C. C. C. Reports 69,000 Texans Enrolled in the Three Years; Review of Activities As Reported

Washington, Sept. 15.—Approximately 69,000 Texans were reported today to have enrolled in C.C.C. camps in the last three years and to have sent more than \$10,000,000 to their homes from wages. Robert Fechner, emergency conservation work director, said 12,727 camps. A progress report on its activities in the Lone Star State showed that 88,900 residents had been in the camps in the past 33 months and that the war department had sent checks for \$10,770,000 to the men's homes. From a basic cash allowance of \$30 monthly, they return an average of \$22 to \$25 to their families, the department figures showed. These camps are now in operation in Texas: National forest, 9; state forest, 1; private forest, 7; soil conservation, 22; reclamation, 1; state park, 25; army, 4. Their activities were listed as follows:—Number of soil saving check dams built, 20,230; square yards of bank sloping completed, 1,332,749; number of terrace outlets constructed, 94,113; linear feet of ditches, 220,000; acres of gullies graded, 12,411; acres of water
