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PIONEER DAYS IN COUNTY IS DOGWOOD FESTIVAL THEME

Parade To Be Big, Colorful

This year's Dogwood Festival parade likely will be the largest and most colorful in the 20-year history of the event.

John Smitley, parade chairman, said this week that there will be more floats entered in the parade this year and that it will likely be a mile and one-half long.

The parade consistently draws the largest crowd of the festival events, and has become longer and better each year.

The parade, which starts at 2:30 p. m., will form in a new place this year because of street work underway in the west part of the city, Mr. Smitley said. Entries are to line up on Pecan street south of Bluff street. This is near the new football field.

The parade will follow its usual course east on Bluff street to the red light on Magnolia. Here it is to turn north to the vicinity of the school grounds, where it will end.

This year's parade marshal will be Attorney General Waggoner Carr. Color bearers will be W.G. Crews and Paul Walker.

Bands in the parade will include the Sam Houston State College's marching band plus about 15 area bands.

One of the new floats will be an entry by the Woodville Chamber of Commerce on which will ride last year's queen, Miss Pamela Mills, daughter of Mrs. Ozro Mills of Woodville.

Trail Riders To Head For City

Two groups of trail riders will converge on Woodville Saturday for the Dogwood Festival parade.

A new group, the Tri-County Dogwood Trek Riders, will ride in from Spurger. They will leave at 3 p.m. Friday and spend the night at the DeCordova Ranch. Saturday morning they will break camp at 7 a.m. and ride in to Woodville in time for the parade.

Scheduled to be in this group are the Hardin County Sheriff's Posse, Silsbee Riding Club, Newton County Trail Riders and many others from Tyler county.

The Livingston Trail Riders will again make the trip. The Camden Trail Riders with covered wagons and huge oxen will also come

CORONATION IS A MANY SPLENDORED FESTIVAL PART

Presentation of the royal court and crowning of the 1963 queen will be the opening feature of the program at the amphitheatre, beginning at 7:00 p. m.

For the five princesses of Tyler County, from whom the queen is chosen, this will be a tense and exciting half hour.

The coronation starts with introduction of the 33 duchesses and their escorts from area cities.

Then comes the introduction of the princesses--and by process of elimination the audience sometimes knows the identity of the queen. The princesses are introduced in alphabetical order of the town each represents beginning with Chester.

The princesses, who were selected by the King's Men from the 10 semi-finalists, are:

The queen will be crowned by Waggoner Carr, attorney general of the state of Texas.

CAST OF 150 TO PORTRAY SETTLERS IN TYLER COUNTY

All roads will lead to Woodville Saturday for the annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival.

The three main events of the festival—the parade, coronation and pageant—are expected to be seen by the largest crowds in the history of the event.

The parade will begin at 2:30 Saturday afternoon. This part of the festivities will be witnessed by as many as 10,000 spectators, depending upon the weather.

The coronation ceremonies begin at 7:00 p. m., followed by the pageant. These events, in the outdoor amphitheatre, will be seen by an estimated 4,000 persons.

The coronation program will be opened with an organ prelude by Al Sacker. An orchestra prelude by the Kirby High Stage Band directed by Cone Clark will follow. Mrs. C. N. Pickett will sing "I Heard a Forest Praying."

Welcome to the audience and participants will be given by the president of the Dogwood Association, James E. Wheat. Master of ceremonies will be Josiah Wheat, executive director of the event.

Following the presentation of the duchesses and princesses, the coronation of the king and queen will conclude this part of the program.

The queen will be crowned by the Honorable Waggoner Carr, attorney general of Texas.

After she ascends her throne, a salute will be sung by the Sam Houston State Teachers College Choir, directed by Wayne Roe.

A reading, "Legend of the Dogwood," will be given by Joe Kelley, Jr., with the scene enacted by dancing pupils of Mrs. Virginia Van Horn, and with a couple played by Linda Williams and Bill Weatherford.

