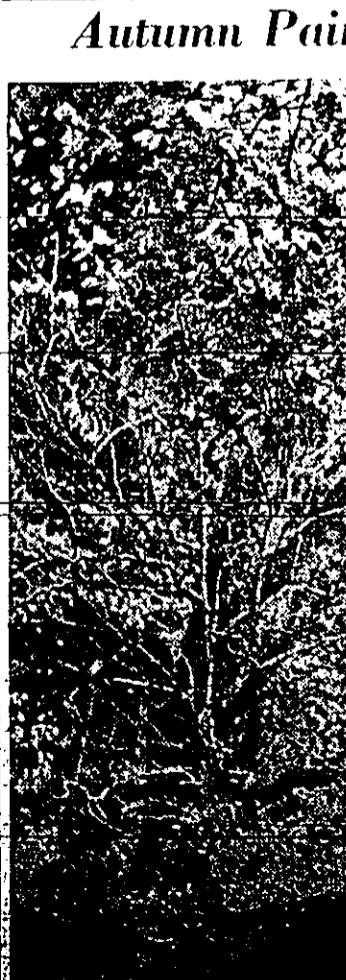

"Of course, no driver wants to ruin a child or kill one of these little children. But carelessness and negligence and drink can get the job done before its awful reality is registered in your mind. Then follows a life of regret. Always will haunt you, the memory of the mangled body of what a few moments before was a boy or girl, in vigorous health and with vaulting ambition—probably a future president of the United States.

"Your business can't be so rushing, nor your time so valuable that you can't lose the minute or two necessary to observe every rate of precaution near these school buildings. Salute Young America with the red traffic flag. He is the guardian of the status-quo of tomorrow. His charges are those who a generation hence will have their names written upon fame's eternal scroll. Upon his charges depends the perpetuity of a republic. Surely your patriotism, your sense of the value of these, aside from the heartache you will cause some parent, will be sufficient for you to drive carefully near schools."

Sanitary Method of Churning Butter
In parts of South America, butter is still made in a most primitive fashion. Indians, on their burro's haunches, sit behind cans of cream hanging over the animal's sides. When they have arrived at their customer's homes, the cream has been so thoroughly jugged up and down that it has turned to butter. Ready to deliver orders, the Indians thrust their hands into the cream, lift out a buttery mass and put it into a cloth dangling in a basket on the side of the burro. Moisture is then

...stopped for several minutes and is found yellow. Jump in the line. They insist so good that he told his friends, who put their milk bags on their horses and proceeded to gallop madly until the butter was churned. All butter was made this way until a man invented a simple churn.
Fresh butter was not always preferred. Our ancient ancestors, lacking refrigerating conveniences, developed a taste for food that was spoiled. They not only wanted aged butter, but to make sure it was sufficiently aged, would often plant a tree over a cache of butter which was left buried in the ground for as long as a hundred years or more.
