INDIAN FAIR IN FOLK COUNTY, OCTOBER 27-28
The second annual fair is to be held at the Indian Village on Thursday and Friday, Oct. 27-28. This year the Alabama and Couchsattas of the reservation have consented to let the many trophies which have been hidden, to be shown to the public. This is expected to be a more colorful showing than last year. Farm products will be shown and a variety of beadwork, woodwork and basketry. A rodeo will be held by the Indians, using their horses and steers on the reservation.

TO JUDGE MEATS
Future Farmers of America will compete in a meat identification contest at the South Texas State fair, Nov. 3 to 18. The contest will be under supervision of T. R. Rhodes of Huntsville, area supervisor of vocational agriculture. Prizes of from \$2.50 to \$10 will be awarded teams and individuals. Contestants will include two groups: During progress of the contest, any contestant who confers with anyone will be expelled. Each contestant will identify 25 retail cuts of meat and indicate the wholesale or primary cut from which each was taken. Thirty minutes will be allowed for the filling out of the identification card. Each contestant also will place five ribs for quality, five minutes being allowed for this. Scoring on identification shall be on the basis of 300 points per contest, and 900 points per team. In identifying each of the 25 retail cuts the contestant will be allowed four points for identifying the kind of meats, four points for identifying each cut and four points for correctly indicating the wholesale or primary cut from which the cut was made. Whole sale cuts from which retail cuts will be made will consist of: beef rounds, rumps, loin ends, short loins, flanks, ribs, plates, briskets, fore shanks and chuck. Lamb, pork, cured and smoked
