Doctor Franklin Martin, director-general of the American Cancer Society, says that one-third of the total number of cancer cases is preventable. Although prevention of cancer furnishes one of the most hopeful fields for the stimulation of suffering and the reduction of mortality from this devastating disease, the general public has failed to realize its importance.

The prevention of cancer depends largely upon the avoidance of conditions of chronic irritation or inflammation which evidently favor the development of this disease.

The majority of cancers occurring in the reproductive organs of women are preventable by chronic inflammation due to injuries received at childbirth or to some form of infection.

A complete examination of these organs should be made (twice a year) by a specialist in the field. The most predisposing cause of cancer is the chronic inflammation of the cervix. Some of the more insidious causes of cancer today are being treated by physicians today are being treated by means of which they can save the lives of thousands of women who otherwise would be lost.

The best control is now normal, but that would be wise for the patient to repeat the examination at least every six months. (2) That a complete examination makes it possible to institute treatment at an early stage, when the prognosis is most favorable. In suspicious cases of cancer, it is best to have a complete microscopic examination of the affected area.

How Booze Helps Rattle Snake Bite

Austin, May 2.—A warning about the danger of snake bite has just been issued by Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. A number of cases of snake bite are reported each year in Texas during the summer and early fall, however, few of these result fatally.

Most of the bites occur on the hands or feet, which indicates that stepping or falling in the immediate vicinity of an unseen snake or picking up objects under similar conditions are the hazards of contracting snake bite. The pain following the injection of the poison is most intense. Other symptoms are swelling, numbness, difficult breathing, hemorrhage, weak pulse and vomiting.

One is unfortunate enough to be bitten by a poisonous snake such as the rattlesnake, the following first aid measure should be carried out.

After making proper incisions at the site of the wound, apply suction and continue for at least half an hour.

Apply a tourniquet above the site of the wound, releasing same every 10 or 15 minutes for about a minute at a time.

If the proper antivenom serum is available, apply it according to directions, but most important of all, remove as much of the poison as possible so as to prevent its absorption.

Secure the services of a physician at the earliest possible moment.

Do not drink or eat anything and do not take any alcoholic stimulants or anything that increases the circulation of the blood.

Do not depend upon home remedies or any snake bite cure, for they are of no value.

