RAILROAD SETS NEW AGE LIMIT
The Texas State Board of Railroad Safety, created by the Legislature in 1937, has announced a new age limit for the employment of children and young persons in the railroad industry. The new law, which became effective on September 1, 1942, prohibits the employment of children under the age of 16 in any position on a railroad.

SINGING IN LUFKIN
Singers from Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas will gather in Lufkin Saturday, Oct. 24th for a "pre-gasoline rationing" Tri-State Singing convention. The event is expected to attract several thousand singers and enthusiasts for the three states. Held twice annually the convention brought a crowd to Shreveport this spring that filled the big city auditorium there.

UNION KILLS WAR EFFORT
Five large tractor-tractors which should have been hauling vital freight have been standing idle in Philadelphia for two months, while two locals of the Teamsters Union have been engaged in a squabble over whether Philadelphia of Baltimore teamsters should drive them. The Office of Defense Transportation has been appealed to by officials of the Maryland Motor Truck Association for action to get the vehicles back into service.

HABIT IS KILLING MORE TODAY THAN EVER
Habit is killing a lot of Texas people. A survey by state police statisticians showed that accidents involving trains and motor vehicles increased from 2,037 of the total in the first eight months of 1941 to 4,987 of the total in the same period this year. This was an increase of 86%. And why were 58 persons thus killed in the last eight months? It's because the victims—mostly farmers and truck drivers and tradesmen, have failed to realize that train schedules aren't what they used to be. They're people who used to know when the trains ran, and they never bothered to look for a train unless one was due. But now troop and supply trains come whizzing by at all hours, and these people are being hit and killed by trains that weren't supposed to be there—according to their subconscious reckonings.

IS THE SCRAP DEALER ESSENTIAL TO SUCCESS?
Yes, he is vitally essential—as a matter of fact he plays one of the most important roles. There is no one connected with the drive other than the scrap dealer who would know how to segregate, grade, process and properly prepare the 75 different grades of scrap metal for shipment. Some steel mills require certain grades of scrap metal while others require an entirely different grade. Through years of experience the steel mills have depended upon the scrap dealers for the proper allocation and shipment of scrap metal and the purpose of this nation-wide drive would be defeated if his professional assistance was not available. Do not be misled by the idle rumors concerning the profit the scrap dealer is realizing from this drive. Remember, this is his business just the same as it is the business of manufacturers to manufacture war goods—he is actually a scrap metal manufacturer. Instead of bemoaning his participation—give him credit for doing a necessary part of the drive and encourage him to do it better.

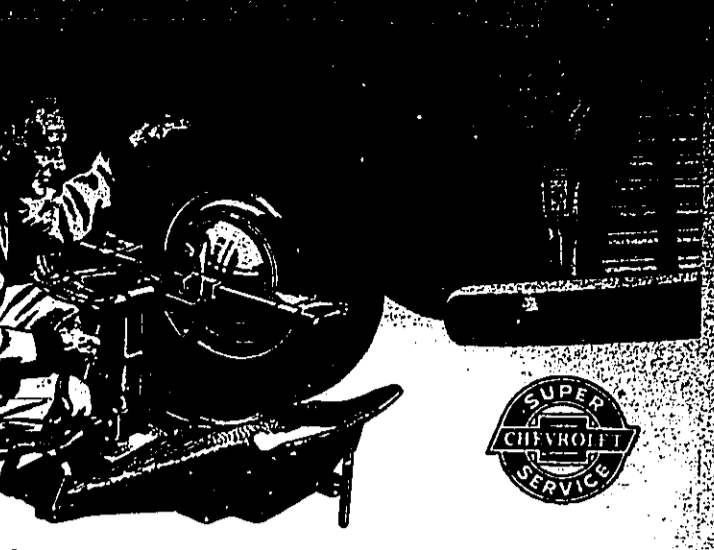
