## Gray Ladies to Begin Hospital Duties June 17

On June 17 the patients in the Tyler County Hospital will have an added service to contribute to their comfort and convenience. On that date the local chapter of the American Red Cross Gray Ladies will begin active duty. The Gray Ladies are a volunteer organization whose members will take shifts of duty at the hospital to give personal services to patients which contribute to their comfort and recovery. The local group was organized under the leadership of Mrs. Ivison Grimes, who is chairman. A course of instruction has been given the group under trained supervision. Some of the personal services which the Gray Ladies will do for patients are delivery of mail, serving of coffee and juices to

patients (where permitted), keep ice water in patients' rooms, TV tuning for patients, water flowers in the rooms, help patients with writing of letters, making phone calls, getting magazines or newspapers and Bible for patients. The Gray Ladies will also assist the hospital personnel by answering the phone, escorting patients to x-ray, and escorting patients to awaiting transportation when necessary. These are just some of the services which the Gray Ladies will be permitted to perform. As volunteers to render personal assistance to patients, they of course are not permitted to perform any professional duties which belong to trained nurses and technicians. Mrs. Grimes said that there is a need for girls 16 and over to aid the Gray Ladies during the summer. This is excellent training

## COLMESNEIL THIRD IN STATE CONTEST

Colmesneil was named third in the Texas Community Improvement program in final judging, according to an announcement Monday by Reagan Brown, A&M College sociologist. The community had previously been placed in the top four communities in Texas in preliminary judging. Telephone community in Fannin county, north Texas, was the winner of top spot. In second was Flint-Gresham, Smith county. In fourth was North Alamo in Hidalgo county. Final judging was completed last week. Colmesneil was visited by the judges Wednesday. Telephone will receive \$550 as first-place winner. Flint-Gresham receives \$450, Colmesneil \$350 and North Alamo \$250. A total of 86 other communities will share \$6,800 in awards in the contest which was sponsored jointly by the Texas A&M college extension service and Texas electric utilities companies, including Gulf States in this area. Colmesneil's efforts in the improvement program resulted in many community achievements, the most notable being the construction of the fine new community center. The Community Improvement Organization spearheaded the program. Its officers are Mrs. John Sturrock, chairman; J. E. Riley, vice chairman, and Mrs. Burton Fortenberry, secretary.

Up Colmesnell way they are elated that the community was third in Texas in the Community Improvement program.

Of course, they were shooting for first place. They almost made it, for the top three communities had very little difference in points and the judges had a difficult time choosing in one, two, three and four order.

Colmesnell has been in the contest for the past three years. Last year the community was second in the district. This put quite a burden on the community, for it is difficult for a community to find and accomplish enough improvements to be in contention for two years in a row. That the people of the community were able to jump from a district winner to third place in the state is a distinct tribute to their work.

There were 269 communities in the contest this year, and all of them made definite improvements in the program. This is a grass-roots do-it-yourself program in which the people take hold and work together for what they want—and don't go running to the state or federal government for help.

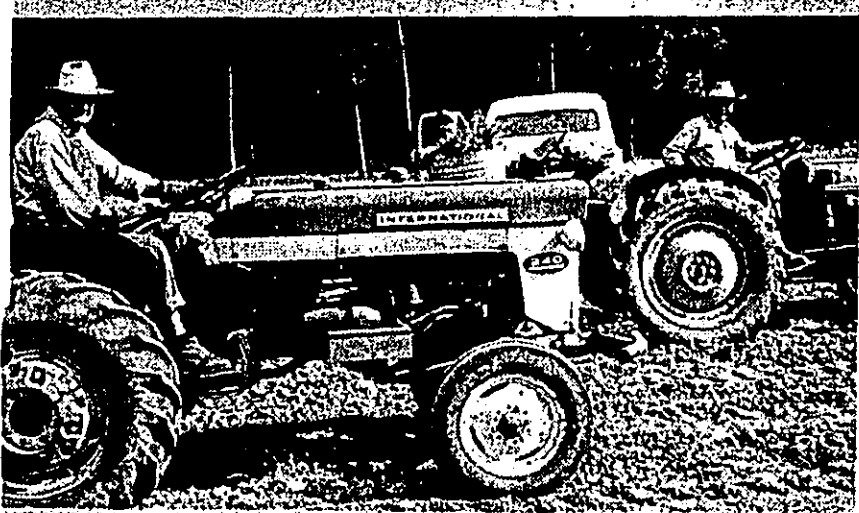
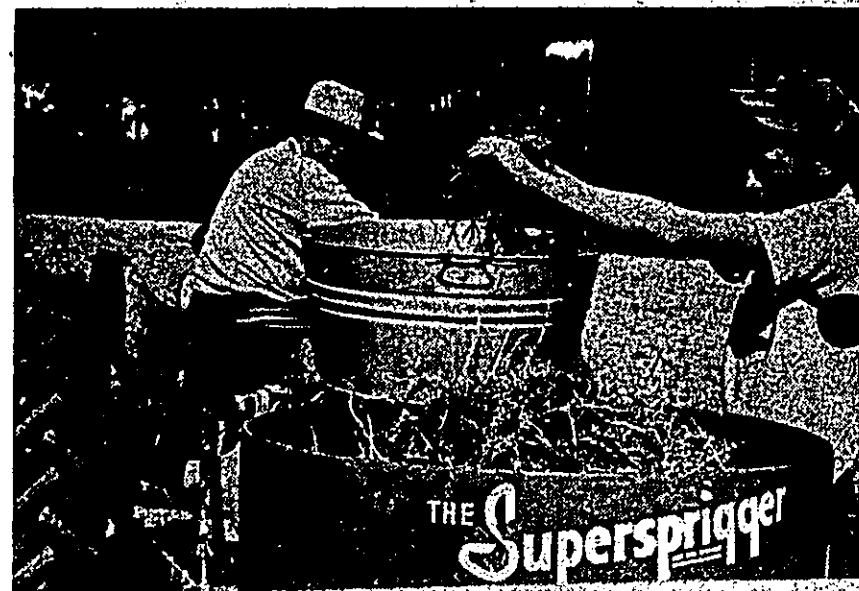
J. R. Elliott, president of the board of trustees, presented the class members with the diplomas.

