PETITION FOR ROAD BOND

THE STATE OF TEXAS
County of Tyler,
To The Honorable Commissioners Court of Tyler County, Texas:
We, the undersigned duly qualified resident property taxpayers of Road District No. 6, of Tyler County, Texas, respectfully pray your Honorable Court to order an election to be held in and throughout Road District No. 6 of Tyler County, Texas, to determine:

Whether or Not the bonds of said Road District No. 6 of Tyler County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of EIGHTY (\$80,000) THOUSAND DOLLARS, bearing interest at the rate of not exceeding 4% per annum, and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than 15 years from their date, for the purpose of the construction maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof in said Road District No. 6 of Tyler County, Texas.

AND WHETHER OR NOT ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property in said Road District subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Said Road District No. 6 of Tyler County, Texas, has heretofore been created and established by Special Act of the Forty-Seventh Legislature at its Regular Session, in 1941, and lies entirely in Tyler County, Texas, and is described by metes and bounds as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Tyler County, which is the line between Tyler and Hardin Counties to the west line of the Edna Land Survey, which is also the east line of No. 21, East Texas R. R. Company Survey.

THENCE north along the west line of said Edna Land Survey to the northeast corner of No. 21, East Texas R. R. Company Survey.

THENCE west along the north line of said Survey No. 21 to a southeast corner thereof.

THENCE north along the east line of said Survey No. 21 to an upper corner thereof, which is also an entrance corner of I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 6.

THENCE west to the upper southwest corner of said I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 6.

THENCE north along the west line of said I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 6, and continuing north along the east line of East Texas R. R. Company Survey No. 22 Survey to the northeast corner of said Survey No. 22.

THENCE west to one northeast corner of East Texas R. R. Company Survey No. 22.

THENCE north along the east line of said No. 22 Survey to the southeast corner of East Texas R. R. Company Survey No. 21.

THENCE east along the south line of said Survey No. 21 to the west line of Liberty County school land (lower tract).

THENCE east along the west line of said lower Liberty County school land to its southwest corner.

THENCE east along the south line of said lower Liberty County school land to its southeast corner.

THENCE north along the east line of said lower Liberty County school land to its northeast corner.

THENCE west along the north line of said lower Liberty County school land to the southeast corner of Liberty County School Land No. 9, upper tract.

THENCE north along the east line of said Liberty County School Land No. 9, its northeast corner, and continuing north to the southwest corner of B. B. & C. Railway Survey No. 1.

THENCE east along the north line of said No. 1, the Southwest corner of B. B. & C. Railway Survey No. 1.

THENCE north along the east line of said Survey No. 1 to its northeast corner.

THENCE east along the west line of said I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 4 and S. to the southwest corner of I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 1.

THENCE north along the west line of said I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 1 to the southwest corner of said Survey No. 2.

THENCE east along the south line of said I & G N. R. R. Company Survey No. 2, to the west line of Jno. B. Moser Survey.

THENCE north along the west line of said Jno. B. Moser Survey to its northeast corner.

THENCE east along the north line of said Moser Survey to its northeast corner.

THENCE south to the southwest corner of G. W. Richardson Survey.

THENCE east along the north line of said G. W. Richardson Survey to its northeast corner.

THENCE south along the east line of said G. W. Richardson Survey to the point due west of the north line of E. Jewell Survey.

TEXAS TRUCK DRIVER TO REPORT HIWAY ACCIDENTS

Because of the circumstances under which motor truck and bus services operate, putting drivers on the scene of most every accident on the States highways within a short time of their occurrence is especially helpful in the all-out drive against accidents announced by the State Department of Public Safety, according to Lynn B. Shaw, general manager of the Texas Motor Transportation Association.

Shaw pledged full and complete co-operation in enforcement of the newly enacted accident law and reminded truckers that the law requires drivers to make their reports within 48 hours of the time of an accident's occurrence.

The information gained by the reporting of accidents is not for legal, but for safety purposes, Colonel Hanner Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, told Shaw. The reports will be strictly confidential, to be used only in scientific study and prevention of accidents.

Accuracy in reporting accidents is vital, Shaw warned. Under no circumstances can the report be used by anyone against a driver in court.

25TH BIRTHDAY OF PAPER SALUTED BY THE SENTINEL

Midway between two ticks of the Nacogdoches River in the fall of 1916, the Antonio Margu de Jesus, a Spanish priest, paused in his wanderings, surveyed the rich surroundings and said to his companions: "Here we will build a city."
