Cancer Fund Drive On Here

The Tyler County chapter of the American Cancer Society is now conducting its annual fund drive, according to Dr. R. E. Swearingen, president of the county chapter.

Dr. Swearingen said that the public is becoming increasingly aware of the urgency of the cancer problem. He pointed out that this year at least 44,000 persons will be saved who would have been lost had they developed the disease ten years ago. More than 1,200,000 Americans now alive are cured of cancer.

However, Dr. Swearingen said, if the present rate continues about 88,000 men, women and children

The first annual Tyler County Fishing Round-Up will end Sunday at noon, and trophies will be awarded at Cherokee Park beginning at 3:00 p. m.

The contest, which is sponsored by the Woodville Chamber of Commerce, began on April 1.

A total of 14 trophies will be awarded, plus a number of prizes to be given by merchants.

Five species of fish are eligible to be entered in the contest. They are bass, catfish, crappie, bream and gar. A trophy will be awarded for the largest fish caught in each category. A trophy will be given for the heaviest catch in one day in each category.

Two junior division trophies are offered, one for the largest catch and one for the smallest catch.

Two special trophies will go to elderly men and women entered in the contest.

Gene Samford, chairman of the chamber's fishing round-up committee, said Wednesday that the heaviest bass registered so far in the contest weighed seven pounds and five ounces.

Mr. Samford also reminded everyone that there are still nearly three days left to enter the contest. It does not close until noon Sunday.

Persons wanting to enter are reminded that they must register at any weigh-in station and be assigned a number for the contest if they haven't already done so.

Entries in this first contest have been as well as expected, Samford said, as the contest had to be started without too much time for planning or publicity. The chamber plans to make this an annual event, and it is expected to develop into a real attraction for fishermen of Southeast Texas.

GARDEN CLUB SETS SHOW APRIL 26

The Woodville Garden Club's annual Spring Flower Show will be held April 26 at the Methodist Church from 3 to 8 p. m.

Theme of the show is "Nature's Treasures from Tyler County." It will honor the nine communities in the county, plus Dam B and the log cabin of the president, Mrs. Ethel O. Hill.

Mrs. J. Arthur Smith has been appointed chairman of the show.

Entries in the show should be brought to the church between the hours of 8:30 and 11:00 a. m. on the day of the show.

Classifications in which entries may be made are:

(1) Cherokee Park, arrangement with water in a container.
(2) "Mystic Water Hole of Rockland", rocks with foliage and/or flowers.

(3) "Whispering Pines", arrangement with pine cones, foliage and or flowers.

(4) "Chapel at Peach Tree Village", mass pink arrangement for a church (Chester).

(5) "Come to My Log Cabin for Breakfast", weathered wood with foliage and flowers (honoring the club president, Mrs. Hill).

(6) "Shells from Sheffield's Ferry", an arrangement with shells and fern (Spurger).

(7) "Memories from Nature's Trail", a miscellaneous arrangement (anything from the woods), in memory of Mrs. C. S. Spurlock, Hillister.

(8) "Toys on Parade," children's

arrangement using toys as container.

(9) "Moonlight Over Tejas", a crescent arrangement (Colmesneil).

(10) "Neighbors Do-Set Here", arrangement using fruit or vegetables.

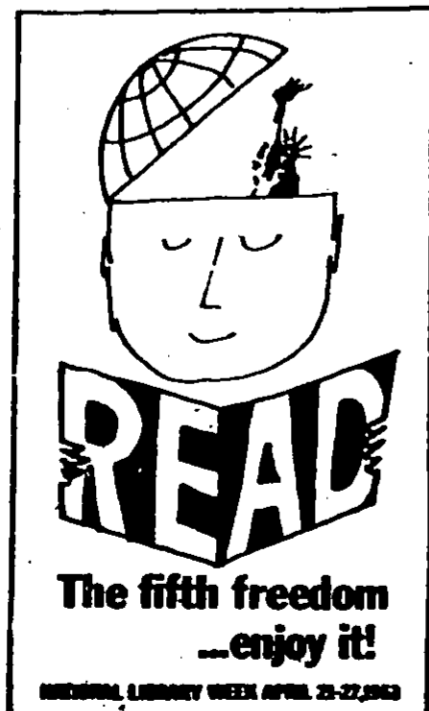
(11) "Good Ole Fred", an arrangement suitable for a man's desk.

