GERMAN BANN ON BOSTON PAPER
Boston, June 5.—An editorial published in the Boston Traveler on May 18, which was critical of Adolph Hitler and his methods of warfare, brought a letter from the German Consul in Boston refusing any further information to that paper, it was announced June 4.
The letter, addressed to the City Editor on the letterhead of the German Consulate and signed by an attache under the words "The German Consul," was as follows:
"This Consulate has read the editorial 'Let us be realistic' published in your paper of May 28, in which the head of a nation, with whom the United States of America entertains diplomatic relations, is insulted in such unenviable expressions, that this Consulate in the future must refuse to give your paper any information in whatever matter it may be."

The editorial, reprinted by the paper today, denounced Hitler personally and said he would "never be beaten by the rules of civilized warfare." It added:
"Hitler and his bullies stop at nothing to destroy their victims. We Americans are innocent victims. Then let us stop at nothing in preparing our defenses. Let us get over our squeamishness and get tough. Hitler and his banditry to torture their victims with threats of terrifying 'new' and secret weapons." So what in the name of common sense should we do?
We know that there is loose upon the face of the earth a force that seems every principle that in conscience we believe to be divine. This mad force must be restrained.
"Plainly it is man's duty to defend the eternal verities."
No comment on the Traveler letter or editorial could be obtained at the German Consulate today. An attache said that no authoritative spokesman was at the Consulate nor could one be reached by telephone.
