major point of contention between the administration and the public. Roosevelt's decision to support the clause is seen as a significant move towards a more flexible wage policy, which could have far-reaching implications for the economy and labor relations.
