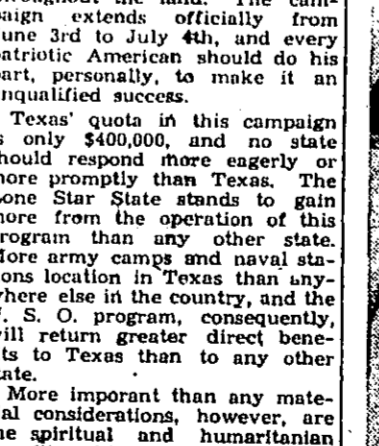

### BARNES - SEAMANS REUNION JUNE 1ST

The third annual combined reunion of the Barnes and Seamans families, two pioneer clans of the northern part of Tyler county, was held on Sunday, June 1st. This year the reunion was a happy one because of the presence of a church near Chester in a community where practically everyone is related to both families.

Although the number of guests did not exceed the number who attended, leaders of the two families know that every section of Texas and perhaps beyond in some instances were represented in the great crowd of more than 300.

Neighbors for nearly a century the Barnes and Seamans families have lived in the northwest section of Tyler county for several generations. There have been intermarriages between the groups decided three years ago to have one reunion instead of two.

This year the deference to the Barnes family was observed as the reunion was held at the Enon Baptist church for most of the Seaman's family are in the Enon Baptist church.
