Be Wise, Banks Hold Or Be Ruined

Washington, May 4.—Bankers' meeting, which was held here last week, they must be wise and more energetic in meeting the credit needs of the country if banking is to remain in private hands.

Speaking at a meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Jones said he was afraid RFC or some similar Government lending agency still would be necessary, when its present lending authority expires June 30, 1939.

His address followed a speech by William S. Knudsen, president of General Motors, denouncing the Wagner Act as the largest drawback to good industrial relations and accusing the industrial union in its present form of depending on force to defiance of law.

The National Labor Relations Board, target of vehement criticism at previous sessions of the chamber, makes no pretense of paying any attention to the employers' side of the case, Knudsen said.

"The employer," he continued, "can be heard only when he is summoned, and he knows before he goes that there is no record of a single decision where he has had a ghost of a show."

Jones, speaking at a divisional luncheon meeting, said he was firmly of the opinion that banks generally have not been particularly wise or energetic in meeting the credit needs of the country.

He blamed this in part on bank supervision, and said the supervising authorities have been operating largely as they always have operated without recognizing the necessity for longer time bank credit of a different character.

This, he said, has discouraged the banks. Later, he reminded his listeners there is a bill before Congress to have the Government take over the Federal Reserve Banks.

"Whatever the outcome," he said, "it is a live subject, and if banking is to remain in private hands it must meet the credit needs of the country."

Explaining in detail the lending policies of the RFC, Jones said he thought his agency could be particularly helpful in making industrial loans for plant improvement and equipment and for buildings, in extending loans on inventories to help the manufacturer avoid sacrificing his stock, and by lending to public utilities for expansion.

"In offering to lend to utilities we are not unmindful of the controversy between Government and some utility companies," he said. "These difficulties will ultimately be adjusted. In the meantime there is no desire on the part of Government to hamper any properly operated utility by making it difficult for it to secure credit."

"We hear a great deal of criticism from banking and business, as well as editorially, of the Government's attitude toward utilities, but no acknowledgements of the offenders in this field, and there are offenders."

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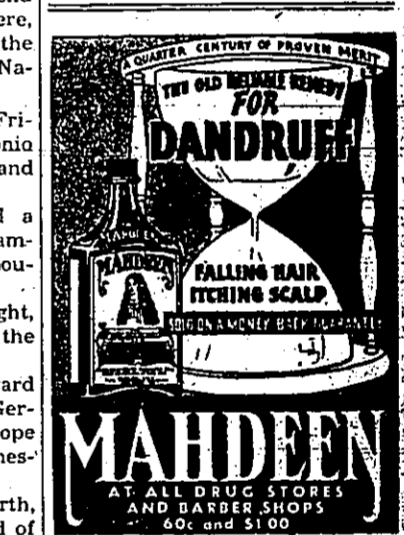
