The Texas Community Improvement program is sponsored by the extension service of A&M College and the private utility companies of Texas.

Commencement speaker will be Peter Wells, Beaumont attorney. He will be introduced by J. Wood Fain.


Principal L.C. Lowery will present the honors and awards. The diplomas will be presented to the class members by Morris Clemmons, k., a member of the board of trustees.




