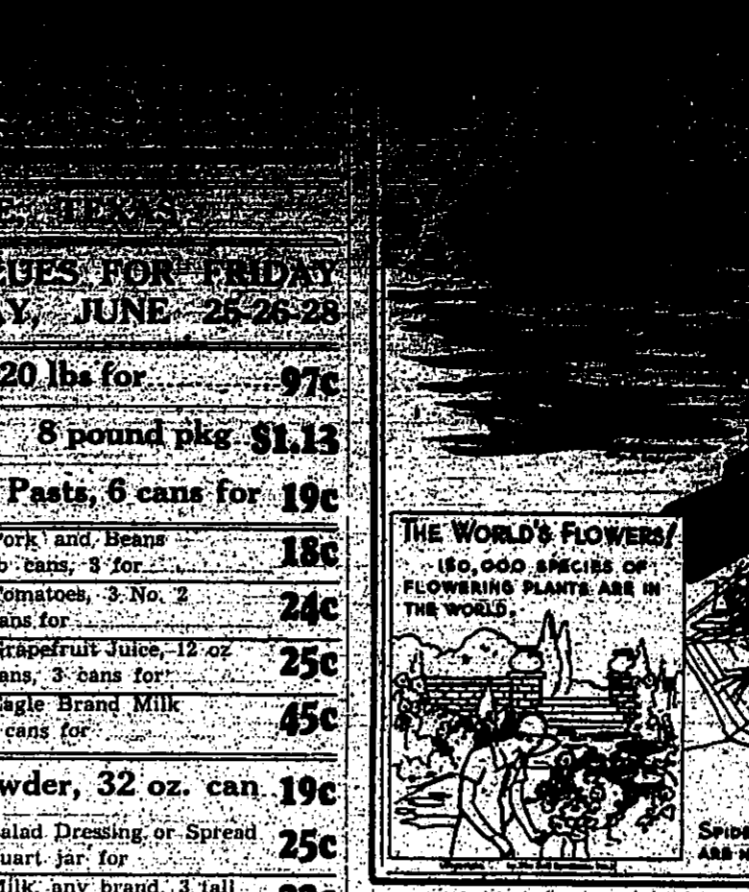

MECHANICAL EYE DOES IT IN TWO SECONDS

For three weeks army pursuit planes and navy blimps without lights roamed night in the sky over Ft. Monmouth, N. J. Although they could not see their fast moving targets through the darkness, machine gunners were able to hit them accurately with rays from giant searchlights. Their equipment was a combination of extremely sensitive heat detectors which effectively "let out" targets up to 20 miles away and a range-finding "mechanical" hand which worked out complicated trigonometrical and geometrical equations in two seconds. Although the details of the equipment have been kept secret, army authorities have called it "the most potent defensive weapon known to military science." Pathfinder.

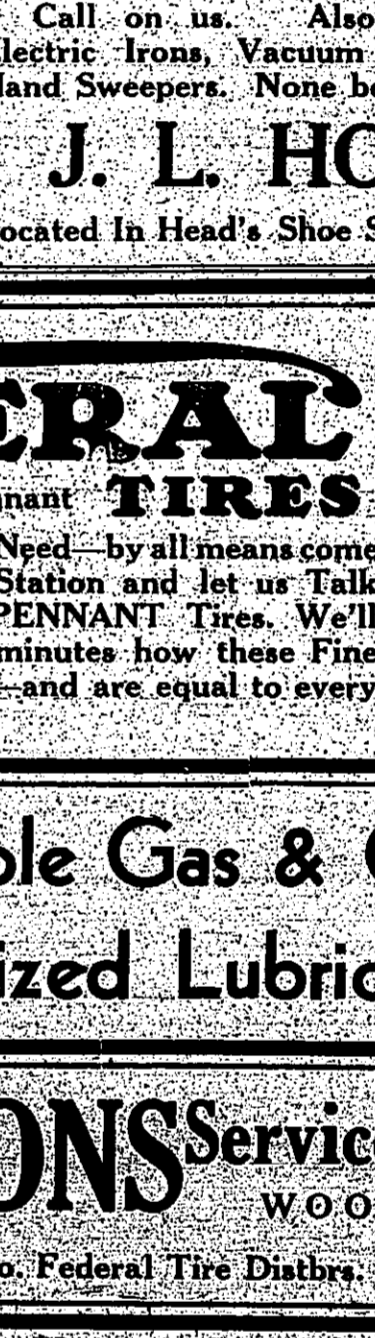