The valedictory address was by Robert Owens and the salutatory by Vicki Riley.

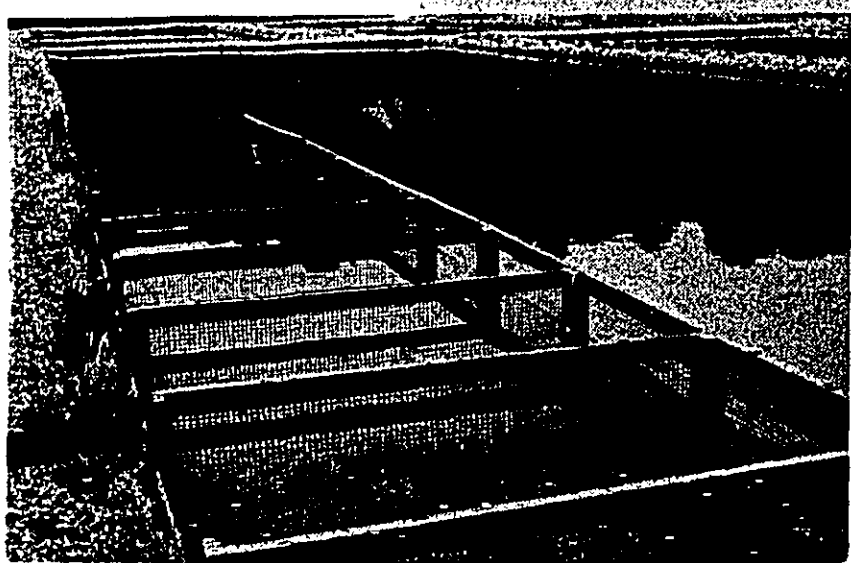
Mrs. Lionel Reese played the organ for the processional and recessional. Pat Hutto played a piano solo.

### Chanel Catfish Study Made

Four men from the Jasper and Woodville area have just returned from Auburn, Alabama, where they studied channel catfish production at the Hatchery Experiment Station at Auburn University.

Making the study were Ervin Maclin of the Farmers Home Administration, Jasper; Warren Cooper of Texas Game & Fish Commission, Jasper; I. W. Clark, a farmer-rancher, and Gerald Maynard of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

Maynard said they learned the answers to some of the essential problems concerning this new land use, and while there are questions still to be answered, it has been learned that channel catfish can be grown successfully in a pond by proper feeding and adequate control of water.

He said that Dr. H. S. Swingle and assistant, E. E. Frather, have contributed greatly to knowledge needed in commercially producing fish in general and channel catfish in particular through the experiments at Auburn.

A good many local landowners have asked what to feed, how much and when; others ask if it is possible to get channel catfish to spawn in a pond, Maynard said.

Clear water, black water, soupy water or too little water are complaints from some pond or lake owners. Maynard said that proper management is a necessity in each case and the answers must strictly be on an individual basis since conditions are seldom the same on two ponds.

Both Bill and Lester serve as two of the five elected supervisors of the Long Leaf Soil Conservation District (top photo). In the center photo, Young and Mahan and an assistant are shown as the sprigger is loaded for planting in soil that has been disced two times in preparation for planting. In the bottom photo, the planting machine is at right placing coastal bermuda stolons in the ground at a rapid rate. Young follows the planter with a heavy roller, which firms the soil in and around each stolon. This packing helps seal in the moisture that is in the ground and is considered an important factor in a dry year.

