EAGLES SHOW IN SAN AUGUSTINE DOPE ALL UPSET

That was a merry bunch of fans and warriors who returned from San Augustine late Friday evening. In fact almost all Woodvillians knew the Eagles had not been defeated even if we all had to wait until they quieted down to learn the totals. Every now and then The Boosters listen in on the gloom-carriers—that Woodville will be just a push over for about eight ninths of the 1938 conference and we'll tell the world not a single team of this district will say after the game is over that the Eagles were a set-up, something for them to practice new plays on, to see if they are good. The game proved to be no parlor lizard's delight, indeed, quite the contrary. The Wolves were out to win in some way on their own bivoac, and they acted up something scandalous, and the Eagles were able to take it and dish up a few helpings of the kind the San Augustines hardly relished.

Woodville took to the air right from the beginning, and a pass from Pitts to Willis for 18 yards and then a 30 yard gallop was how the first touchdown was made. The kick was blocked. Indeed San Augustine excelled at least in one department—blocking kicks—they did it four times.

A pass from Willis to Hendrix was the start for touchdown No. 2, but a fellow called Cartwright—started in on his blocking stunt. He got away with it and had to do it again. Hendrix in the second quarter made a left end for a total of 28 yards which started with a reverse, which made another count of 6—only 6—Cartwright did it again. Anyway, the score at this juncture was 18-0.

Again in the fourth quarter Hendrix made a touchdown with a six yard line smash and the game was over with a total count of 24-0.

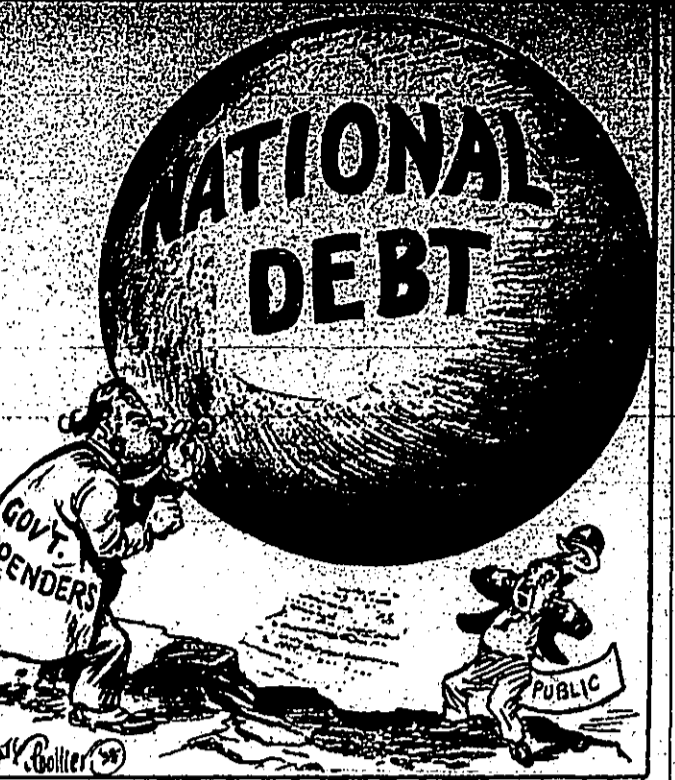

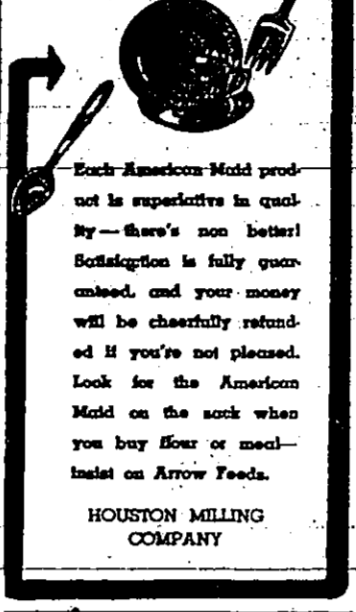

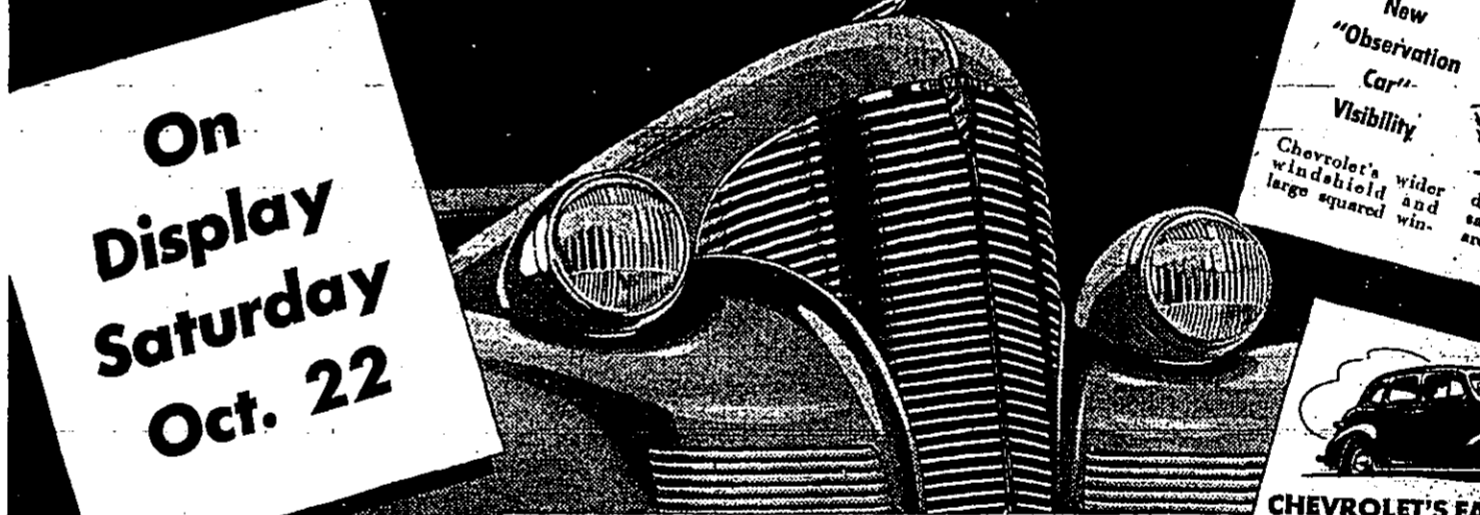