(12) "Tiny Jewels", miniature to be not over five inches.

(13) "No Silent Spring", an arrangement using a bird or birds as an accessory.

(14) "Tall, Dark and Handsome", arrangement by a man.

(15) "The Train Rides High", a vertical arrangement (Warren).

The community has placed in the judging for the past two years, and feel that it has a chance to repeat this year. They do hope to win another award this year, but whether they do or not the community has achieved some real worthwhile goals during the past three years.

Judging will be on May 3 at 1:30 p. m., and community leaders are inviting everyone in Tyler County to be present.

Another Colmesneil item: Lake Tejas will open for swimming, picnicking, etc. on Saturday. The Lake has become increasingly popular with families of the county. And school and church groups from a hundred miles around use the lake facilities for outings and class parties.

The Lake is operated by the Colmesneil school district and each year a number of improvements are made to make it attractive as a recreation spot for family, church and school outings for area folk.

The first annual Tyler County Fishing Round-Up will close Sunday at noon and trophies and prizes will be awarded that afternoon at 3 o'clock at Cherokee Park on the south side of U. S. Highway 190.

The fishing contest has aroused quite a bit of interest among fishermen of the area, as well as from Beaumont, Post Arthur, and even as far away as Houston.

A great many entries have been weighed in at the various official stations, although the weather hasn't cooperated--too many windy days.

If you haven't entered, you can still weigh in your catch and perhaps garner a trophy or prize. The trophies and prizes are on display in the vacant store building next door to Matthews.

TYLER COUNTY FISHING ROUND-UP

Sponsored by Woodville Chamber of Commerce

RULES:

- Contest dates are April 1 to April 21, 1963.
- BOUNDARIES: All public waters and streams of Tyler County, all of Dam B Lake including waters up the Angelina River to Bevilport.
- Any person holding Commercial Fishing License will not be eligible.
- Owners of weigh-in stations will not be eligible.
- Persons must fill out application blank to be eligible before going fishing. Blanks may be picked up at weigh-in stations and business places in Woodville.
- Contest judges will decide any arguments, any point in question or settle any claims concerning honesty of catches. Other than this, the contest will be run on your honor.
- All State Fish Laws must be observed, including limit rules:

These are	Length	Limit
BASS	7 inches	15
CATFISH	11 inches	25
CRAPPIE	None	25
BREAM	None	None
GAR	None	None
- In case of same weight of two fish of the same species, the first one weighed in will win.
- Trophies will be given to the largest fish of any one species. Trophies will be given to the anglers with the heaviest catch of any species in any one day. Trophies will be given in the Junior Division (boys and girls 1 year to 12 years of age) who catches the biggest fish and the smallest fish (bass has to be 7 inches long and catfish 11 inches long).
- No type of gill, tramble, or hoop net will be permitted in contest.
- Trophies will be given to the winners of the contest on Sunday, April 21 at 3:00 p. m. on Dam B Lake in the Cherokee Park, South side of Highway 190.
- Contest will close Sunday, April 21, at 12 Noon. All fish must be weighed in by 12:01 p. m. on April 21.

Mrs. Nolan was born and reared in Tyler County. She was the widow of Charlie Nolan.

