Thursday, November 15, and Friday, November 16, are the days promised for the 1937 South Texas State Fair at Beaumont.

Back in all their glory will be the exhibits, shows and midway attractions that in years past have contributed so mightily to the success of Texas, particularly the largest exposition, along with a variety of new entertainment that is destined to win the plaudits of young and old alike.

Shifting of the fair dates back to November has, according to Secretary Manager J. B. Herlihy, made possible the procurement of a first-class entertainment program. Features that will not be available this late in the season, 1937, are the list of the royal American high school girls, the midway with some of the most interesting and exciting displays of American playing cards, the largest fair in the nation this year, and the visit of Beaudette, the South Texas exhibition's headliner.

Joy Night, incidentally, will take place the second Friday of the fair, or on the evening of November 19. With a midway on the 11th, because of America's best looks like the whole audience will be half-won back at this time and before they get to the end of the year.

One of the new features that will be added is an electric organ which will be played through the entire duration of the fair, and folks who want to rest will be catered to by an effort on the part of the board of the military institute.

Once again it looks like the future of America, judged on the basis of youth, will be in the hands of the literate students of the county. The exhibits in the Agricultural Building, the show house made in 1935 and 1936, are there to reveal to the world the progress of the 1937 South Texas State Fair, which will be the biggest ever.

Without a declaration of war and without warring or justification of any kind, civilians, including women and children, are being ruthlessly murdered with bombs from the air.

"Nations are fomenting and taking sides in civil warfare in nations that have never done them any harm. Nations claiming freedom for themselves deny it to others.

The reign of terror and lawlessness began a few years ago. If these things come to pass in other parts of the world, let no one imagine that America will escape, that it may expect mercy, that it may expect that it will not be attacked and that it will continue tranquilly and peacefully to carry on the ethics and the arts of civilization.

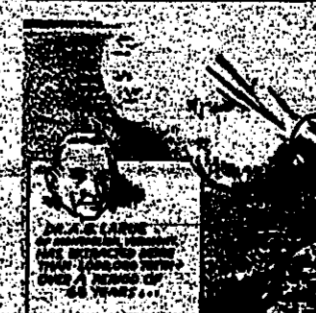
## NEW TEACHER FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL
