TOMATO GROWERS MEET AT COLMESNEIL SATURDAY

Tomato growers of the Colmesneil territory will hold their first meeting at the Colmesneil high school building at 2 p. m. Saturday, Dec. 7. The purpose of the meeting is to organize for the growing of the 1936 crop. All farmers planning on growing tomatoes next spring should attend this meeting. Definite plans as to determining acreage, securing seed, deciding hotbed planning, date, etc., will be discussed at this meeting. Indications are at the present that farmers will receive a better price than they have for the past several seasons. Tomatoes offer the farmer a cash income at the time of year that little cash is received from other types of farming in this section, so all farmers should include at least one acre of tomatoes in their farming program every year.

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Warren Opens School Bids Today

Bids will be opened at 10 o'clock today at Warren for construction of a five-room addition to the present school building. The school has a \$42,000 loan grant from the WPA for the job, according to Stelman, Stelman & Goleman, architects for the work. Both the physical education building and the addition will be of brick and reinforced concrete construction. The general bid will include all work.

Dean Tevis Now A Hopi Tribesman

We read much the past week of the Indians visiting in Beaumont and the boys who have them, but one also seems to have escaped the Enterprise reporters. Their own Dean Tevis received word on Sunday of last week that the Hopi tribe was taking him into their hearts as one of them and would now call him "brother". We have not learned yet what his new name will be. We do know, however, that the honor has only been conferred upon 125 people to date, men from the nobles of the nation and all but five of them were Master Masons, so Dean feels that quite an honor is being bestowed upon him. This reporter happened to be visiting in the Tevis home when this message came. The following is taken from the Enterprise of Dec. 1, 1935.

For the first time in their lives 16 Hopi Indians from the Hopi reservation of Mesa, Arizona, yesterday walked the deck of a steamship. They were taken aboard a Standard Oil tanker at the Magnolia docks here by officials of the Magnolia steamship. The Indians arrived yesterday in their colorful native costumes and wearing their traditional arm-bands and necklaces, expressed astonishment over what they saw. Mr. Maguire, magnate and agent, who happily escorted the Indians to the ship. The group was under the direction of Mrs. Edith Sterling, Billingsley, one of America's first motion picture actresses who for years has been touring America with them. In the party also was C. A. Perkins, attached to the group. The Indians included one of the famous silver-smiths of the tribe, Lomahatwa, one of their chiefs, a bridle chief, Joseanoma, basket weaver of the group, Pletuswa, 8-year-old Hopi boy, and Sevan, the baby. It was on account of their appearance here at the South Texas State fair that Mr. and Mrs. Billingsley were asked to return the group here for engagements in Beaumont's schools. They will present on Monday, Dec. 9, some of their most compelling Hopi dances which center their religion to day and Sunday.

