PIONEER DAYS IN COUNTY IS JOGWOOD FESTIVAL THEME

Parade To Be Big, Colorful

This year's Dogwood Festival parade likely will be the largest and most colorful in the 20-year history of the event.

John Smitley, parade chairman, said this week that there will be more floats entered in the parade this year and that it will likely be a mile and one-half long.

The parade consistently draws the largest crowd of the festival events, and has become longer and better each year.

The parade, which starts at 2:30 p. m., will form in a new place this year because of street work underway in the west part of the city, Mr. Smitley said. Entries are to line up on Pecan street south of Bluff street. This is near the new football field.

CORONATION IS A MANY SPLENDORED FESTIVAL PART

Presentation of the royal court and crowning of the 1963 queen will be the opening feature of the program at the amphitheatre beginning at 7:00 p. m.


