We have been interviewing several local citizens who attended the Democratic convention in Beaumont to find out what it was all about. So far we have been reading six daily papers to find one that had the interesting tidbits to tell the truth.

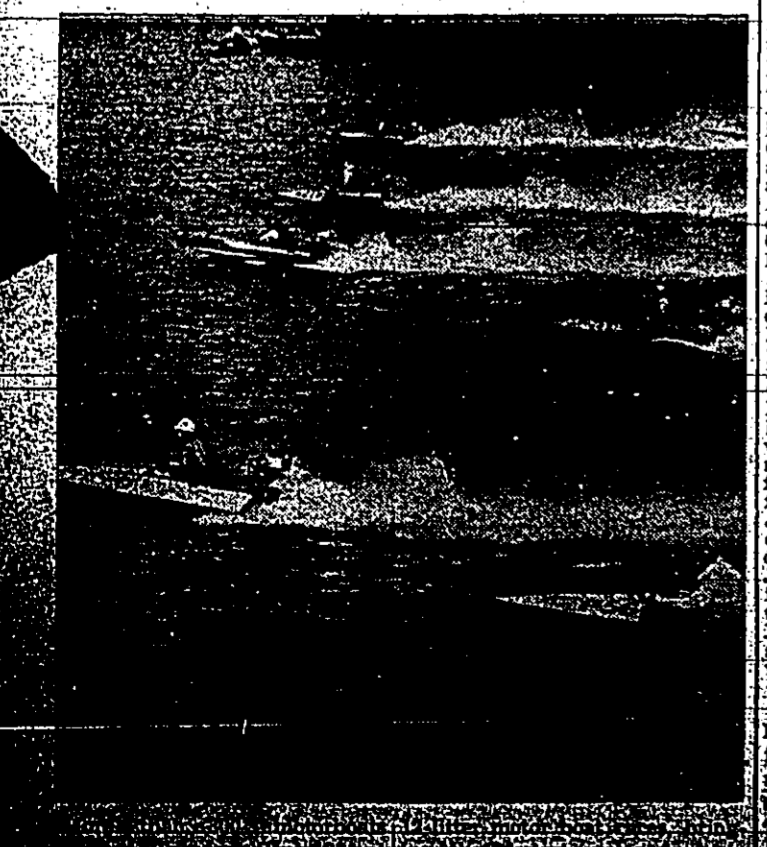