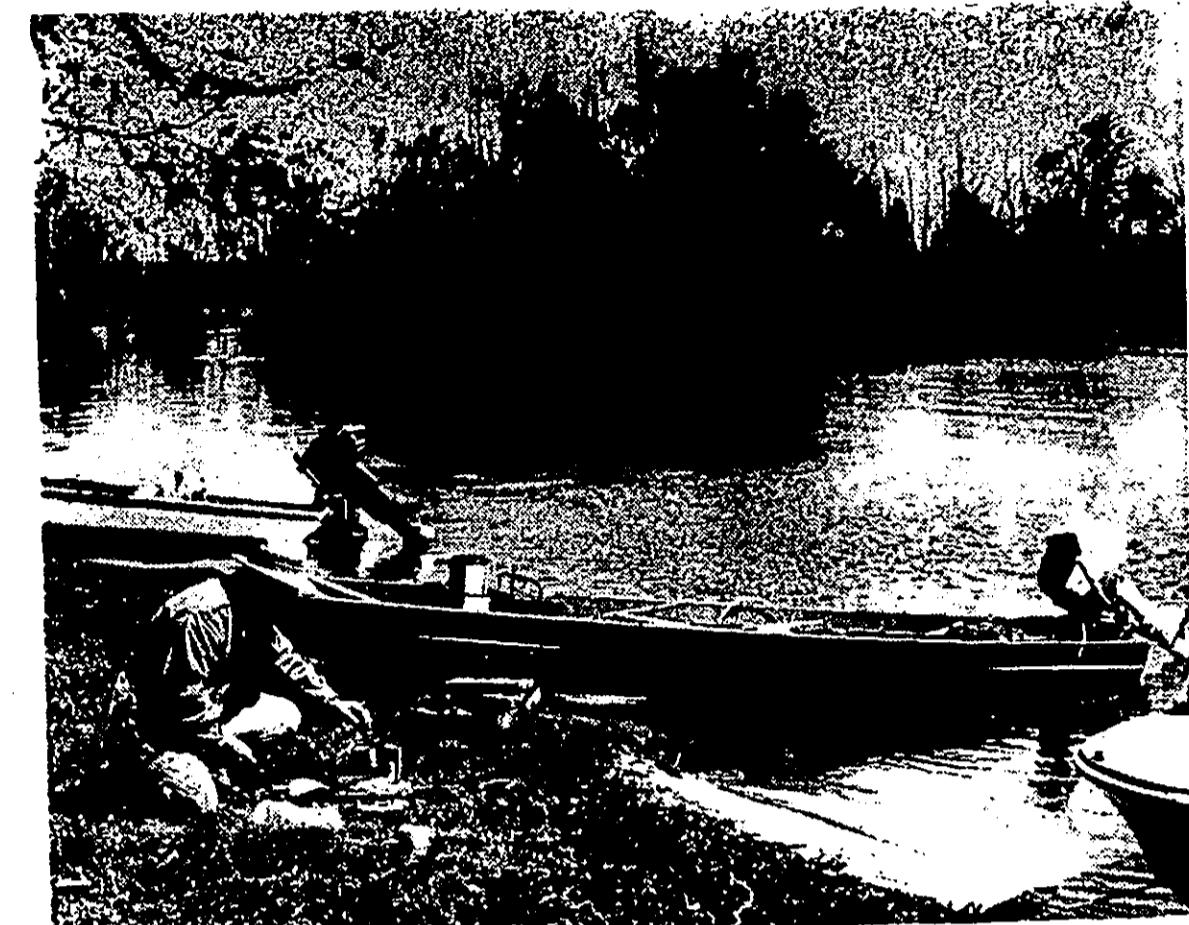

that there are public parks at each end of the bridge, constructed and maintained by the Corps of Engineers. The parks are surrounded by the lake and once a boat is in the water it can usually be tied up near the angler's camp. There is drinking water and sanitary facilities on the grounds.

Plenty Camping There are four of these parks on the lake but there are plenty of other places to camp as the land along the shore of the lake is owned by the government.

Most of the better places for the "rough" camping is on the east and west side of the lake above U.S. 190.

On the Woodville side of the bridge, there is a tremendous area that is shallow enough to wade. It's deep enough to produce good bass action, and this time of year, plenty of crappie.

It would take a horde of waders to crowd this area, which spreads out from both sides of the highway.

