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### Winners in Fishing Contest Announced by Chamber

Trophy and prize winners in the First Annual Tyler County Fishing Round-Up were announced this week by Woodville Chamber of Commerce.

The first-place winners in each division received trophies, while the second through fifth winners received merchandise prizes offered by local merchants.

In the bass, largest catch division, the trophy went to Joe Smith of Woodville, who weighed in a 7 pound, 4-1/2 ounce catch.

Otto Wilson of Huntington took second prize with a 5 pound four ounce catch, while third place went to Bobby Woodson of Groves with a 5 pound two ounce bass.

J. R. Huff of Route 1, Woodville was fourth and Charles W. Hoodman of Beaumont was fifth.

In the bass heaviest catch in one day: the trophy winner was Sam Humberston of Vidor, whose thirteen bass weighed 10 pounds and 15 ounces. H. W. McInteyes of Vidor was a close second with ten weighing 8 pounds, 14 ounces. Joe Smith of Woodville was third with three bass weighing eight pounds and nine ounces.

Sam Humberston of Vidor on another day weighed in eight bass at 8 pounds and four ounces to take fourth prize. Fifth prize in this division went to J. R. Huff, Route 1, Woodville with six weighing eight pounds and one ounce.

#### CRAPPIE DIVISION

Trophy for the largest crappie weighed in during the contest was won by Booker L. Adams of Wiergate. It tipped the scales at two pounds and one ounce—just one ounce heavier than the winner of second prize, a two pounder caught by Mrs. Ben Gardner of Corrigan.

Third prize for the largest crappie went to C. H. Kelly of Route 2, fourth was won by J. W. Wall, Dam B, and fifth by Bodie Cards, Woodville.

W. T. Robinson of Port Acres received the trophy for heaviest catch in one day of crappie. His catch of fifteen weighed 23 lbs. and four ounces. Raymond Huff of Beaumont won second prize, a catch of 25 weighing 22 lbs. and one ounce. Third prize went to a woman angler, Mrs. Bill Wells of Corrigan with a catch of 25 which weighed 20 lbs. even.

D. P. Thornton of Buna won the third prize and Paul Thomas won fifth.

Ola Lyons of Groves won both the trophy for largest catch and trophy for heaviest catch in one day with a one pound, seven ounce bream.

#### CATFISH

James Williams of Nederland won the trophy for the largest catfish caught during the contest. It weighed in at 18 pounds.

E. C. Hill of Beaumont caught the heaviest weight of catfish in one day for that trophy. His 25 weighed 29 lbs., 8 ounces.

#### GAR DIVISION

James Williams, Jr., of Nederland took both the largest catch and the heaviest limit trophies in the gar division with one that

weighed in at 11 lbs., 4 ounces.

In the special division for the oldest man or woman entering a catch in the contest, the trophy was won by J. W. Wall of Dam B.

In the junior division, trophy for the largest catch went to Pete Shivers of Vidor. Second prize to Wesley Huff of Beaumont and third to Billy Cards of Woodville completed this part of the junior division.

Eric Atkinson III of Lufkin took the award for the smallest catch in the junior division with a six ounce catch (kind of fish not announced).

### Tourist Ad Bill Sent to Governor

AUSTIN — The House gave final approval Monday to a bill to authorize the creation of an agency to encourage the tourist industry in Texas. The Senate passed the bill (HB 11) last week after amending it to require Senate confirmation of the six-man advisory board and the executive administrator appointed by the governor.

THE HOUSE approved the change Monday and sent the bill to Gov. John Connally for his signature. The governor has urged the Legislature to establish the agency. The proposed law would authorize the creation of the Texas Tourist Development Agency and give it the power to spend state funds to advertise the state's tourist attractions.

Rep. Bill Walker of Cleveland sponsored the bill. The tourist program now is under the direction of the State Highway Department.

### College At Huntsville Is Censured

Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville has been censured for its 1961 firing of Dr. Rupert C. Koeninger, now a professor at Texas Southern University here.

The action came Friday in San Francisco when the American Assn. of University Professors voted to censure the college where Koeninger had served as head of the sociology department 15 years. Sam Houston State was one of five schools censured by the association. Koeninger was told at the time of the firing by president Harmon Lowman that some members of the board of regents opposed his reappointment because he had been involved in political activities. The association ruled Friday that Koeninger should not have been dismissed without adequate cause, and that adequate cause had not been shown. Koeninger's political activities were neither improper nor illegal, the A.A.U.P. said, and "he had done no more than discharge his responsibilities as an alert and interested citizen." Texas Tech College at Lubbock, censured by the organization in the spring of 1958, was among 10 institutions left on the A.A.U.P.'s censure list.

