**PIONEER FOUNDER OF COLLEGE RECALLED**  
 Belton's Mary Harlan Baylor College last week celebrated the 15th birthday of her namesake Judge Robert Baylor Baylor. Judge Baylor, together with William M. Wolfe, Jr., helped establish the Baylor College in Texas. He held the first court in Bell County, declared the first election in Belton, and was the first to be elected to the office of sheriff in 1857. Baylor was a pioneer in the revolutionary war, an uncle of General Washington's aide, another uncle was a lawyer who later taught young Baylor the profession, and a grandfather was a legislator in Virginia. Baylor was a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, but resigned to join the migration to Alabama, where he was again in politics. He was shortly made a member of the state house of representatives. Later sent to Congress.

**White** in Alabama. Baylor spent much time studying law. He obtained his law degree from the University of Virginia in 1837. Baylor immediately decided to study law, which had won his independence from Mexico only three years before.

Once in the Lone Star State, he devoted all his time to his legal and preaching duties. He was a district judge of the three most populous counties in the then republic, soon after became an associate justice of the supreme court. He held court during the day but at night and on Sundays. Baylor's ready wit and wit was a favorite of the first Baptist educational board in Texas soon after he became a member.

As a Baptist leader, he helped found Baylor University. Baylor little dreamed the school would broaden up to Woodville, Dallas and Belton. At Independence, he served as a member of the board of trustees, an unsalaried professor in the law department and spent his spare time raising funds for the school.

**HOW DID THROWING HAT IN THE RING ORIGINATE?**

**DEAD SEA COMING TO LIFE AS BIG PLANT TO EXTRACT POTASH STARTS BLDG.**  
 Jerusalem, Sept. 5.—The Dead Sea, the strangest body of water in the world, is slowly coming to life again. A big plant, 1,300 feet below the level of the Mediterranean, receiving an inflow of 6,000,000 tons of water daily from the River Jordan without an outlet, the sea has puzzled archaeologists and geologists for centuries.

Today, where once Sodom and Gomorrah stood, where David took refuge, where Herod fled when the Romans captured Jerusalem in 70 B. C., modern science is taking out potash and bromine, and the Dead Sea is alive with activity.

Once barren and thought useless, the sea's shoreline is now ringing with the sound of hammers as a new potash works, with a 30,000-ton capacity annually has brought on a building boom.

Records put up by the British empire in and around the Dead Sea are bringing thousands of visitors to the sea each winter, and homes and works building up springing up like mushrooms.

Great Britain is closely watching the potash processes for the Dead Sea, her only source of potash and bromine in the empire. She will take an early hand in any large potash and bromine plant.
