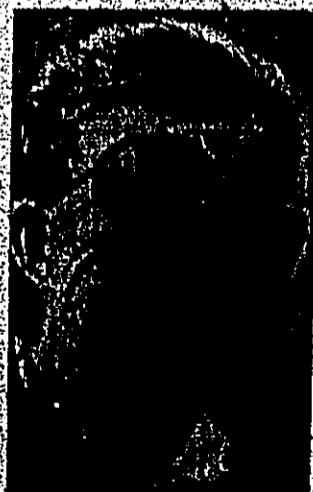

The ALLIED VICTORY in North Africa

SMASHING with an impact that not only devastated many of the Axis' carefully prepared battle positions, the new German 200,000, Guderian, and other troops to total victory in Tunisia north Africa. More than 125,000 of the German Afrika Korps and 10,000 crack formations laid down arms in unconditional surrender. Another 100,000 more were killed in action.

At the Allied Headquarters in North Africa, Gen. E. Thea, International News Bureau correspondent, said of the battle:

The new smashing result of the attack took the breath out of the Axis. It was the last of the attacking out-of-the-ordinary, not a simple, but a smashing, surprise attack. The German General Guderian, one of the great military strategists of the world, led his army through the Levant and France to the English Channel.

Victory in 100 Days
Six months and four days after the Allied landing in North Africa, conquering American, British and French troops reaped their final triumph and paved the way for new operations against the Mediterranean islands and final invasion of the European continent itself. For the Axis it was a complete, disastrous and humiliating defeat.

The capture of more than 275,000 prisoners and the fact that no more than a handful of soldiers escaped, the Allied armies was a triumph that was achieved just six days before victory and under the leadership of Axis resistance in light-armor drives to Tunis and Thierse.