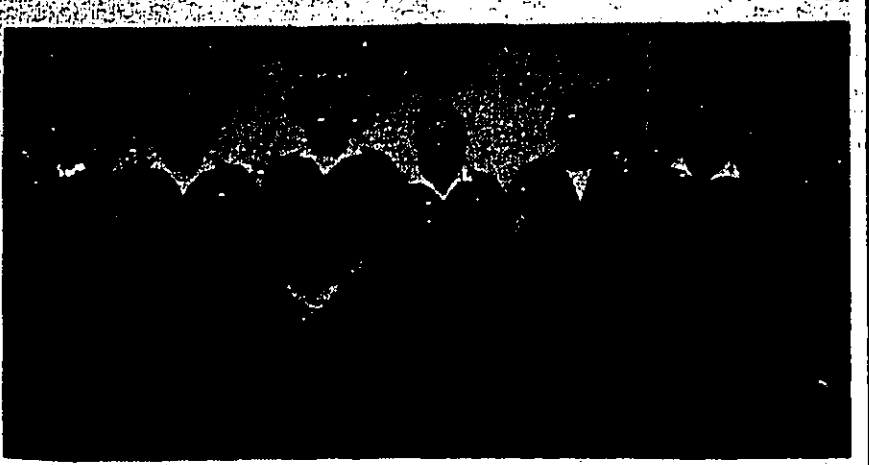

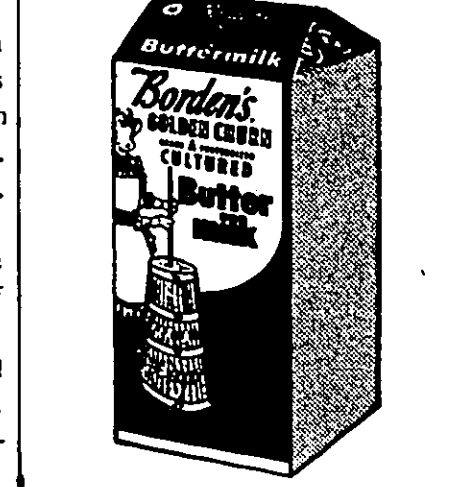

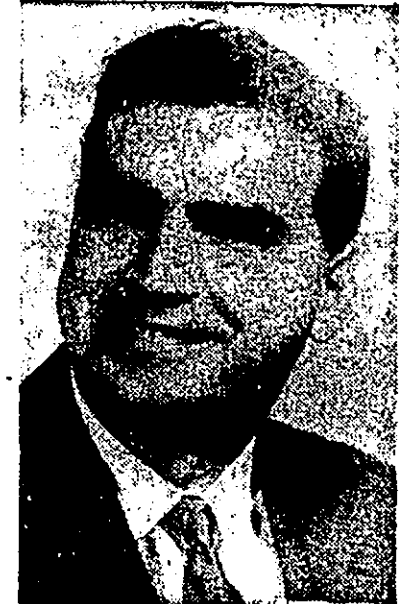

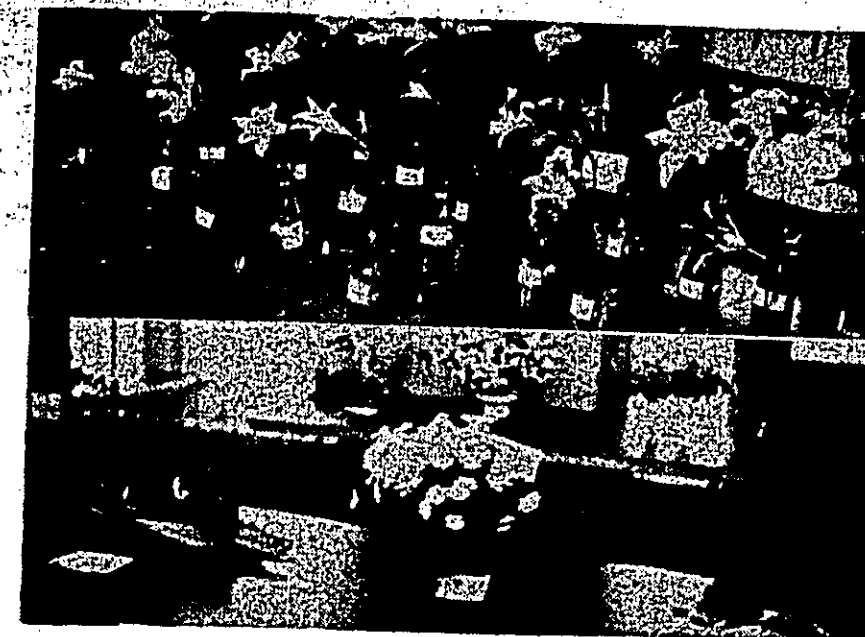

### CANCER PROGRAM SLATED AT COLMESNEIL CENTER

An educational program on the early detection of cancer will be held at the Community Center in Colmesneil Tuesday night beginning at 8:00 p. m.

A brief general discussion will be held before the showing of two

films—one to the women, who will remain in the Community Center, and another to the men in the Baptist Church next door to the center.

The film for showing to women in the audience is entitled "Breast Self Examination." The film is most effective in the early detection of breast tumor, and seeing it a second time will be beneficial for those who have seen it before.

The men will see a film entitled "Warning Shadow".

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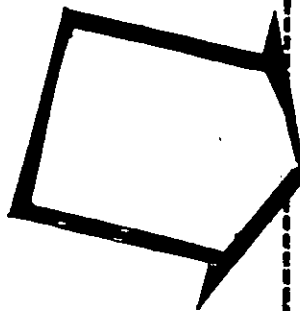
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
