## Stock Law Wins In Precinct 4

Voters of precinct four voted Saturday to pen all stock in an election held in the four voting places in the precinct.

The election was held with two ballots, one for cattle and one for other stock.

A total of 261 voted in favor of a stock law to pen cattle with a total of 201 votes opposed.

On the other proposition, a total of 280 voted to pen other livestock and 186 were opposed. This applies to horses, mules, jacks, jennets, donkeys, hogs, sheep and goats.

In the ballot on cattle, the results at each box were:

Fred: 66 against cattle running at large, 55 for cattle running at large.

Spurger: 111 against cattle running at large, 110 for cattle running at large.

New Hope: 22 against cattle at large, 23 for cattle running at large.

At Town Bluff, 62 against cattle running at large, 13 for.

On the other ballot pertaining to other stock, results were:

Fred: 74 for penning, 48 for permitting them to run at large.

New Hope: 25 for penning, 19 for running at large.

Spurger: 118 for penning, 104 for allowing them to run at large.

Town Bluff: 63 for penning, 12 for allowing them to run at large.

## Chamber Hears Contest Report

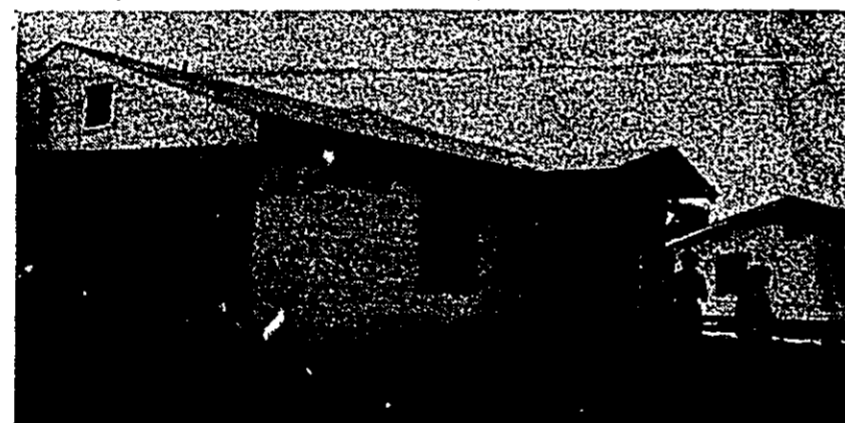

## "Time and Two Women" Film To Be Shown Tuesday

A film that has wide circulation and is extremely effective in the fight against cancer, "Time and Two Women," will be shown Tuesday afternoon and night in the Fain Theater in Woodville.

The afternoon showing will be at 2:30 and the evening showing at 7 p.m. The film runs for about eighteen minutes.

It is a public education feature sponsored by the Tyler County unit of the American Cancer Society.

The film, which is in color, is shown to women in an effort to establish the importance of having an annual cell examination for uterine cancer as part of a regular health check-up.

It explains the nature of uter-

ine cancer, what the cell examination is, why it can save lives, and the decisive factor of time in relation to cure—a factor which women themselves control.

Both the afternoon and evening sessions will be attended by a local physician who will introduce the film and answer questions from the viewers.

All women, including junior and senior high school girls, are urged to attend.

Editor, Pineywoods Press:

We, the undersigned, are presently enrolled at the A & M College of Texas. This letter is being written to bring to the eyes of the public the fact that not all students are in agreement with the recent decision of our Board of Directors to admit women to our school.

A & M is well-known for its high standards in the field of education as well as its spirit and tradition. Before the Board's change of policy, we were proud to have been students at the largest all-male college in the United States. We therefore present a few of the reasons why we feel that we should remain an all-male institution.

When we first enrolled at A & M, we were aware of the all-male status. Each of us accepted this idea. This tradition means as much to us as the traditions of West Point do to its students and graduates. After all, A & M has contributed more officers and men to our armed forces than any other college, university, or academy. We feel that this change to coeducation will bring an end to our proud traditions, as has happened at Louisiana State University.

It has been estimated that this change will cost the school a quarter of a million dollars a year in contributions from former students alone. Facilitating the campus for coeds would be a very costly project. With the advent of coeducation, it is expected we will lose our military status, thus drastically reducing our federal aid.