C. A. Williams, who operates C. A.'s Cafe and Sporting Goods on the Woodville side of the bridge, said Friday night that good catches of crappie were being made in the area mentioned above by "cane polers" wading and dragging floating minnow buckets. He said bass

fishing was always good in the shallows off the highway, except in the dead of winter. "Bass are just now beginning to hit on top," he said.

When asked about catfishing, Williams testified the lake was one of the best. "In 1960," he said, "I caught 62 yellow catfish that weighed from 20 to 70 pounds." He said trotliners made tremendous catches last week and he now had more catfish for sale than he's had all year.

Good Bass Lake

Dam B is a good bass lake and has everything from big stretches of open water where anglers search for school bass to log-choked waters studded with huge cypress trees.

Most popular areas for most of the bass, and crappie fishermen, are the East and West "Log Jams." Actually, there is no log jam in a true sense, but merely vast areas of cypress trees where logs and debris have washed in and lodged.

There is such an area on both the east and west side of the lake which is located north of the U.S. 190 bridge.

There is a tremendous amount of vegetation in the water and that's about the only lure with the exception of topwaters, you can fish without continually

having to "clean" it.

Being Sprayed

However, this may not be a problem long because at this time the lake is being sprayed with a new 2-4D formula (it kills only broad-leaf plants) which is supposed to remove the major part of the vegetation, especially the hyacinth.

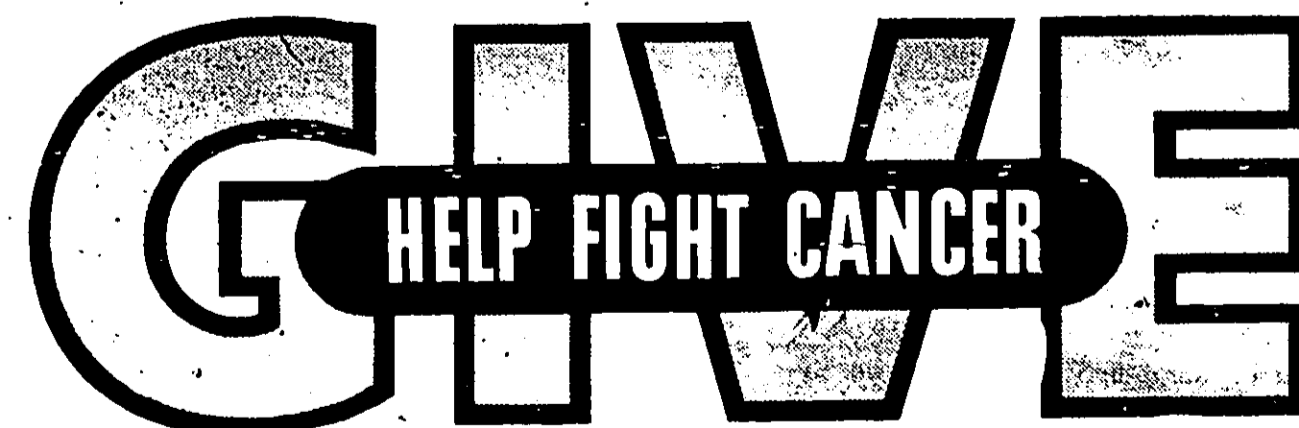
The spraying, an experiment of the Corps of Engineers, is being accomplished by using helicopters. If the spraying is successful, it will be great news to the people around Caddo Lake.

The easiest way for Houstonians to get to Dam B is to go to Woodville and continue east on U.S. 190 toward Jasper. This will bring you to the part of the lake described above where there are motels, restaurants and sporting goods stores.