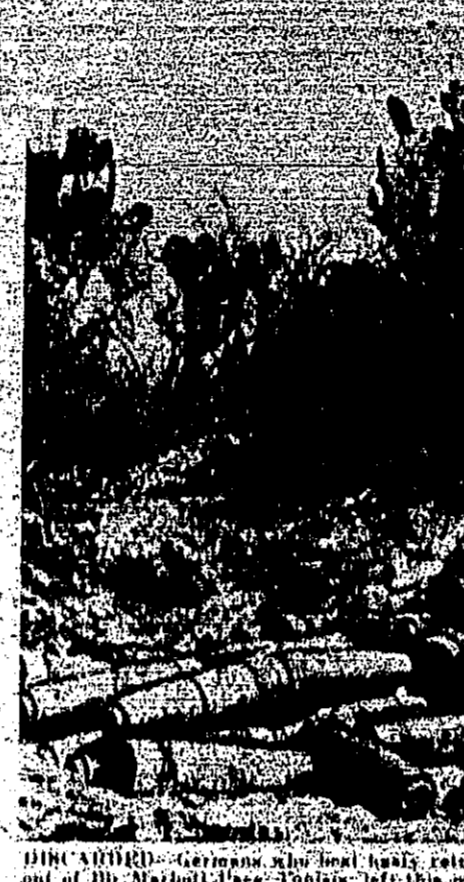

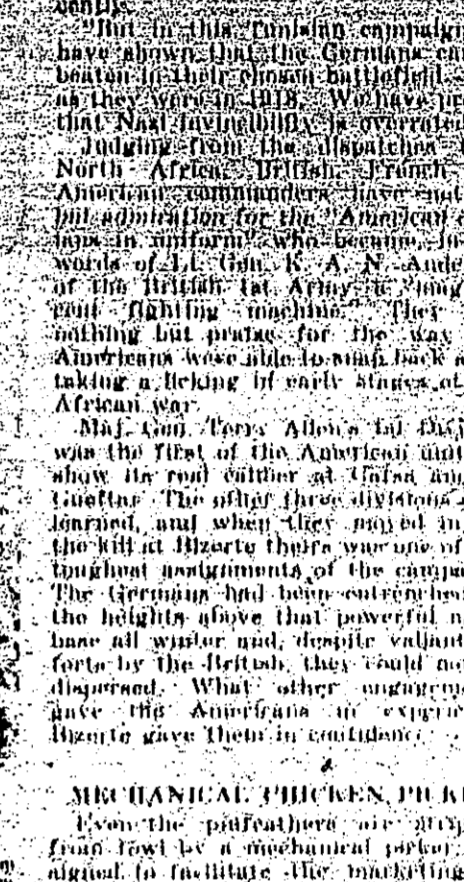

ATTU, Aleutian Island Captured by Americans

When the United States bought Alaska from Russia in 1867 for \$7,200,000, the deal included the Aleutian Islands, a chain of small islands in the North Pacific which extend westward about 1,200 miles from the Alaskan peninsula to the peninsula of Kamchatka, a province of Soviet Russia.

Soon after the Pearl Harbor attack, Japan occupied two of the Aleutian Islands, Adak and Agatsuma, and strongly fortified them with anti-aircraft artillery and a heavy force of anti-aircraft fighters.

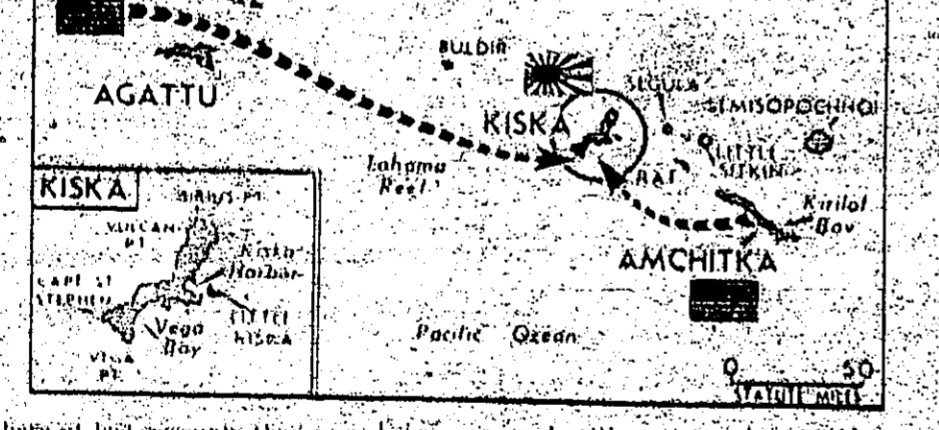

400-Passenger Plane Under Construction

A NAMMOCU passenger airplane which will hold 400 passengers is under construction by the Consolidated-Village Aircraft Company at Los Angeles, Harry Woodhead, president of the company, revealed. Disclosing plans for building the huge plane to a meeting of the Aviation Forum, Woodhead said he was not permitted to release details of its design. He said, however, that a full-sized wooden replica had been made and pronounced satisfactory.

"I would like to tell a few fantastic facts which the engineers in charge of design have given me in connection with this airplane," Woodhead said. "The Department of War is building it."

"The War Department reported that 18,000 aircraft are in the first 100,000 who reported production contracts under the Army evacuation."

"Before this group reached the industrial centers, however, some 22 per cent of the airplanes were destroyed by local medical examining boards," Woodhead said. "This percentage represents a high cost of production in the World War period."

Of the 18,000 airplanes, the Army bought 12,000 for use in military operations, both in Europe and in the Pacific.

New Superbomber
A new superbomber, the Flying Fortress and Liberator, is being developed by the Army Air Corps. The new aircraft, designed by Charles F. Gable, executive vice president of the War Production Administration, will have a range of 10,000 miles and will be able to carry 10,000 pounds of bombs. It will be able to fly at 45,000 feet and will have a top speed of 400 miles per hour. The aircraft will be built in a number of variants, including a bomber, a transport, and a reconnaissance plane. The aircraft will be built by the Douglas Aircraft Company.

