**THE RECORD OF A 'BUSTED' COUNTY IN BUYING TRUCKS, ROAD MACHINERY, TO DATE**

Woodville, Texas, June 9, 1938.

Dear Sir:—In accordance with your request, I am handing you a statement of amounts paid out by Commissioners Court for road machinery, which is given you in two accounts, that is for road machinery proper, and also for trucks. This record is from 1920 down to date.

It will be recalled that following the failure of the banks in Woodville, during the 20's, that very little road work was done, up until a revival of interest on or about 1928, hence very little purchase of machinery between 1920 and 1929.

This report does not include, as to repairs and parts for trucks or road machinery.

It is my understanding that the dump trucks purchased in 1936, and the pickup trucks were purchased with funds derived from OUT-OF-COUNTY Registration of automobiles.
