He served as representative from the district during the 40th and 41st legislatures. "It is my desire to now offer myself to the service of the people to serve my home county," Mr. Renfro said. "That is my only object in announcing for this office. I feel that if I can be of help in Austin, I would like to give my efforts and time in doing so. My previous terms in the office of representative gives me the added experience and the knowledge of legislative affairs that will be valuable in again serving in this office. And having lived and farmed in this county all my life I feel that I well know the people, their needs and wishes. The county knows me, knows my history and record and my life for the 69 years I have lived among the people here. I will try to see as many voters as possible during the campaign since I will sincerely appreciate the vote and influence of my friends and acquaintances. Mr. Renfro announced the main points of his platform as follows: "I favor the full payment of the old age pensions in compliance with the constitutional amendment voted by the people. I favor a general sales tax. I favor a tax on natural resources. I favor economy in the administration of the state government. I favor an adequate system of public education. I favor equal rights in all and special privileges to none."

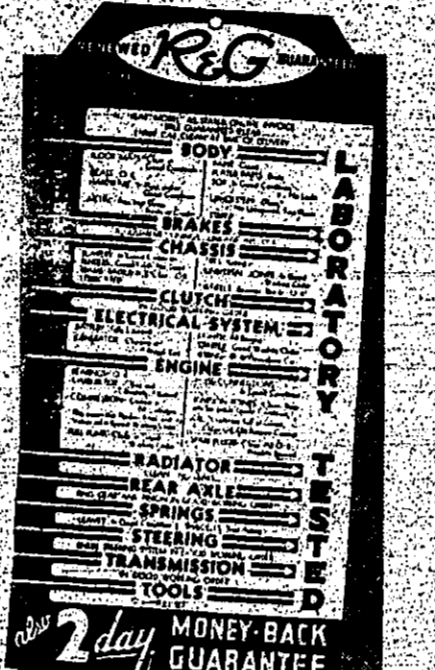