Receiving the citizenship awards were Gladys Stanley and Joe Kelley, Jr.

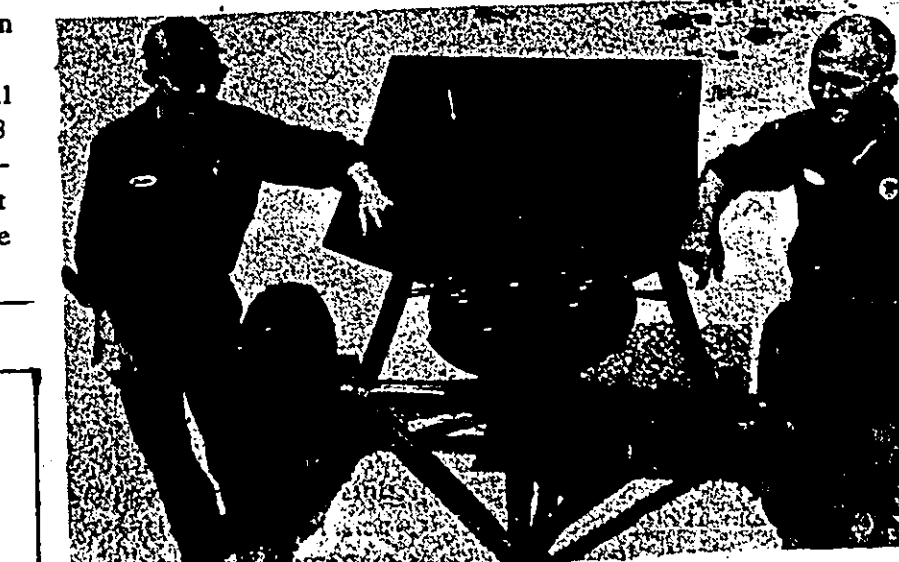
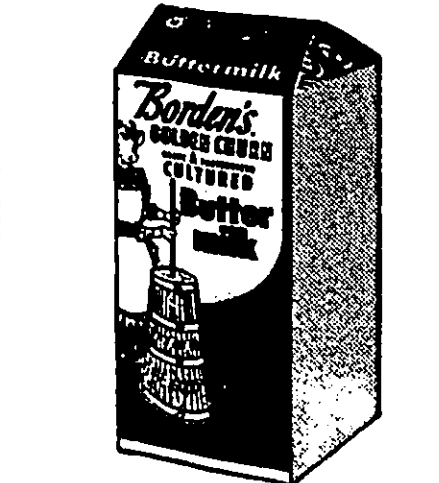

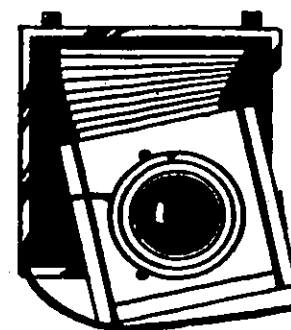

### MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION ON NATIONAL HIGHWAY WEEK

Complete text of Mayor E. W. Gassiot's proclamation designating May 26-June 1 as Highway Week follows:

Whereas, the growth and future economic potential of the State of Texas is linked inextricably to its fine system of highways which stimulate both business and recreation by making travel safe and pleasurable; and

Whereas, the Texas Highway Department through a concentrated program of highway construction and modernization has in the past several years helped bring about a reduction of more than 25 per cent in the fatality rate of all Federal and State highways in Texas; and

Whereas, during the past six years the Texas Highway Department has built more miles of highways than any other state; but

Whereas, heavy increases in traffic now jeopardize the advances in highway safety and the contribution to the economy made on the Texas highway system, since the state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles and the miles traveled by these vehicles now totals well over 40 billion miles a year; and

Whereas, due to this traffic many miles of Texas 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State-numbered highways are already obsolete for the traffic they presently carry;

Be It Further Resolved, that the citizens of Texas be strongly urged to take note of the immense highway problems and needs facing this state as its economy continues to expand, and to support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization so that Texas Highways can continue their indispensable contribution to traffic safety, the growth of our economy and the national defense.

Therefore, I, E. W. Gassiot, do hereby designate the period of May 26-June 1, 1963 as Highway Week and urge that special attention be directed to the needs of our highway system.