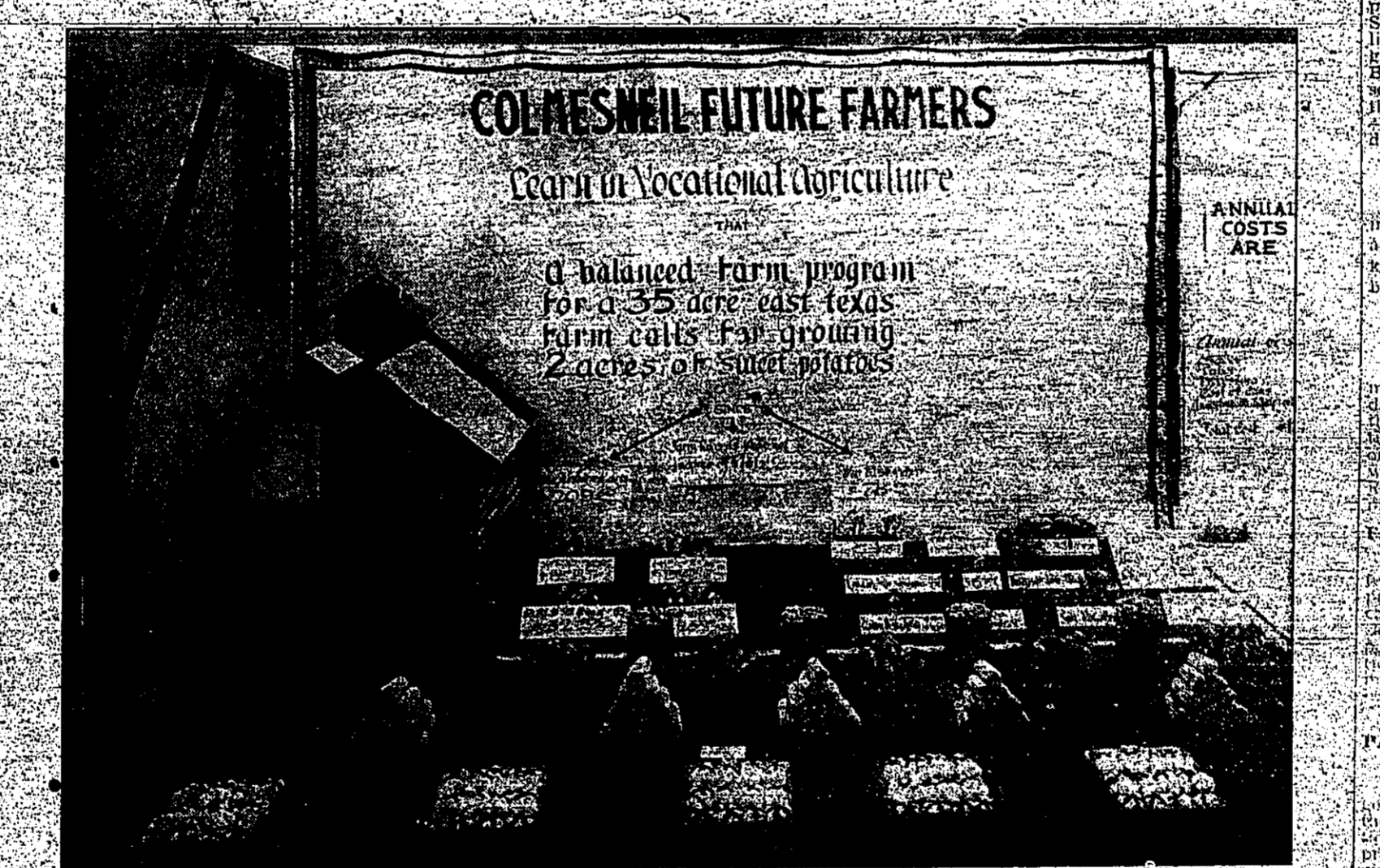
PARENT TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Colmesneil Wins First Place From A Standing Start in 1932



From a standing start in 1932 with only 36 boys enrolled the work has gone on to date in a most successful manner, and at the Beaumont fair the Colmesneil boys were awarded first place with their exhibit. It just didn't happen that the boys were awarded first place, but rather because of hard work and of O. O. Miller is the teacher in Vocational Agriculture and advice price in the success of the young men. The Booster extends congratulations to a community which is benefited by the educational advantages secured out to Future Farmers of Northern Tyler County.

Vocational Agriculture had its beginning in the Colmesneil school on July 1, 1932. During the summer the instructor, O. O. Miller, organized four evening meetings for the farmers in that number of community centers in the school district. When school opened 36 boys enrolled in the vocational agriculture classes and by the close of the school year the state department of education had granted three full units of affiliation in the work. In 1933, 42 boys took the work in school and an additional unit of affiliation was granted, giving the school four units of affiliation in vocational agriculture. In 1934, there were enrolled in the vocational agriculture classes 46 boys and in 1935 there were 50 boys enrolled in the vocational agriculture classes. An additional bonus, that of a community which is benefited by the educational advantages secured out to Future Farmers of Northern Tyler County, was secured in 1932. That same year a tomato deal was sponsored by the Vocational agriculture department of the schools and the farmers chartered by shipping about \$10,000 worth of tomatoes. Better livestock was introduced and poultry improved by controlling insects and parasites and culling. Interest was shown in improving permanent pastures, soil conservation, through terracing was given much attention. Comparative figures show that at the beginning of the Vocational program there were in the Colmesneil independent school district 35 acres of land, increased and at the present time there are over 7,000 acres. Over 25,000 head of hogs have been vaccinated against hog cholera by the veterinarian and
