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## New RESTRICTIONS ON PARCELS TO BOYS OVERSEAS

No parcel shall be accepted for mailing to personnel of the U. S. Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard who are stationed overseas. Weight more than 6 pounds, or 6 inches in length or width, or 36 inches in length and girth combined. This includes parcels addressed in care of the Postmaster of New York, N. Y., or San Francisco, Cal. For the present, it is not necessary that an accepted parcel be obtained from the addresser before parcels may be mailed to naval personnel overseas but not later than a parcel within those limits of weight and size shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by air or by rail for some period of concern in or for the same address. No perishable article shall be accepted for such parcels.


