





To our wounded fighting men who are invaded by frightful infections, this drug means hope and happiness. For penicillin is a heavy-weight champion in the battle against infection. For example, in some cases penicillin is almost 200 times as effective as the sulfadiazine.

Martin Willinger, of Austin, will receive doctor of philosophy degree from Harvard at the age of 14. He was the youngest student ever to enroll in University of Texas and was a freshman there at 12. His father is a member of the University of Texas faculty.

EDUCATION COSTS

Thirty-four cents out of each dollar spent by the State of Texas goes for education. Second biggest item on the State's budget is public welfare, including pensions, which takes 20 cents. Highways and roads cost 23 cents. One of these three items during the last fiscal year was about \$185,000,000.