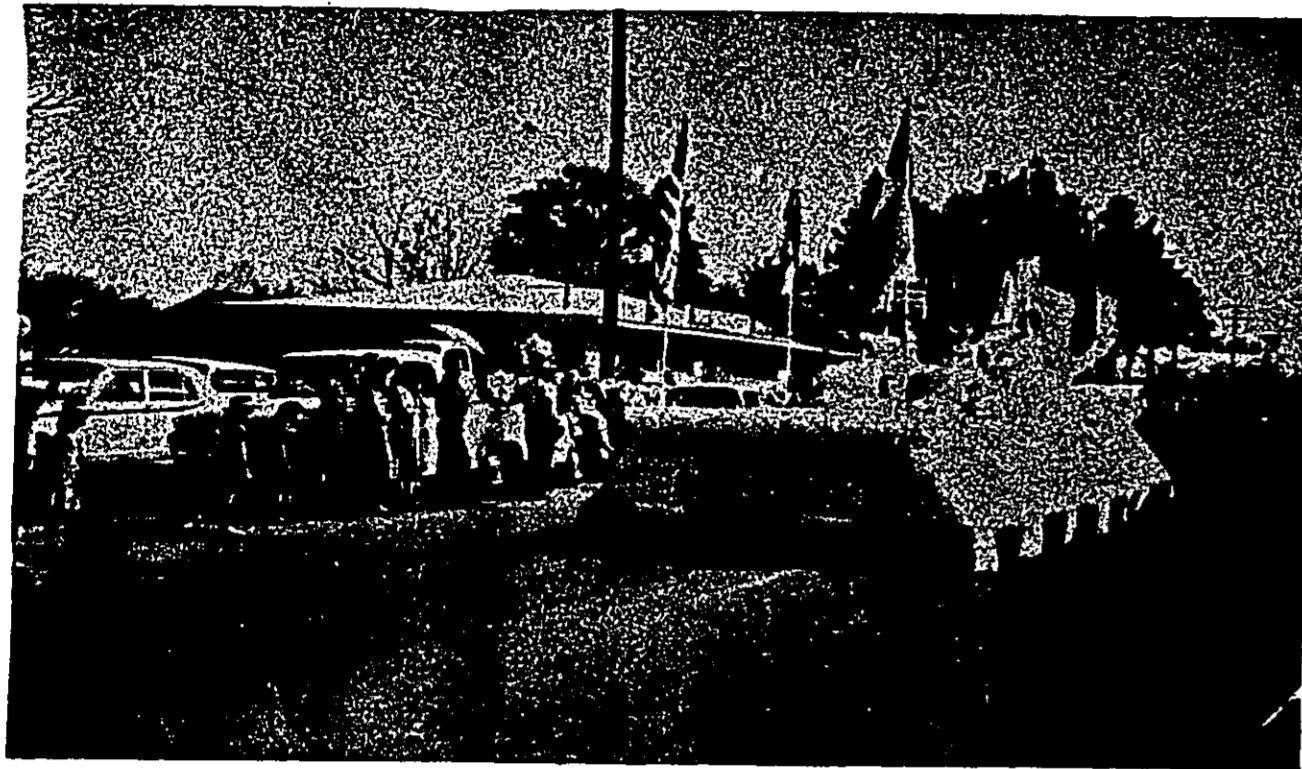
Boats may be rented and there's one place, the H&H Boat Dock, which rents motors. They get seven dollars a day for a boat and motor, plus the gasoline.

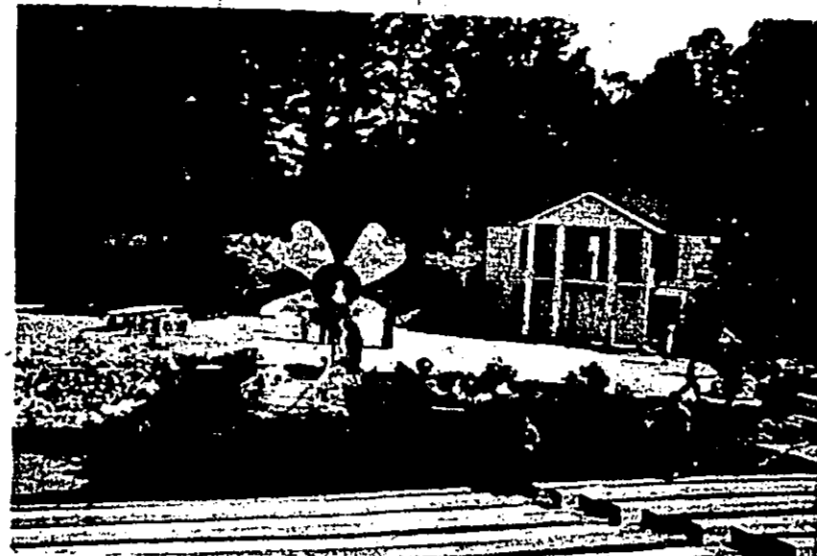
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DOGWOOD FESTIVAL SCENES

OUT OF TOWN VISITORS commented complimentarily on the stage props for the pageant which is shown above. The photo is of the right side (from the audience) of the stage.



