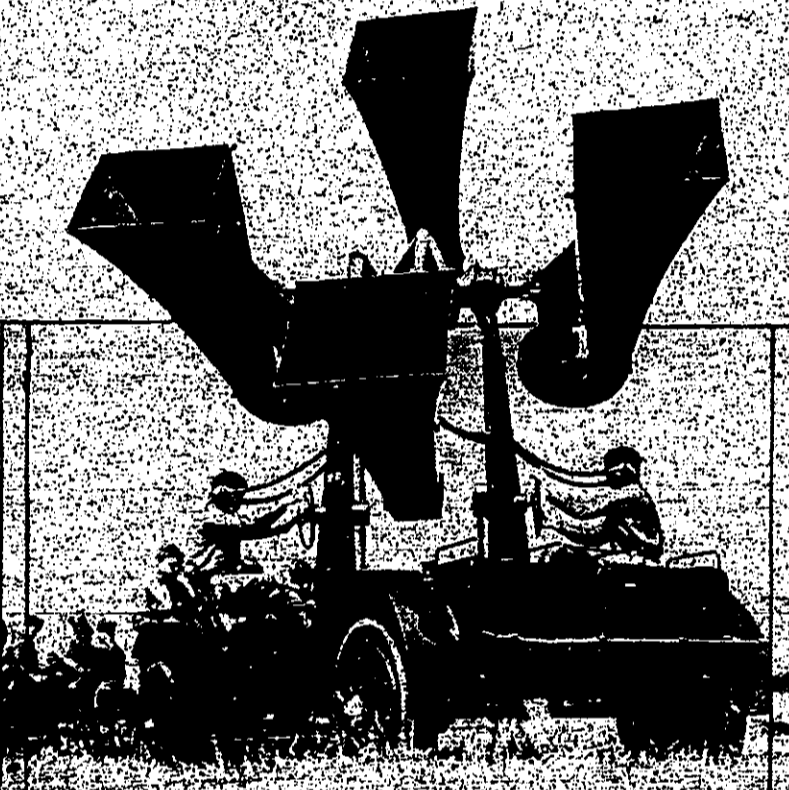

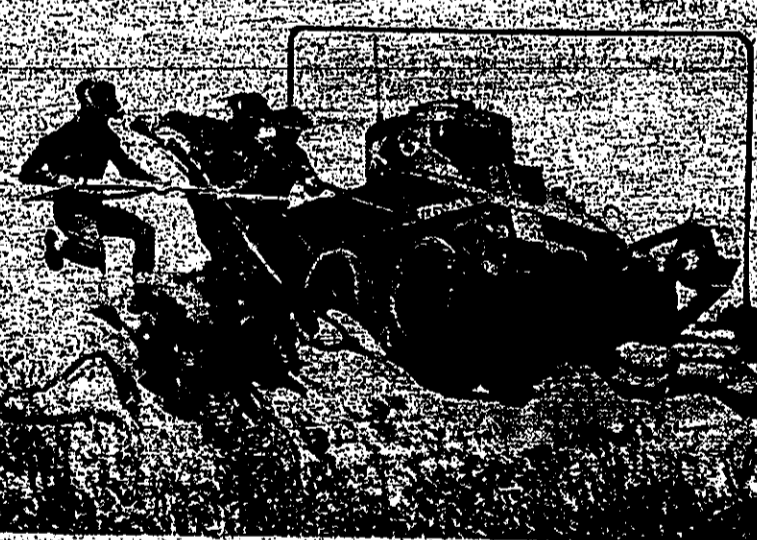

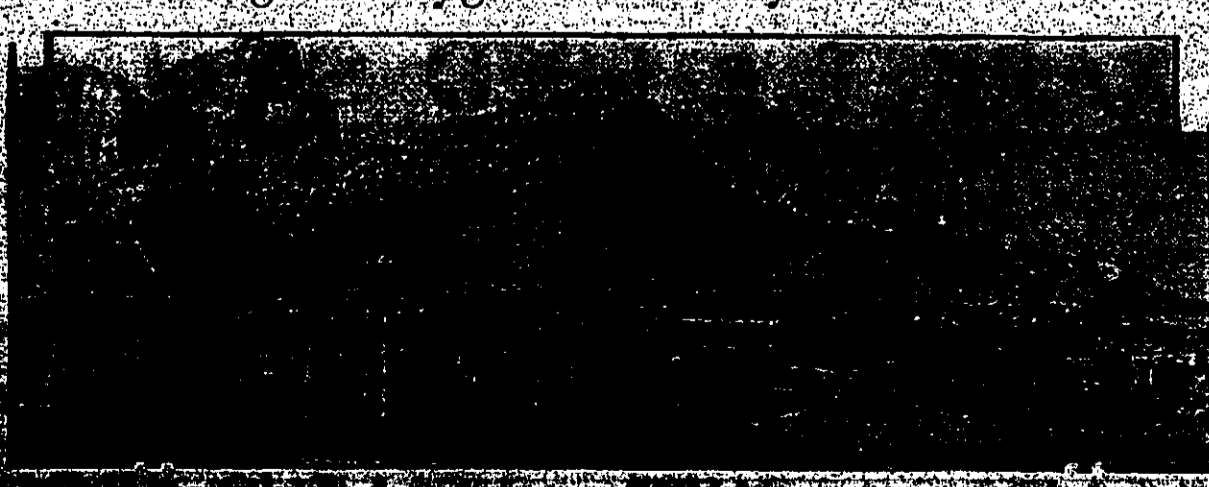

**SOMETHING WRONG WITH  
THEIR TEETH**

About nine out of every ten persons in the United States have some thing wrong with their teeth. At least