
A ceremony had been planned at First Baptist Church in Spurger to license him to preach before he entered the college.

COMMUNITY JUDGING FINALS SET WEDNESDAY

Colmesneil is one of four Texas communities in the finals of the Texas Community Improvement contest and will be judged for the top state award next Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

This was announced Tuesday by Reagan Brown, sociologist with the Extension Service of Texas A&M College, College Station.

Other communities in the final judging for the state award are North Alamo, Hidalgo County, in District 12; Flint Gresham, Smith County, District 5; and Telephone in Fannin County, District 4.

Colmesneil was recently judged winner in Division I of District 9 and was judged in state competition with winners in all twelve districts of the state.

Judging for Colmesneil in the finals will begin at 10 a.m. next Wednesday at the Community Center. The judges will be taken on a tour of the rural area before returning to the center for lunch. Committee reports will be made

in the afternoon before the judges. Judging the state contest for the top winner will be Mrs. Doris Myers, area home management specialist, District 10-11; Sid Jenkins, dairy marketing specialist, College Station; Henry O'Neal, agricultural engineering specialist, College Station, and Reagan Brown, sociologist, A&M College, College Station.

Mrs. John Sturrock is chairman of the Colmesneil Community Improvement Organization this year, and this honor has been made possible through her untiring efforts and the various committee chairmen in the different areas of work.

The community improvement contest is sponsored jointly by the Extension Service of Texas A&M College and the utility companies of Texas, including Gulf States in this area.

Colmesneil especially invites everyone to come and visit with them on the day of the judging.

We realize that a good many of them want to seek their fortunes, so to speak, in the larger cities. That is all right. But for those who would prefer to remain at home and help build a greater Tyler County, where can they turn for a decent opportunity?

It is something for the county's leaders to think about.

Before we run out of space, let us thank the people of the county and city of Woodville for their response to our poor efforts in publishing a weekly picture newspaper.

Cards will be left in some of the boxes on Rural Route 1 by P. E. Walker, carrier, and on Star Route 1 by J. D. Spurlock.

Mr. Durham explained that the USDA bases poultry and livestock estimates on replies to this survey. It is important that everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings, Durham said,










A feature of the day was when the Port Arthur club held installation of officers service, using the beautiful flower ritual, under a towering holly tree.


A covered dish luncheon was served on the patio and punch was served from an antique churn, with a fifty year old dipper.