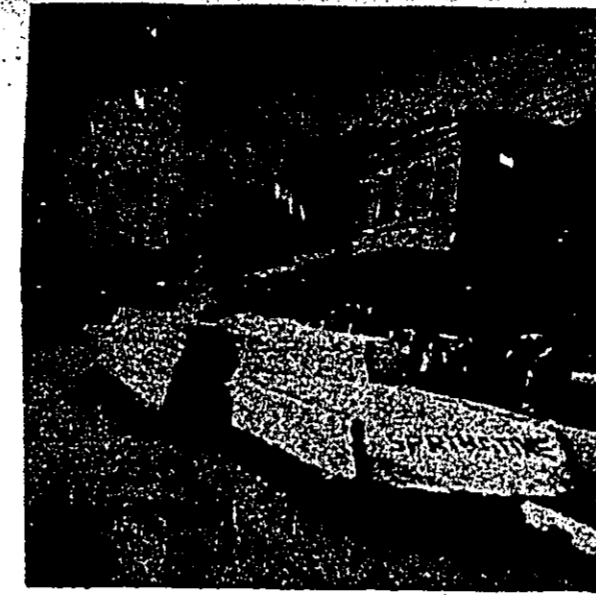
THE QUEEN'S THRONE and court area is shown above. Throne is at left, and the queen's court occupied the area to the right.



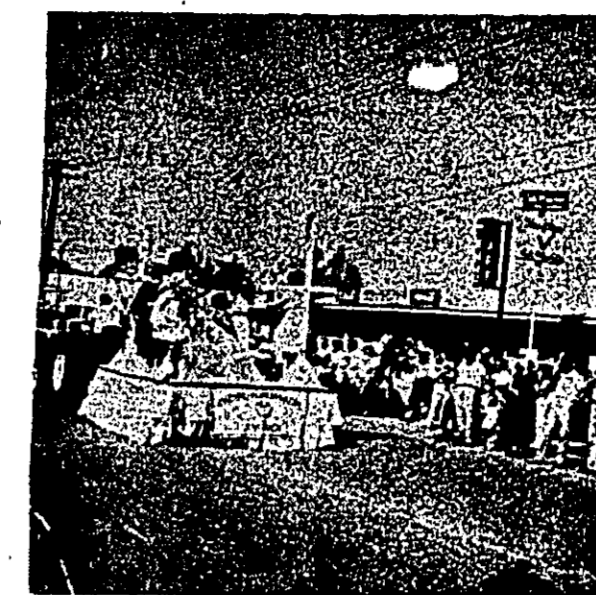

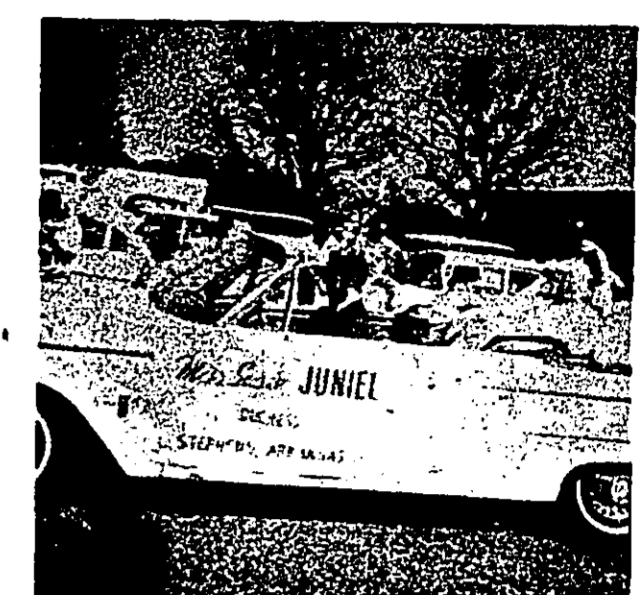

C of C Hears Work Reports

Woodville Chamber of Commerce, which has a booming contest for fishermen going, also is working on several other projects in the city area, according to reports of committees at the meeting held this month.

