The driver of the insured car loses time, has to pay for the repairs inflicted by the old Ford which had no brakes. Aren't these insurance policies a grand and wonderful thing to possess? There is only one remedy for this injustice, and that is a law which will make it impossible to procure a license on a car that the insurance companies will not insure, and, further, to make the official issuing a car license, the man to make out an insurance policy. To make this law airtight after another section is written which names a fine for not following the letter of the law, it should have another section added, making it impossible to procure a car license until the insurance policy has been issued. At least such action would make it possible for a man, to start, action against a driver who allows his car brakes to become useless. Such a law, also, might slow up the activities of the infamous morgue chasers.
