Saturday will witness in the Cotton Bowl the annual clash between the Universities of Texas and Oklahoma, the outstanding grid event of the season. Monday is Negro Day, when Wiley College and Prairie View will clash with a section reserved for whites.

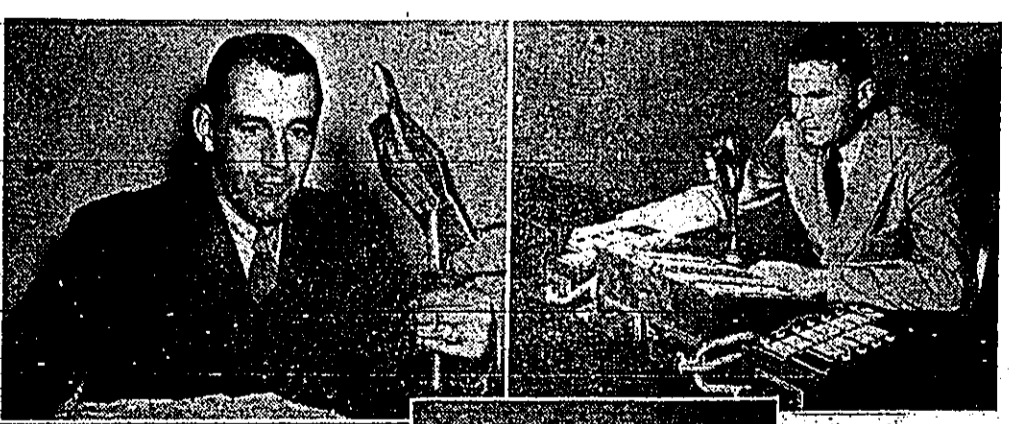

WONDER WHO originated the plan that brides should sport "something blue" in their wedding costume. Well, they do, in this day and age. The average wedding outfit for the bride has approximately \$5.45 in hidden taxes concealed in the retail price of the average \$50 bridal gown and veil.

ANDREWS COUNTY Who knows where it is? Who also knows no PWA funds were dispersed in that county? The total time debt amounts to \$2.82 for every \$100 of assessed valuation. This in contrast with the State average net debt of \$15.59 for every \$100 of assessed valuation. Take of your hat and salute Andrews county.

**LIFE OF JACK GARNER**

The Booster received a Press copy of "Mr. Garner of Texas" by Marquis James, and after reading it, feel that we are more proud of our vice-president than we were before, if that is possible.

NO LAW AGAINST FREE RIDES

There's still no law against private citizens having railway and bus passes. This was pointed out by officials in Austin following a ruling by the Attorney General that only designated employees of the Railroad Commission, and no others, were entitled to ride the buses and trains free of all charge. An official said the ruling did not extend to private citizens. The bus companies raised the question, presumably in protest against having to issue so many free rides.

