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Women's Conference In Washington, D. C.

The past three days the Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States are in a "Women's Conference" in the Nation's Capital. This year's 5-day conference has been called to make clear the critical times, what national defense really means, the defense of the American tradition, social, ethical and governmental and the physical defense of our borders. Participating organizations include, in addition to the V. F. W. ladies auxiliary, the American Legion Auxiliary, the American War Mothers, the National Women's Relief Corps.

Speakers include such nationally known figures as James Harvey Rogers, Sterling Professor of Political Economy at Yale University; Robert Fechner, Director U. S. Emergency Conservation Work; John W. Studdabaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education; Raymond Leslie Buell, President, Foreign Policy Association; Scott P. Squires, Commander in Chief, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States; the Honorable James W. Gerard, former U. S. Ambassador to Germany.

The convention opened with the mass meeting at the Mayflower hotel, Tuesday evening, January 25. The conference emphasizes our basic defenses, the Constitution, our tripartite form of government and the Civil Rights Bill. In discussing our safeguards at home such as education for citizenship, freedom of speech and religion, government's service to youth, preservation of our national health, and the like. In addition it discusses our safeguards abroad, such as trade treaties, neutrality and international arbitration. And today its conclusion it will consider the bulwarks of defense, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air forces. The purpose of the 5-day conference is to stress to the entire country the importance of national defense along the broadest lines to assure an enduring America—not only the physical defense of our borders, but defense of the American tradition, social, ethical, and governmental.

TIME-TO-LOWER INSURANCE RATES

Texas experienced the second... lowest fire loss in its history during... 1937. Marvin Hall, State fire... insurance commissioner, reported... one day last week. An unofficial... check of the commission's... record shows that only the 1935... total of \$6,008,363 was below the... total during the past 12 months... of approximately \$6,400,000.

When contrasted with the losses... of former years the 1937 losses... are surprisingly small. The 1931... losses amounted to \$17,656,457, for... 1930 the losses were \$17,225,417 and the 1929 losses were... \$15,664,856. Such a large decrease... in so few years definitely... reflects great progress in fire... prevention and control.

Since he took office on Jan. 4, 1937, Hall has been a leader in... fire prevention activities. His... policies in this respect are largely... responsible for the low loss... record of the past year.

According to Hall, for the first... six months of 1937 the losses... dipped under any other six-month... period, but an increase in fires... over the State generally from July... to December pushed the total up... to right above that of 1935.

Such a low fire loss as that... of the past 12 months means a... direct saving to the people of this... state of approximately \$2,000,000... as the fires record of each... city and town plays an important... part in the determination of the... cost of insurance. In addition... to this fact the low loss reflects... a period of prosperity, not a... business recession; the records... of the department show that... high fire losses invariably go... hand in hand with times of... depression.

The 1937 record is a compliment... to the efficiency of Texas firemen, and proves what can be... done when the people of this... State co-operate in an effort to... reduce wasteful loss of life and... property through fires. The aim... of the fire insurance department... is to help Texas citizens set an... all-time record low in 1938.

Beware Small Pox Epidemic

Texas is faced with the probability... of local smallpox epidemics if... precautions are not immediately... employed, reports Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State health officer.

Last year there was not a single death... from small pox in Texas, while... last week over 30 cases and two... deaths were reported.

Smallpox epidemics would never occur if everyone and especially children could be effectively vaccinated.

The lack of vaccination causes the present menace of this disease. Modern safeguards have removed every legitimate objection to vaccination.

The virus is made from calves and consequently is incapable of transmitting human blood diseases.

A primary vaccination with one successful revaccination will, as a rule protect throughout life from the milder forms of smallpox.

Therefore, be vaccinated and revaccinated at least every seven years, so that you will have the greatest protection possible and the least chance of being sick.

Revaccination should also be done after each time you have been near a known case of smallpox, for you know that the old vaccination protects. If the new one falls you take.

Vaccination is not to be feared but rather sought as the only safe, positively harmless and absolutely certain safeguard against smallpox.

Los Angeles, Jan. 24 - Dr. Arthur D. Houghton, one of the 31 founders of the Legion of Honor, died here today.

With morning came the repair crews

A winter rain, falling slowly from leaden December skies, froze to telephone poles and lines. Hard on its heels came the wind. Ice laden wires snapped and poles splintered before the blast.

Night found scores of towns throughout the storm region handicapped by crippled telephone service.