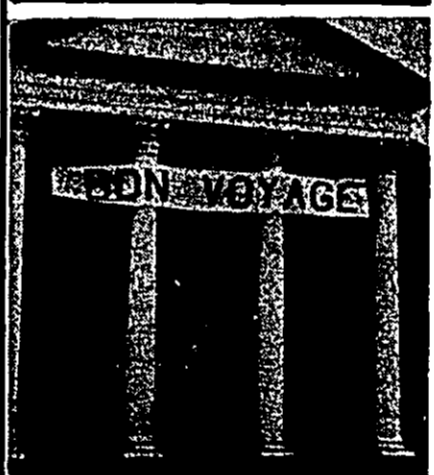
Special music by the Sam Houston State College Choir will end the coronation ceremonies.

Fishing 'Rodeo' Starts April 1

Tyler County's First Annual Fishing Round-up will get under way Monday morning and run to April 21.

The contest is open to the public, and trophies will be awarded on the closing day, April 21.

Fish caught in all public waters in Tyler county are eligible. All of Dam B Lake is included, including waters up the Angelina River to Bevilport.

Any person entering the contest must fill out an application blank before going fishing. The blanks are available at all Woodville business places and at officially designated weigh-in stations.

Fish which may be caught and entered in the contest are bass, catfish, crappie, bream and gar.

Trophies will be awarded for the largest fish of any one species, and for the heaviest catch of any species in any one day. In addition, prizes will be awarded in a junior division for the largest fish and the smallest fish.

The junior division is for boys and girls from one to 12 years of age. Since all state fish laws must be observed, the smallest bass will have to be seven inches long and the smallest catfish eleven inches.

The contest is sponsored by the Woodville Chamber of Commerce. Trophies will be awarded on April 21 at 3 p. m. in Cherokee Park on the south side of the highway.

RULES:

- Contest dates are April 1 to April 21, 1963.
- BOUNDARIES: All public waters and streams of Tyler County, all of Dam B Lake including waters up the Angelina River to Bevilport.
- Any person holding Commercial Fishing License will not be eligible.
- Owners of weigh-in stations will not be eligible.
- Persons must fill out application blank to be eligible before going fishing. Blanks may be picked up at weigh-in stations and business places in Woodville.
- Contest judges will decide any arguments, any point in question or settle any claims concerning honesty of catches. Other than this, the contest will be run on your honor.
- All State Fish Laws must be observed, including limit rules:

BASS	7 inches	15
CATFISH	11 inches	25
CRAPPIE	None	25
BREAM	None	None
GAR	None	None
- In case of same weight of two fish of the same species, the first one weighed in will win.
- Trophies will be given to the largest fish of any one species. Trophies will be given to the anglers with the heaviest catch of any species in any one day. Trophies will be given in the Junior Division (boys and girls 1 year to 12 years of age) who catches the biggest fish and the smallest fish (bass has to be 7 inches long and catfish 11 inches long).
- No type of gill, tramble, or hoop net will be permitted in contest.
- Trophies will be given to the winners of the contest on Sunday, April 21 at 3:00 p. m. on Dam B Lake in the Cherokee Park, South side of Highway 190.
- Contest will close Sunday, April 21, at 12 Noon. All fish must be weighed in by 12:01 p. m. on April 21.

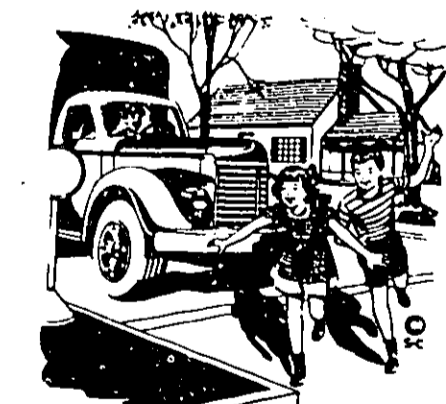
