## The Story of Cancer Control

This is one of ten such stories which are being published by request of the Hardin-Tyler County Medical Association.

What Cancer is Not—Common misunderstandings concerning cancer are one of the great handicaps in its conquest. Many uninformed persons believe that cancer is contagious. There is no evidence that cancer is passed from one person to another by contact. In experimental animals it is even possible to allow young to suckle a female actually possessing a cancer of the breast. Even with close contact the young animals do not catch the disease. Cancer is not contagious.

At intervals the Press carries rumors that the "germ" causing cancer has been discovered. Each of these claims, eventually collapses as it is carefully and critically scrutinized. There is no evidence that cancer is a germborne disease. It is an actual part of the individual in which it is growing. Cancer is not infectious like tuberculosis, malaria and typhoid fever.

Many people speak of cancer as though it were a single, simple disease. It is not. Cancer is a term popularly used to describe a whole group of widely diverse conditions. The fact that these various conditions possess in common the quality of uncontrolled tissue growth and the power to invade, like advancing soldiers, the surrounding healthy tissue, have made a common descriptive term convenient. Cancer is such a term.

Many people, among them unfortunately certain of the medical profession, believe that all cancer is curable. Cancerous conditions reported early and treated adequately with x-rays, radium or surgery, are often cured. In some instances of pure epithelial cancer, the cure is complete. The fact that these various conditions possess in common the quality of uncontrolled tissue growth and the power to invade, like advancing soldiers, the surrounding healthy tissue, have made a common descriptive term convenient. Cancer is such a term.

## At Hymen's Alter Dies Plan to Work Up Exports

Washington, June 2.—An author of the silver purchase act today proposed a drastic change in administration of that law which he said would stop the downward trend of the silver market and remove the constant threat that hangs over the cotton market.

Next week, added Rep. Dies (D-Texas), will submit his proposal to Sec. Morgenthau with the backing of a number of congressmen interested not only in silver but also in trade and finance.

This was the new plan, as Mr. Dies outlined it today.

"Let the treasury suspend for six months or a year its present policy of buying silver on the world market from anybody. And then let silver only of our surplus agricultural commodities.

For example, look at Germany. Germany wants to buy cotton from us. We've got 8,000,000 bales of cotton, valued at 12c a pound stored in warehouses.

All right. For purposes of argument, say silver is bringing 90c a ounce on the world market. We let Germany that if she will sell silver to us, we'll give her \$1 an ounce. We buy 50,000,000 ounces from her on that basis. But we have it understood that in return for the 10 per cent premium, Germany will buy \$50,000,000 worth of our cotton.

"I don't hesitate to make the prediction that if we put such a system into operation we would dispose of 4,000,000 bales of that stored 6,000,000 bales of cotton within six months.

"Our exports are going down and down, and down. Despite our farm program, and because the export markets are disappearing, our surpluses are stacking up.

"So why not accomplish the double purpose of increasing our exports and at the same time buying the silver we're committed to buy? It certainly wouldn't hurt anything, and even the most skeptical of the skeptics must admit it might do some good."

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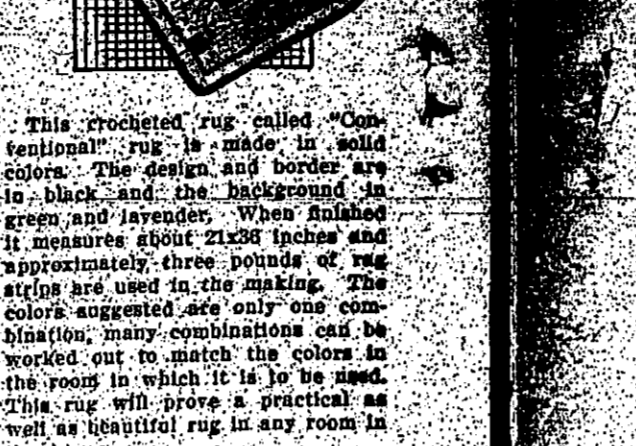
