Down in Southeast Texas the Luklin News considers the national struggle for the consolidation of rail facilities and comes to that with a practical suggestion. The T. & N. O. is its through service. Dallas to Beaumont has a stretch of mileage between Nacogdoches and Huntington. Luklin is not on this direct line at all but it is a very considerable shuffling around, passenger and freight connections via the Houston Shipport division. All that the T. & N. O. has to do, the "Luklin News" suggests, is to abandon the "backage" between Nacogdoches and Huntington and route its traffic through the Luklin between the same points. Some five miles would be added to distance but it would be added in place and it could be used on the trackwork eliminated.

ADJUSTED ACREAGE CONTRACTED ACRES
Just as the old Triple A programs added such words as "adjusted acreage," "base acres," "contracted acres," "compliance" and a score of others to the farmer's language, so the new AAA soil conservation program is also bringing new words to the farm. The meaning of some of them is explained by M. S. Hyde, county agricultural agent.
"Most important from a financial standpoint, the says are "soil conserving" payment and "soil building" payment. The first is the grant when a farmer sets for planting acres from "soil depleting" to "soil conserving and building" crops. The second is the payment, never in excess of \$1 per acre, which a farmer may be entitled to receive to help finance new grass and legume and similar seedlings.
"Farmers are beginning to talk readily about 'soil depleting' base. Soil depleting crops for Texas are corn, cotton, grain sorghums, sweet sorghums, millet, potatoes, rice, sugarcane, commercial truck and canning crops, small grains, hays and legumes, and grain of any and peanute trees. 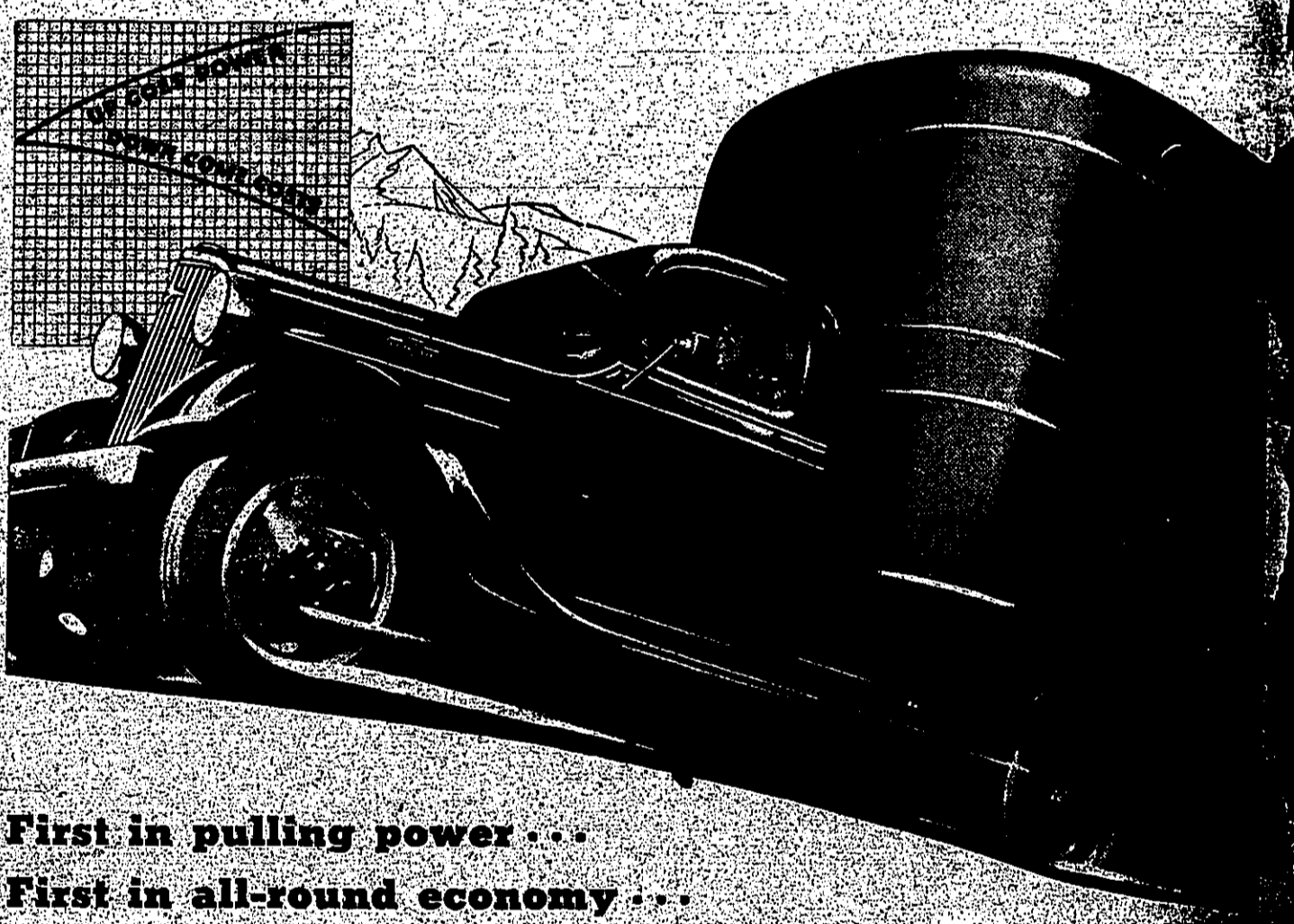