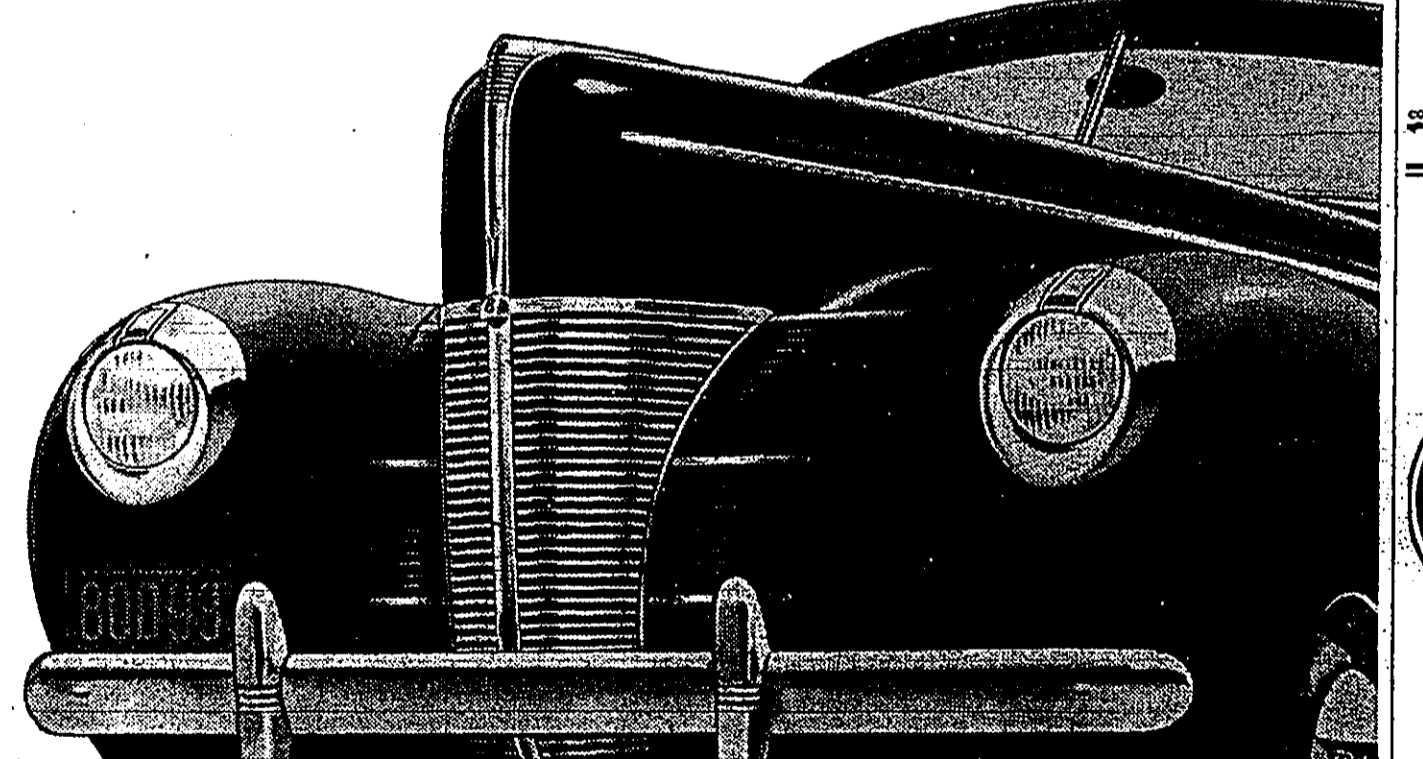

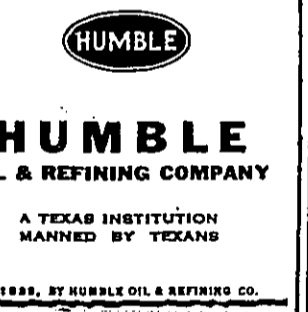

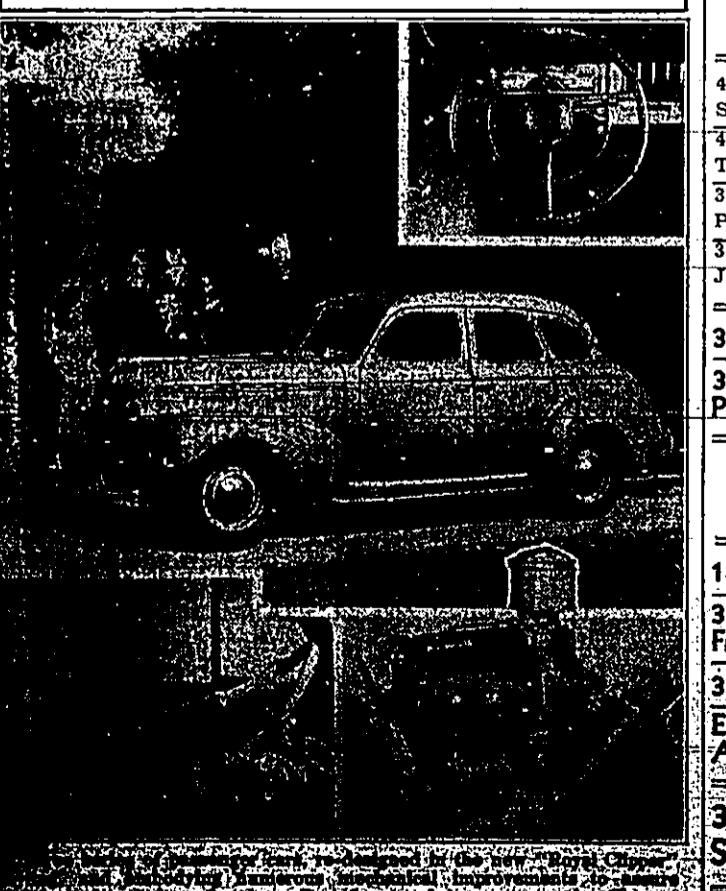

## Historic Hoaxes

## Flight Over the Atlantic

Nearly three-quarters of a century before Charles A. Lindbergh thrilled the whole world by flying across the Atlantic, that feat was accomplished—in the imagination of an American newspaper man. His name was Edgar Allan Poe (later famous as a poet) who in 1835 had printed the first installment of a fanciful tale about a trip to the moon before Richard Adams Locke's "moon hoax" appeared in the New York Sun.

But in 1844 when he wrote an account of the crossing of the Atlantic by a group of men in three days in a balloon or flying machine called the Victoria, he found that the public was just as gullible as it had been nine years earlier. His yarn, also published in the New York Sun, captured the imagination of the public and there was a great demand for copies of that paper.

Even when Poe explained that his tale was imaginary, many people insisted upon believing it was true. Later Poe said, "If the Victoria did not absolutely accomplish the voyage recorded, it will be difficult to assign a reason why she should not have accomplished it. In view of developments in aviation which were to come within the next 75 years, Poe wasn't a bad prophet!"