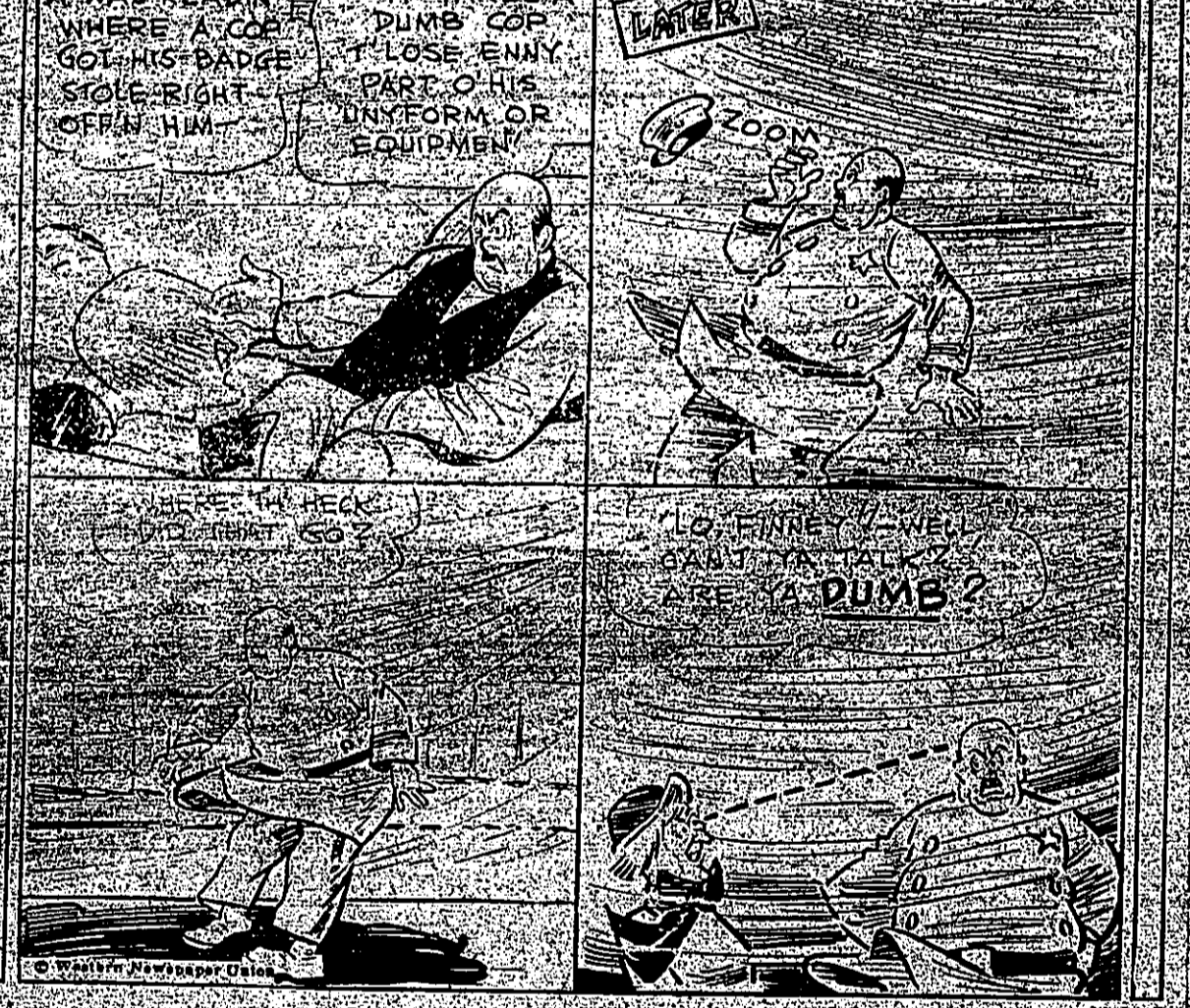

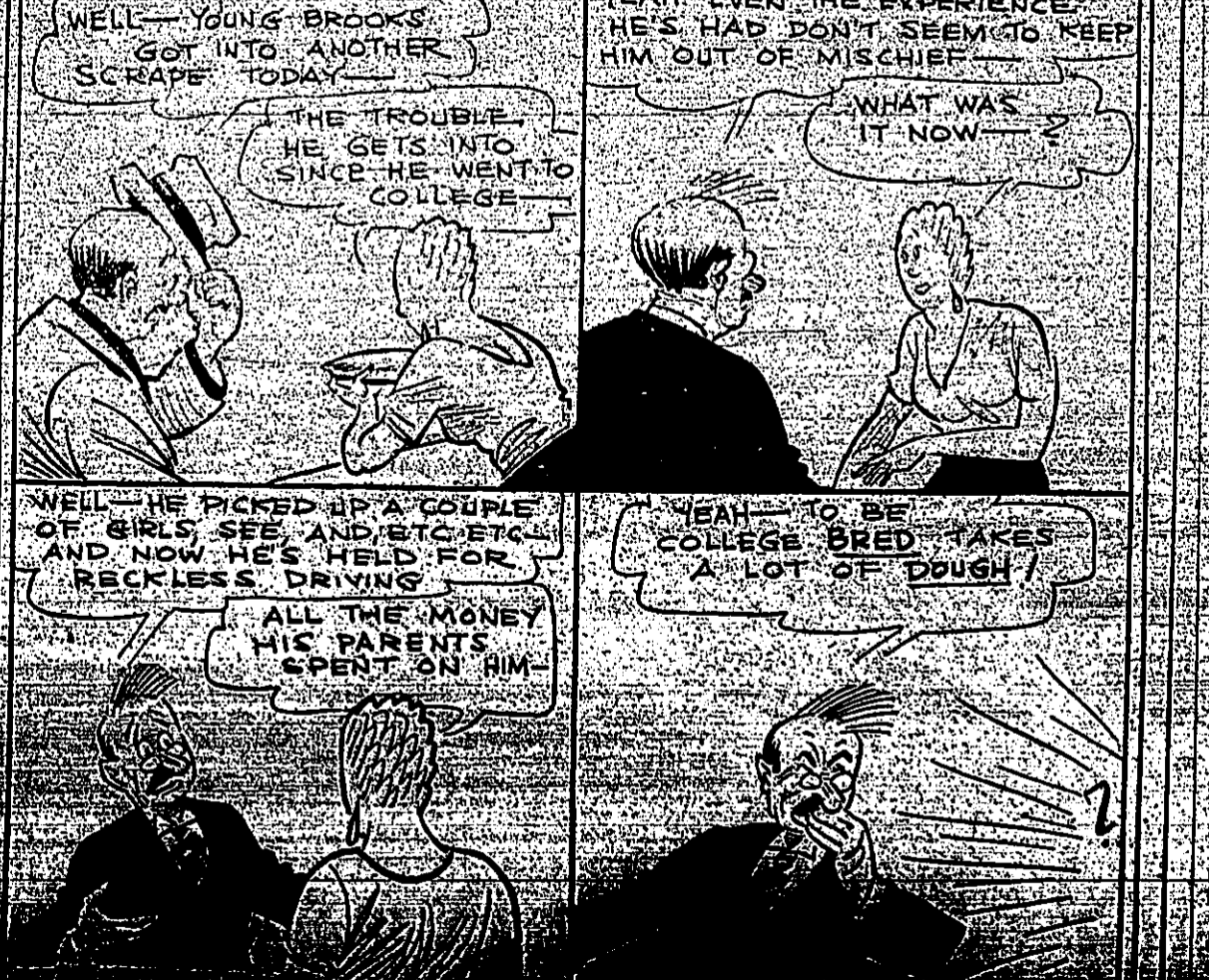
