Oil Struck In Warren Well But Promoters Withhold Data

Oil was struck in the Warren well being made by the Humble Oil company Thursday of last week.
After penetrating some ten feet of oil bearing sand drilling continued. Drill stem testing showed oil and salt water but no other test has been made and it is generally felt here that the Humble company will stop this well as well as a depth sufficient to make the rough test of all underground strata. When this has been done they will plug back to the most acceptable depth and likely make an acid or other test. However, the well did not come in as a gusher indicating lack of gas pressure and not too large a flow.

Grim Reaper Takes Last Vet; Truck Driver, Others Last Week

It was with sincere sorrow that the learned early Friday morning that Mr. B. Oakley had passed away for we had not known that he was ill as illness had kept us indoors for nearly a day morning that Mrs. B. Oakley, who was one of our best friends and one who looked forward each week to The Booster and enjoyed it. We have heard him tell of joining the "Grays" when he was 16 years old and his experiences as courier for Gen. Bradford Forrest which gave us a word picture, very real of the fight between states. Mr. Oakley was the last one of the Confederate soldiers in this county. He was 96 years of age last fall. At the time of his death he was a captain on the staff of the Confederate Veterans. Funeral services were held Saturday with interment in the Magnolia cemetery. Rev. G. C. Boyd was in charge of the services at the grave. "Uncle Bill," as he was known, was born in Columbia, Ala. After attending school there, he was sent to school in Poughkeepsie-on-the-Hudson, in New York. His first experience in the War Between the States was as a boy when he joined other boys in guarding prisoners at Meridian, Miss., but at the age of 18 he was sworn in Company E-6 of the Alabama Cavalry. He really served in this, soon becoming a courier attached to the personal staff of General Forrest for the remainder of his life in Tyler county. He was a merchant at Potts Bluff and later at Woodville, he was assistant superintendent of the Aldridge Lumber Company, in Jasper County, and then in 1920, he retired to Emig, in Tyler County. Since 1929 he lived in Woodville with his daughter, Mrs. Mattie Hewitt. On February 10, 1879, he was married to Miss Doree Barely, daughter of Robert and Eliza Barely. She died in 1901, and in 1906 he was married to Miss Jane Moore of Livingston, which died in 1936. He was an honorary member of the Alabama Cavalry and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars here and was a member of the Masonic Lodge. He is survived by one son, E. N. Oakley, and three daughters, Mrs. G. C. Saunders and Mrs. E. W. Hargett of Richards and Mrs. Howell of Woodville, six grand-children and six great-grandchildren.

DALLAS MAN IS KILLED IN CRASH NEAR HERE

Mr. Lowe's car was somewhat wrecked and Mr. Pope received numerous bruises and lacerations, requiring medical attention.
Two years ago a Beaumont truck driver was killed in a similar accident at the same spot. Persons who discovered the accident believed the truck-trailer skidded in drizzling rain at the top of a slight hill and plummeted off the road, crashing against a tree eight feet from the roadbed. The trailer apparently hurtled over the cab of the truck.
The victim suffered a crushed chest, a fractured skull and other injuries. The body was cared for by the Oakley-Metcalf funeral home.
The brother was taken to the Woodville hospital in an Oakley Metcalf ambulance. He was in semi-conscious condition for some hours and x-ray pictures were to be taken.
The attending physician said he was suffering from concussion, shock, cuts and bruises and a possible fracture. It was expected he would recover.

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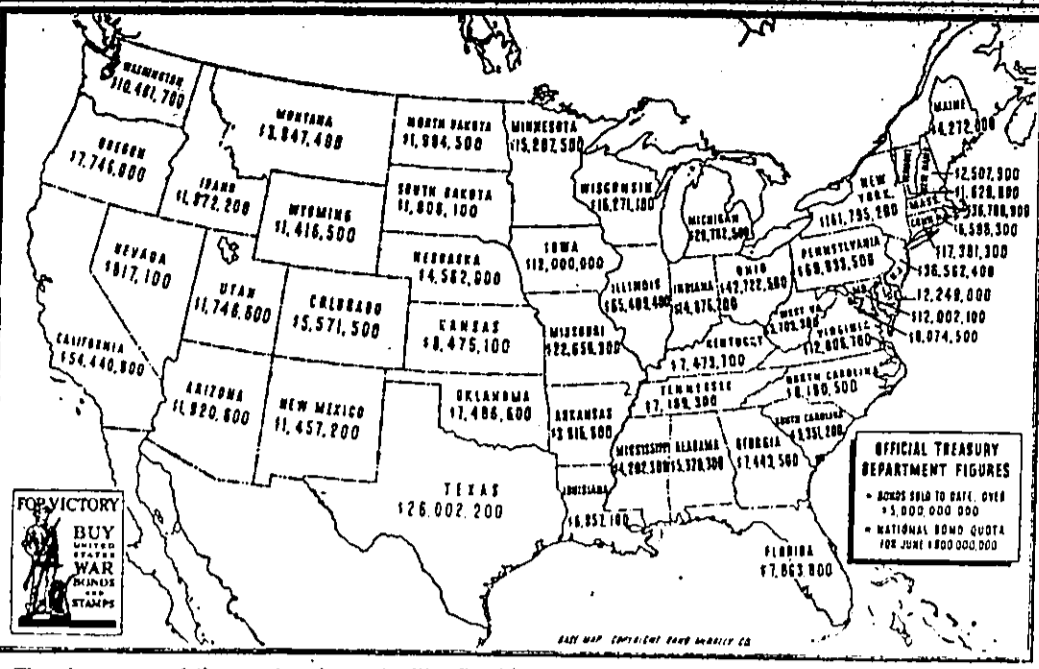
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Official U. S. Treasury War Bond Quotas for June



The above map of the country shows the War Bond Quota by states for the month of June totalling \$800,000,000. Everybody every day is expected to invest at least ten per cent of his income in War Bonds to aid in financing America's offensive against the Axis powers.

The ultimate quota for the nation will be on a basis of one billion dollars per month effective in July. This sum is necessary to provide for all-out production of planes, guns, ships and munitions adequate to arm our fighting men with the tools necessary to win the war.

EXPENSE FOR WOODVILLE SCHOOL BY EAST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Woodville's school expense for 1940-41 amounted to \$42,705 and was equal to \$58.34 per pupil in average daily attendance, according to the East Texas Chamber of Commerce which was received by the school board this week.

This compares with \$44,207 expense of 1939-40, which figured out \$61.83 per pupil in average daily attendance.

Expense this year was budgeted by the school board at \$44,927.

Included in expense are the general classifications administration, instruction, school plant operation, transportation, auxiliary agencies, and debt service.

New construction, new sites acquired, and principal payments of debt are not included as "expense" in the analysis.

Budget making time for the school district is almost here again. The new budget must be ready in July. A public hearing on the budget is required by law.

War conditions are expected by the East Texas Chamber to cause drastic reductions in available funds for public schools for the duration.

NOTE: We have on file the same data for Danette and Colmesneil schools and carried out in detail, for which we do not have space for publication.