April Production in Excess of 100,000

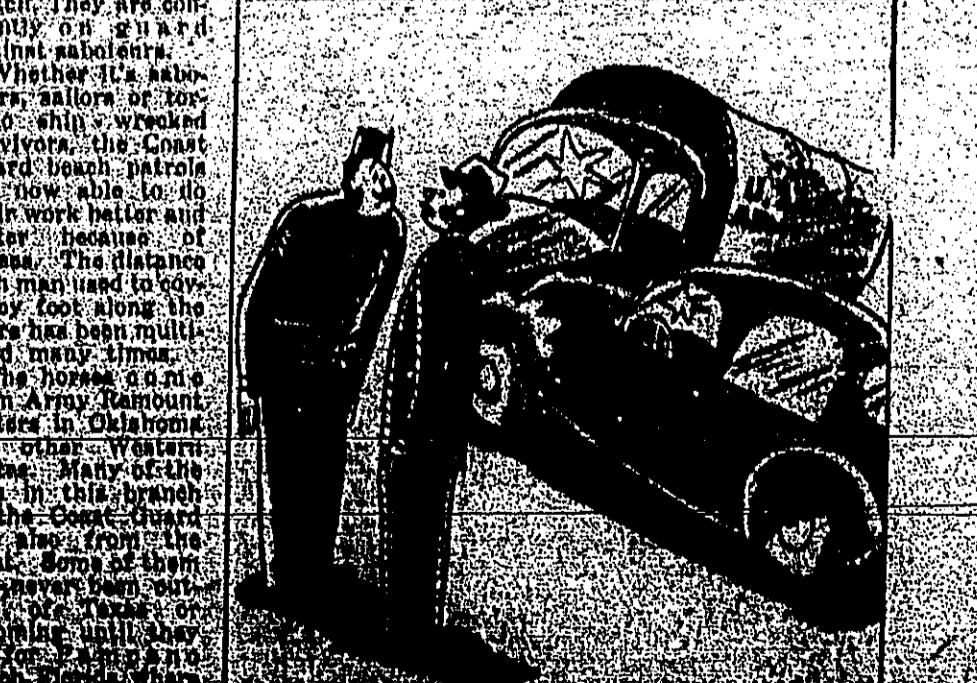

OLD QUEFFEE LAW REVIVED

