State Board's Report In Woodville Schools

The following report was received from the State Department of Education: Report on Woodville High School, directed to Supt. C. V. Wheat, by Mr. J. B. Hines, dated March 18, 1937.

The work of classifying and accrediting the public schools of Texas is under the direction of the State committee composed of 12 members representing the high schools and colleges of the State. This committee, by establishing educational standards, determines the conditions upon which high schools are classified and accredited and is interested in securing the best possible standards and certifying those that have attained them so as to facilitate the transfer of students to any other school or college.

The regulations as prescribed by this committee are administered by the State Department of Education through high school supervisors. In the visit of the supervisors and their reports to the school authorities, recommendations are offered in the spirit of cooperation and helpful suggestion with the purpose of securing the highest standards and certifying those that have attained them so as to facilitate the transfer of students to any other school or college.

In order that the schools may be properly certified, it is essential that minimum requirements be met. To that end the supervisors have recently visited the schools making the following recommendations:
