Clean Up Campaign

Cleanup week is being observed in Woodville under the auspices of the C. of C. with J. Wood Fain as chairman of the general committee which has announced that the preliminary judging of all yards is planned for Saturday afternoon. The score card indicates the judging will be on the basis of general appearance, street and alley adjoining property, state of repair of houses, fences, and gates, yards, (trees and shrubbery pruned as headed), the barn and out houses, the lots, chicken yards, and garden, and the disposal of waste water. Ribbons will be placed on the score cards and everybody is urged to participate in order to reduce fire hazards, improve the health by removing the breeding places for mosquitoes, and the like, and also to add to the attractiveness of the town. Everybody is requested to place trash to be hauled on the side of the street where it will be accessible. Trash will be hauled off on Thursday, Friday, Saturday. Get your out in plain view. The rat campaign is slated for Thursday with Dan M. Foster of Nacogdoches in charge. In addition to the poison that is mixed and used to kill the rats, Mr. Foster is bringing 350 traps to be used as a follow-up measure to catch the rats that evade the poison.