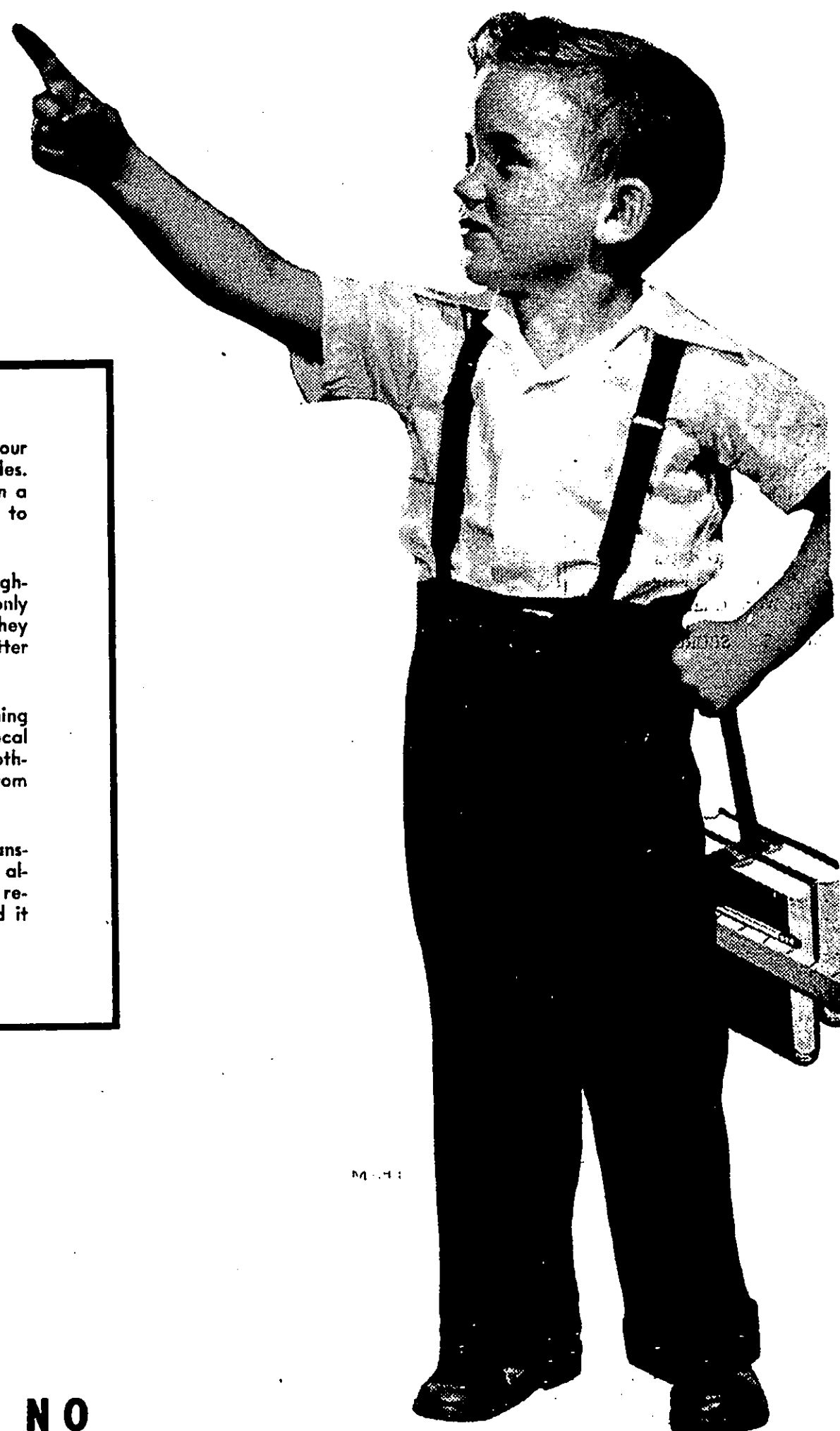

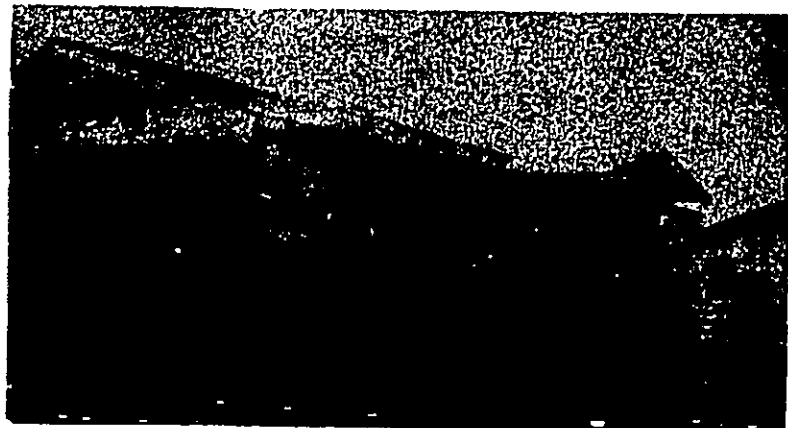