We feel that a school with such outstanding traditions, superior military records, and excellent male educational opportunities should be allowed to continue as it has for the past 92 years.

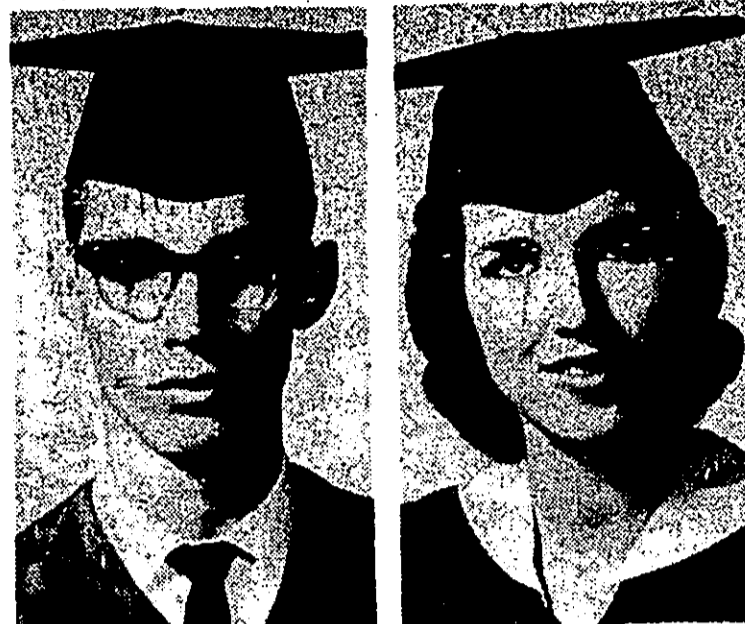
### RITES HELD HERE MONDAY FOR FORMER WOODVILLE RESIDENT

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# FIRST GRADERS IN NUTRITION STUDY

## Woodville School, Extension Service Cooperate in Program

Almost a hundred first graders in the Woodville Elementary School are learning about the nutrition facts of life in a special study underway here this spring.

The boys and girls are participating in a Pilot Program in foods and nutrition, which was planned by the Food and Nutrition Subcommittee of Tyler County in cooperation with the school officials and other local resource people.

Tyler County's program is in keeping with the objectives of President Kennedy's physical fitness plan, since good health, proper diets and fitness are stressed, leaders said.

The nutrition information—adapted to the first grade level—is being presented in a coordinated subject matter approach by the three first grade teachers, Mrs. Virginia Lee, Mrs. Velma Sumrall and Mrs. Malee Tucker. The information is being correlated with health, art, number sense and reading studies, and is even discussed during class "rest periods."

Youngsters have been enthusiastic about the food study, which will continue through the end of school. They have designed special charts and posters—showing colorful food trains and ladders to good nutrition—and these have been exhibited in the three classrooms and in the school's hallways near the big auditorium. Other art work also is being used to call attention to the food study by the six-year-olds.

Another approach being used to teach the children about food is the "clean plate" idea in the school lunchroom. Youngsters learn about the basic four food groups—meats and fish, fruits and vegetables, bread and cereals, and milk and other dairy foods—and the benefits they derive from each as they are encouraged to

eat all the foods on their plates and to drink plenty of milk.

Plans for the food study began last summer after Mrs. Maurine Mooney, Tyler County home demonstration agent, completed a Human Nutrition Workshop at Texas A & M College for key home demonstration agents of Texas. The intensified training session conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, presented the latest research findings in human nutrition to the HD agents.

Members of the Food and Nutrition Subcommittee of Tyler County who have worked with Mrs. Mooney and the teachers in planning the Woodville food study are Mrs. Edna Lamb, Jr., chairman of the committee; Mrs. Hugh Martin, HD club member; Mrs. S. H. Jordan, 4-H adult leader; Mrs. Ted Tidwell, head of the homemaking department of the Woodville high school; B. M. Minter, Tyler County school superintendent; and Laurann Jordan and Amanda Haralson, 4-H Club girls.

Assisting the committee as resource people are B. H. McGuire, Woodville school superintendent, who approved the food study unit; James W. Shields, principal of Woodville Elementary School; Mrs. Wade Best, school lunchroom supervisor; Mrs. A. T. Philen, president of the 25-member County Council of P-TA's, and Marie Tribble, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the A & M College of Texas.