eight out of every ten have carious teeth, decay, a sore throat, or other malady. In fact, the famous "pyorrhea" is to be discovered in even a casual examination of the teeth in any community.

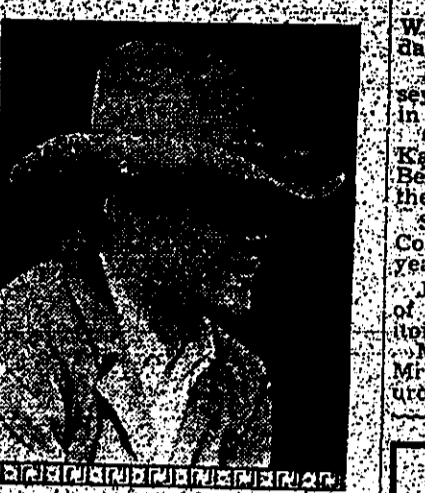

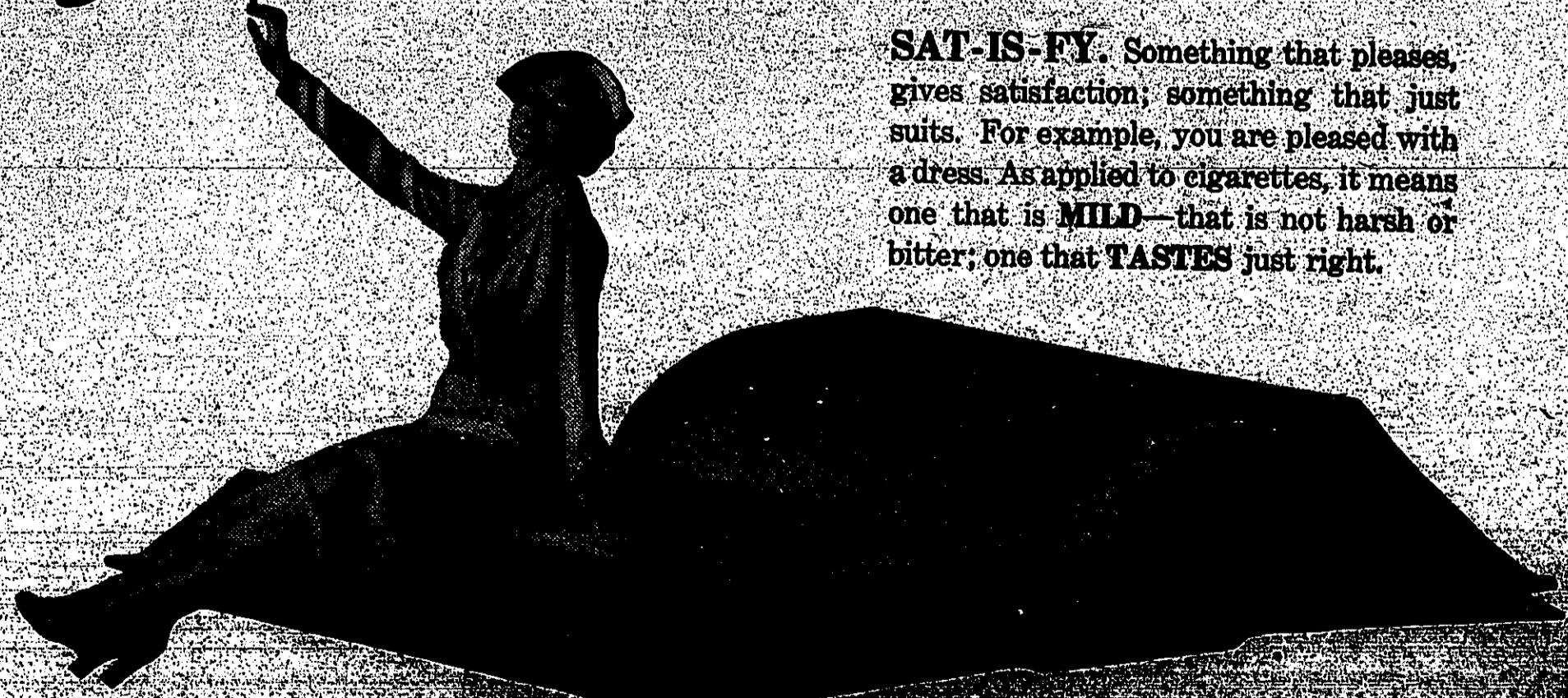
