Stay Home; Get 'Wet' Saturday

Saturday is election day. True, it is no call by law by publication in The Booster was served on the citizens of Tyler County for the simple reason there is NO LAW requiring notice of elections.

Upon investigation, however, it is discovered the call for election is posted here, there and yonder over the county. This is quite an "ebony hued gemmer" in the woodpile, undoubtedly originated by politicians way back yonder who may or may not have visualized causes for secrecy in the matter of holding elections. The fact of the matter is this: if you are a busy person and do not have time to be circulating about reading the signs on the sign boards, notices of election can be posted and elections held without your knowledge, unless some talkative party happens to spill the beans.

It remained for the dry folks at Chester to hold the first mass meeting in the county in an attempt to wake up public sentiment regarding the week-end election, Saturday, December 21, 1935.

This election is held on the question of local option. Just to refresh everybody's memory about Woodville, be it known the county seat of Tyler County has had no saloons for forty (40) years.

The election Saturday is to procure the legal right to set up and operate a LIQUOR STORE. A liquor store is a building wherein one can purchase several different kinds of intoxicants.

The last legislative meet quit trying to define an open saloon and swapped horses in mid stream and substituted the term Liquor Store, and if local option carries, there will be no saloons, but Liquor Stores can be operated, and believe us, Jane, they will be operated as such.

The Booster cannot state how far away from the front door of a Liquor Store one must be before the seals of his original package can be broken and a fellow can wet his whistle.

Every citizen of Tyler County who does not believe in Liquor Stores or saloons or the sale of intoxicants in Tyler County owes it to himself and herself to rain or shine to get to the polls and cast a vote against local option.

Every man and woman who makes any pretension whatever of religion or church affiliation owes it to himself and herself and the family and to God Almighty to turn out and vote AGAINST Local Option.

The Booster is going to vote against local option.

How's How In the Old Age Pension

Many provisions of the Texas Old Age Assistance Law were taken directly from laws previously existing in other states or from the Social Security Act, which President Roosevelt sponsored and State Auditor Orville S. Carpenter sends the following to the press of the state:

1. A qualified applicant must be 65 years of age and a citizen of the United States.
2. He must have lived in Texas five of the last nine years, and have lived in the state continuously one year preceding application.
3. He must not at time of receiving aid be an inmate of a public or private institution.
4. He must not have made a voluntary transfer or assignment of property, to qualify for aid.
5. He must not be a habitual criminal or habitual drunkard.
6. He or she is not eligible if he or she has a husband or wife able to furnish him or her adequate support.

The property restriction as well as that of cash or security ownership must be clearly understood. A qualified old-age pension applicant does not own property, real, personal, or mixed, the value of which, taking into consideration assessed valuations for State and for county tax purposes less all encumbrances and liens, exceeds, if the applicant is single, \$5,000, or if married, \$7,500.

Does not have or own cash or marketable securities, the fair value of which exceeds \$500, if the applicant is single or if married, \$1,000.

Carpenter continues—An important restriction concerning incomes of qualified applicants. The income of applicants must not exceed, from any and all sources, \$300 yearly if single, and the combined incomes of both spouses from any and all sources must not exceed \$720 a year, if applicant is married. A sworn statement of all incomes during the preceding two years must accompany the application. All applications will be handled through local agents after the new law goes into effect, February 1, 1936.

Would Colonize In Tyler County

Brackettville, Texas, December 1, 1935.—Dear Editor:—You have perhaps kept up with the old age pension legislation, which is a matter of keen interest to a half-million people in Texas past 50, unless they are well fixed with money, land, or other valuable property. Unable to meet us at the polls, the predatory interests want to do with their big fat bank rolls, and all but bear us with their legislature.

If any old person has been on a hard and long life, for some time, they can say goodbye to that \$15-a-month and try and scratch along all they die on 15 cents a day.

But listen, Mr. Editor, those fellows who give us such a dirty deal may not get the same chance at us again for they may find a few hundred thousand paper ballots piled right across their head back to Austin. Right now the Pioneer Home League is organizing to protect the political and financial interests of us old "sundowners" against those powerful interests which have become great and rich by grinding the faces of the poor. What the "unemployables" will do between 50 and 55 we are not told; but even should we all be allowed the princely sum of a dollar a day we can barely exist on it in a large town or city. I believe if I had but an acre or two near Woodville I could live better on two bits a day than I could on a dollar a day in a cheap lodging house in Dallas or Houston.

But how can a man get hold of that acre and the things to go on it that one can't cut out of the forest? Well, the Pioneer Home League is asking Congress to buy six large tracts of land in Texas and resell to disabled veterans, retired soldiers, and civil employees, old age pensioners and needy, homeless people over 50 for sustenance homesteads. These would be from one to ten acres and with the necessary improvements would be sold on 30-year time, 3% interest, costing the buyer one to five dollars a month to pay out. The Pioneer Home League is organizing to protect the political and financial interests of us old "sundowners" against those powerful interests which have become great and rich by grinding the faces of the poor. What the "unemployables" will do between 50 and 55 we are not told; but even should we all be allowed the princely sum of a dollar a day we can barely exist on it in a large town or city. I believe if I had but an acre or two near Woodville I could live better on two bits a day than I could on a dollar a day in a cheap lodging house in Dallas or Houston.

At our next convention we hope to get the Pioneer Home League out of the secret society class. I hope, Mr. Editor, that you will see my point when I say that from all I know Tyler county easily leads Polk, Trinity, Liberty and San Jacinto counties as the best site for the Southeast Texas unit of the chain of six sustenance homestead colonies to which she is entitled by reason of her 6,000,000 population. Each colony will contain 10,000 homesteads of from one to ten acres each, which will require nearly all the good land for sale within four miles of Woodville. All land and material bought would be paid for in real and the colony would have an annual buying power of nearly \$1,000,000. And bear in mind this grand tale known as 1936 will be 1936 so popular with the people that the government will have to take the money out of its pocket to pay for the money.