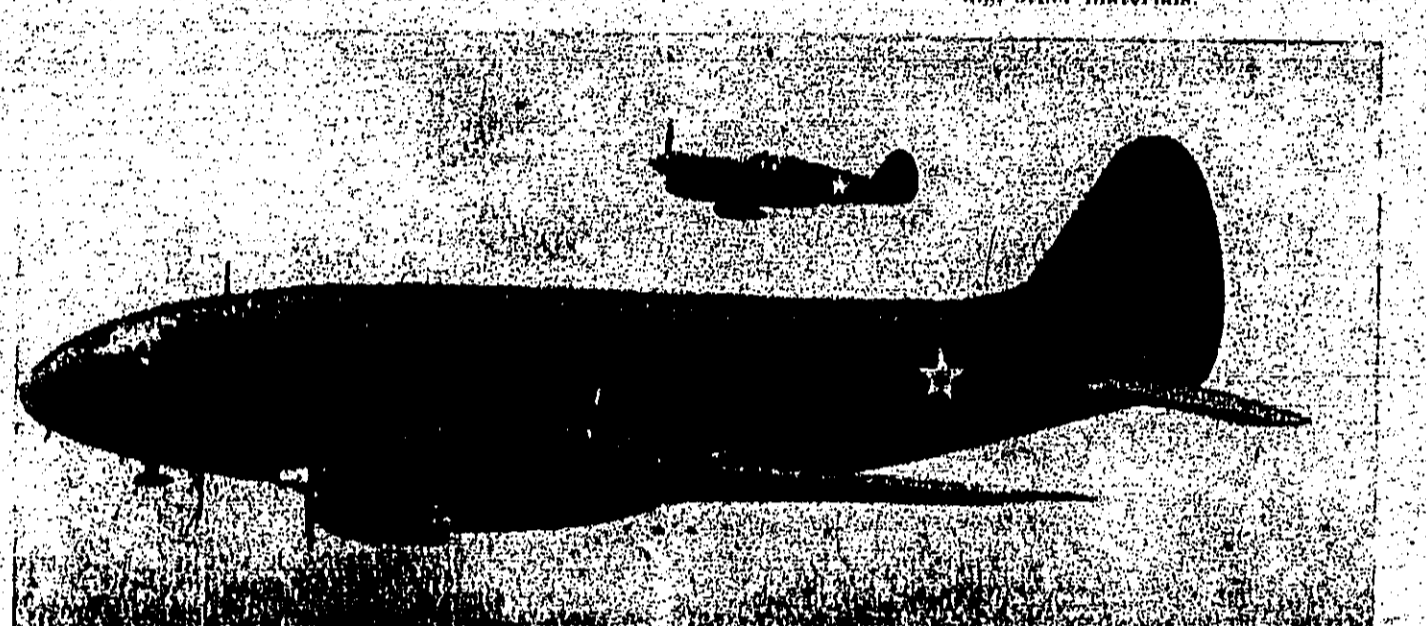

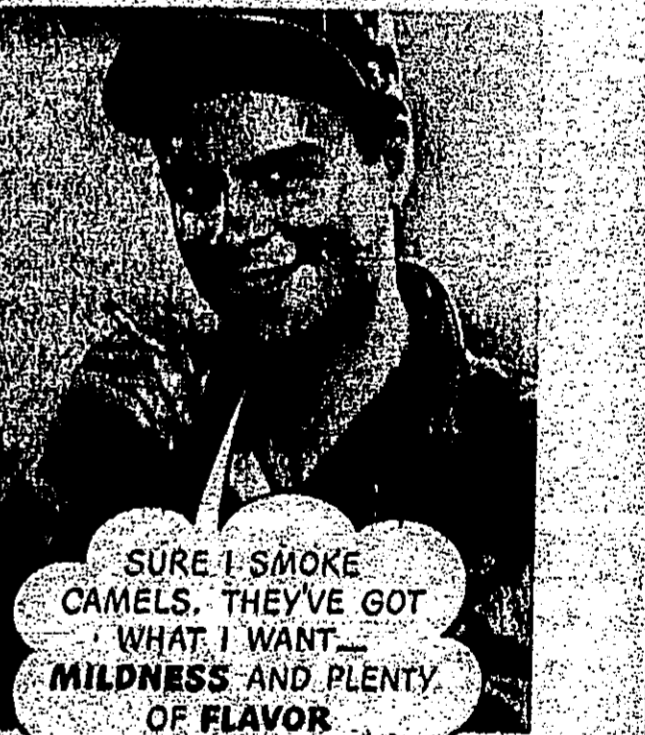

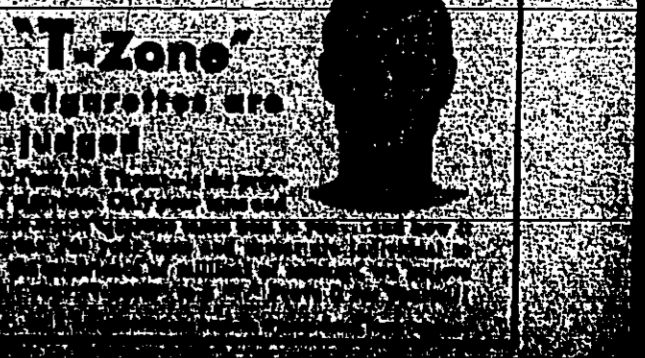
