**BASKETBALL PRACTICE**  
Basketball practice will start Monday afternoon at 7:30. The following letter from last year will be back: "The basketball team of 1937, a lax is led on both sides by the employer of one or more individuals and the employee. On the other hand, many employers doubtless have been overlooked and these are urged to write immediately and ask for the forms required for their business."

# The Woodville Public School

The school board has several suggestions to make regarding the needs of the school and how these needs are to be met. This is the first time that the school board has had the opportunity of giving as much information as I can on this subject.

In the first place, I can never be satisfied until our children have all the advantages of free education that the children have in other sections of the state. It is no longer considered that each community should take care of the expense of education in that community. Under that method the wealthy communities have good schools, and the poor communities poor schools. Under the present set-up, the kind of school that any community has depends upon the foresight, intelligence and aggressiveness of the leaders in that community.

The necessary prerequisites of a good school anywhere are:

1. A well balanced curriculum.
2. Trained teachers.
3. Adequately equipped buildings.
4. Sanitary facilities.
5. Attractive grounds.
6. Library and laboratory.
7. Art, music, parent-teacher association.
8. Membership in the inter-scholastic league.

I have no conviction of no school having more than that no parent should be satisfied whose child has access to less than that.

State aid helps to pay salaries of teachers and some of the expense on many of the items mentioned, but it is still left to the local committee to provide the buildings and grounds. We are permitted under the law and under State Department regulations to set aside one-half of the \$1.00 tax for buildings, grounds and equipment. We cannot levy more than \$1.00 tax under any circumstances. And we can not use the

The proceeds of this levy is to finance unemployment insurance. The exceptions and requirements of this act are well known by this time. The tax is paid solely by the employer with no deduction from wages. Under Title 9, effective January 1, 1937, a tax is levied on both the employer of one or more individuals and the employee. The rate is 1% of the payroll plus an excise tax from the employer and a 1% income tax from the employee payable monthly and reportable on Form 940. The tax is reported and paid by the employer only who is authorized to deduct 1% of the employee's wage. The employer makes no return and the employer is liable for the payment of the 2% total. The tax payment for the month of January, 1937, must be in the collector's office on or before February 1st and monthly thereafter for the preceding month. The proceeds of this levy is used to pay the cost of the old age benefit solely a deduction from the state participation in it.
