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AUGUST 1 IS DEADLINE FOR SCHOOL TRANSFERS

Tomorrow is deadline for parents to secure transfers of their children from one school district to another within the county, or from counties adjoining Tyler County. Parents are cautioned that if they reside in a district where their child's grade is taught, yet transfer him to another district, they are liable for tuition charges from the school to which he was transferred.

Under these circumstances, parents should make definite arrangements with the superintendent of the district to which the child was transferred, concerning tuition arrangements. In other words, when a district provides a grade and it is not taken advantage of, but the child is transferred to another district, the trustees of the home district are absolved of any responsibility for paying the child's tuition.

No transfers should be asked for unless the parent is certain that the child will actually be sent to the school to which the transfer is requested.

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## "STRIKE NOW" URGES NATION

New York, July 22.—Special to Christian Science Monitor.—In a Nation-wide drive to keep American attention focused on the necessity of maintaining the supply lines to Britain, the Committee to Defend America has inaugurated "Battle of the Atlantic" Week, to start immediately.

Open-air meetings will be sponsored by the Committee's 800 chapters, while churches, theatres, civic clubs, veterans' organizations, trade union councils, and patriotic groups are expected to co-operate. Petitioners are urging President Roosevelt to use the Navy to assure safe delivery of American-made airplanes, tanks, and guns were to be circulated at mass meetings by street speakers, and in some localities by house-to-house canvass.

The Committee to Defend America, in an advance statement declared the week's activities would seek to drive home these points to America:

1. From 10 to 15 per cent of lease-lend cargoes are being sunk.

2. Despite lessening of ship losses in the month of June, 115 U.S. and British merchant and British replacements combined.

3. Whatever happens in other theaters of war, Hitler's chief menace to American safety is through the Battle of the Atlantic.

4. The Gallup poll shows the American people by 3 to 1 to feel that President Roosevelt, who promised all necessary steps to see that American cargoes reach Britain, has not gone far enough.

Hitler's attack upon Russia is but an interlude in his war for world conquest, the Committee added. "If he can quickly drive the Russians out of Ukraine and the Caucasus, he will have unlimited supplies of oil and other raw materials which will enable him to attack Britain and the United States."

Now is the time, while the major German forces are engaged in fighting Russia, for Britain and the United States to strike. Now is the time for the United States to take over the job of clearing the Atlantic so that British naval forces can strike elsewhere. Now is the time for the American Navy to sink on sight German submarines, surface raiders, and planes that are trying to destroy the American-British life-line and to gain command of the seas for Hitler.

FIRE PRICE INCREASE IS O. K. BY GOVERNMENT

Price Administrator Leon Henderson said increases of not more than 5% in wholesale prices of automobile tires and tubes had been justified by the tire manufacturers. He disclosed that his office was making an investigation to establish and maintain a stable and permanent price basis for the tire industry.

It has been demonstrated, Henderson said, that material costs have increased production expenses by as much as 10% in the last few months. While tire manufacturers have been able to obtain relief from higher volume of business, he added, this volume is now being curtailed because of restriction in crude rubber consumption.

## American Federation Of Labor Bans Strikes

The office of production management has announced a stabilization agreement has been reached between the Government and 800,000 members of the American Federation of Labor building trade unions calling for no strike on defense projects for the duration of the emergency.

Associate OPM Director-General Sidney Hillman said the agreement assured continuous work on Army, Navy and defense housing projects during the life of the defense program.

Hillman said that although only 800,000 workers were directly involved, terms of the agreement possibly would extend to almost 1,500,000 workers employed on projects related to the armament program.

FAIR TRADE MEETS OPPOSITION

"Farewell to fair trade," says Denton Sleeping Garment Mills of Centerville, Mich., in an announcement that its resale price maintenance contracts in 44 states are all being cancelled. It didn't work, says the president of Denton Mills. Dealers concentrated their local advertising on competing non-union brands which could be offered at special prices. Sales in all sections fell off in 1940. This repeats certain experiences in the food field. Although the demand for fair trade regulation stems largely from some of the retail traders, retailers themselves are often the means of defeating it.

In a recent stand-on to the TNEC, John Edwards, assistant to the director, Thurman Arnold of the Department of Justice, takes a swat at "fair trade" legislation in a classic example of the use of misrepresentation by a pressure group, says Edwards. He recommended repeal of the Miller-Tydings anti-competitive laws being an aid to the independent retailer against the chains, they are a handicap he maintained.

In the drug field specifically, he said this new control serves to believe the chains from the free competition of independent channels through which "fastmoving packaged drugs can reach the consumer at low prices.—The Nation's Business, for May, 1941.

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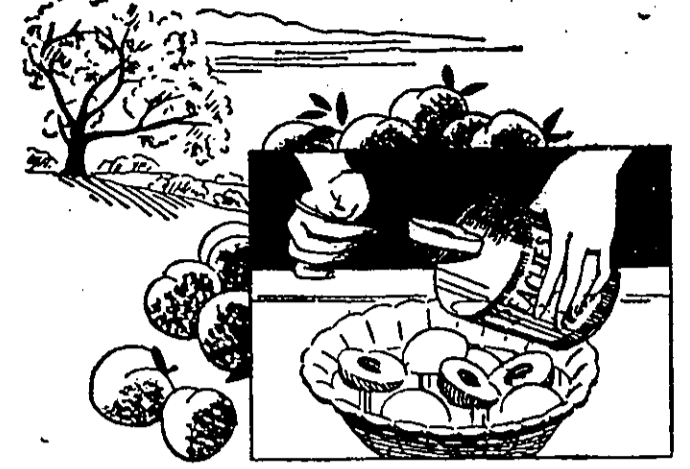
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## Peaches Are Plentiful