One of the items discussed was encouragement of the Alabama-Coushatta Indians to proceed with plans to make a tourist attraction out of the reservation. A letter to this effect was written to Chief Sylestine.

I. B. Coffman reported that the beautification committee planted a large number of dogwood trees again this year. He said that a great many of the trees planted last year had bloomed this year.

The committee also has planted azaleas on Kelley Boulevard and that arrangements have been made for more dogwood trees for next year.

Morris Clemmons, Jr., secretary, said that the airport committee has secured runway lights and a beacon which will soon be installed at Tyler County Airport.

Another matter discussed was requesting once more that house-to-house mail delivery be started in Woodville. A letter to H. M. Durham, postmaster, was authorized. Mr. Durham will forward the letter to the proper postal official for an answer.

Discussion of a campaign to locate the largest dogwood tree in the world (in Tyler County, naturally) resulted in the appointment of a committee to explore this possibility.

CONSTRUCTION HERE PASSES MILLION DOLLAR MARK

Nearly one and a quarter million dollars in new construction is now under way in Woodville, a surprising figure for a town of 2,000 population which is not in a boom area.

The most surprising element is that the construction is all taking place simultaneously.

Leading the list, of course, is the \$850,000 Community Inn Motel which is scheduled for completion in September. Work on preparing the three levels of ground on the full city block on which the motel will be built is under way.

The Woodville Community Inn will have 72 units, a swimming pool, banquet room and club.

Temple Associates of Diboll is contractor on this project.

Work on the Shivers Memorial Library and Museum on Charlton street just north of the motel site is well under way. Mr. and Mrs. Allan Shivers are building this facility which will be operated under the control of the Woodville School system.

Shivers bought the old Cruse home, which was located on the motel site, and had it moved to the lot just north and adjacent to the school property.

The Cruse house, a two-story colonial showplace, is being restored. A new one-story building is being constructed on the back of the old building.

At the Tyler County Hospital, foundation work is under way on new northeast and southwest wings which will give added room for the hospital to care for more patients and extend its laboratory facilities.

Also going up rapidly is the new Swearingen-Garner Clinic building. This is located on the corner of Kelley Boulevard and Dogwood street, on the first block north of the hospital.

The clinic, being built by Dr. Robert E. Swearingen and Dr. Curtis Garner, will also have facilities for a dentist.

Another major construction job which is reported to be ready to start soon is rebuilding of Woodville Lumber Company's sawmill, which burned in December.

Teachers Plan Dinner Meeting

The annual dinner meeting of the Tyler County Teachers Association will be held in Warren on April 29. Time of the meeting is 7:00 p. m., according to E. L. Lawrence of Spurger, president of the group.

At a recent meeting held here, a panel discussion, "Teacher Improvement," was held. On the panel were Richard I. Timbrook, Chester, and H. C. Jones, Spurger, with Bennett Hanna of Woodville acting as moderator.

Other business transacted at the meeting was the presentation of a past president's pin to the immediate past president, Superintendent Z. M. Cooke of Warren, and committee reports by B. H. McGuire of Woodville and C. M. Tolar of Warren.

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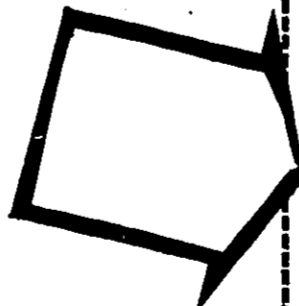
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