Homemaking students of the school have conducted a survey to determine nutrition knowledge and eating habits of the first grade students. The survey results are being used by the teachers to know where to place major emphasis in the current study. A second survey will be conducted in the first grade classrooms in May just before school closes to determine if eating habits and food knowledge have increased.

Basic information for the nutrition study is being adapted from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication, "Are You a Good Eater" and the USDA publication, "Food for Fitness—A Daily Food Guide," and other sources. Object of the study is to increase the general health and physical fitness of the students.

"It is hoped that the nutrition information can be presented in other schools of the county next year, as well as giving the same group of students more advanced information as they reach the second grade," Mrs. Lamb, the committee chairman, has emphasized.

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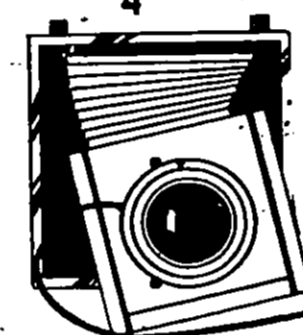

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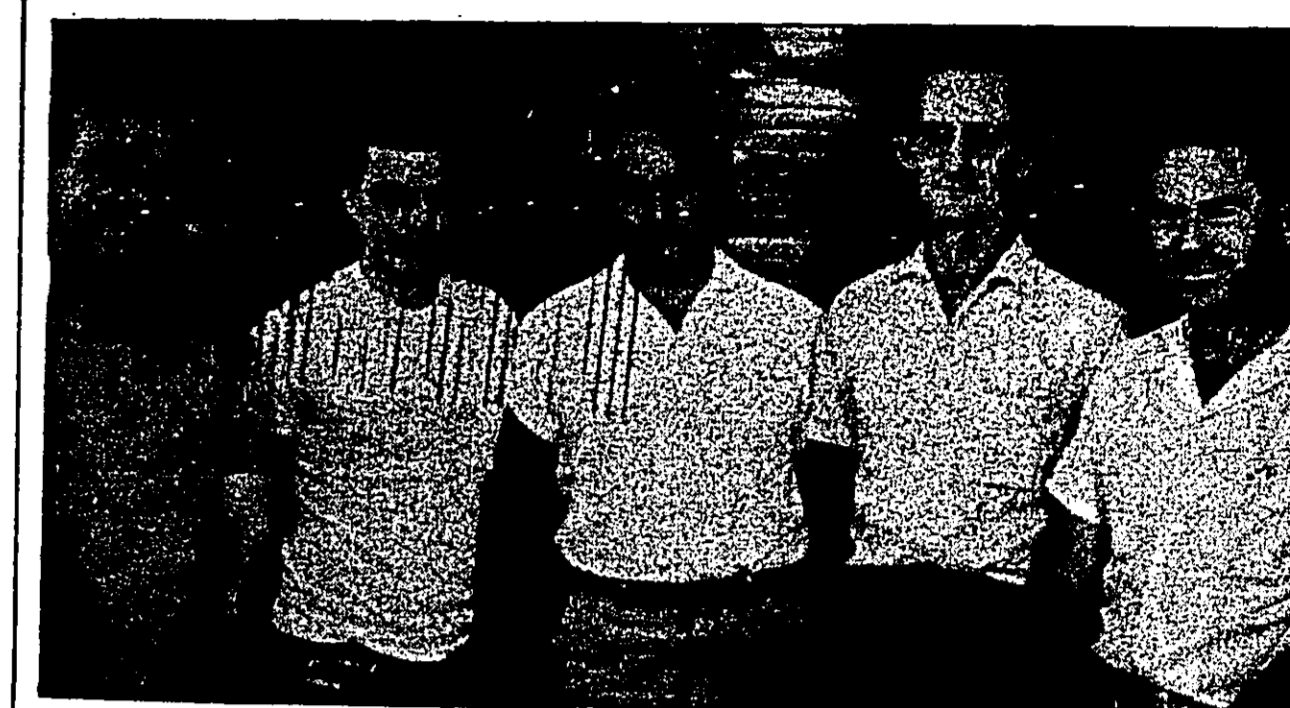
