The ProCon Club, a new civic club, has held two organizational meetings and plans to begin regular weekly meetings Tuesday at noon.

Further information may be obtained from any officer of the club, or Dr. W. E. Poimboeuf, one of the organizers.

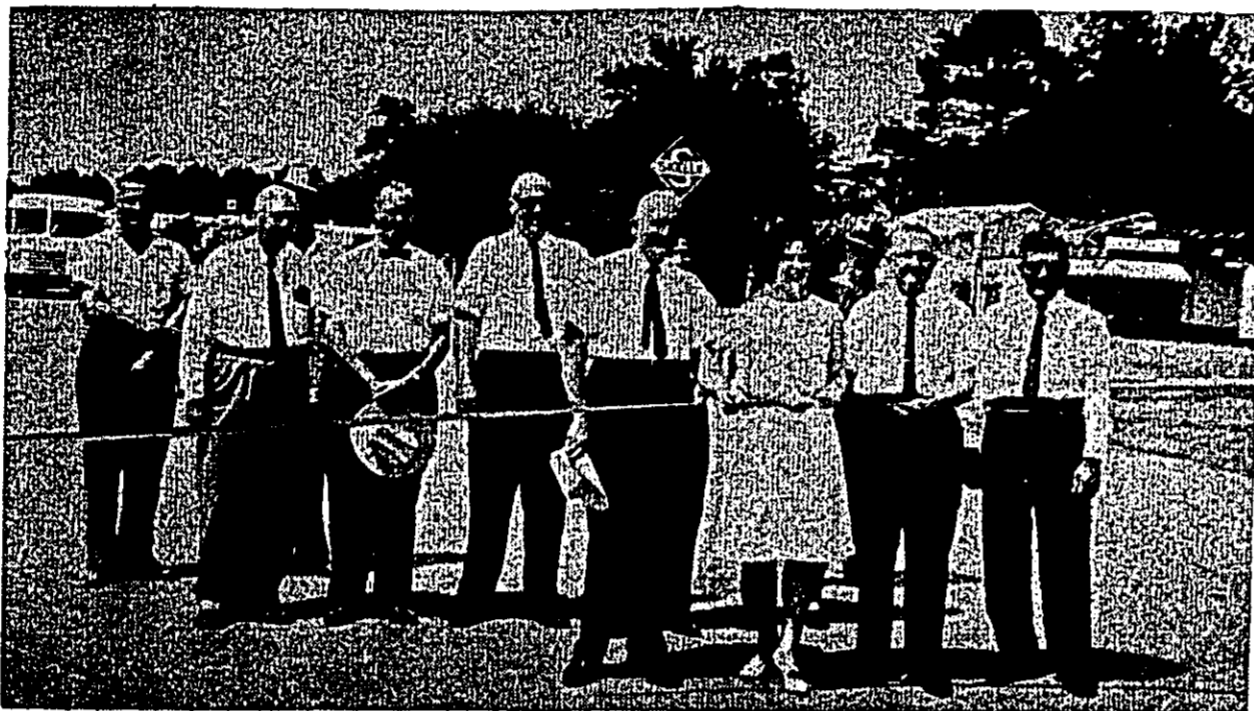
Warren Teacher In Special Studies

Chamber Endorses Hospital

Members of the Woodville Chamber of Commerce at the regular monthly meeting Monday night had a lively discussion of the proposed Tyler County Hospital District.

Jeff R. Mooney, county judge, explained the purpose of the hospital district. He said that a law authorizing the district had been passed by the recent legislature and signed by the governor. The county must call an election and the voters must approve the creation of the district before it is effective, he pointed out.

Under a hospital district, Tyler County Hospital would continue to be operated by the county under a hospital board. The budget for each year's operation would be subject to approval by the commissioners court.

Eldon Easley, administrator of the hospital, was present to answer any questions about the district.

Under questioning, mostly by Joe Kelley, he said that under a hospital district, the county will be authorized to levy a hospital tax not to exceed 75 cents per \$100 valuation. However, he put a figure of 40 cents on the tax rate estimated to be needed to retire old bonds, present expansion now under way and interest.

Judge Mooney explained that the county will have to pay for the current expansion construction now under way either by the creation of the hospital district or the raising of valuations on property taxed by the county.

The advantage of the hospital district, he said, is that each dollar of taxes levied by the district goes to the district for its own use.

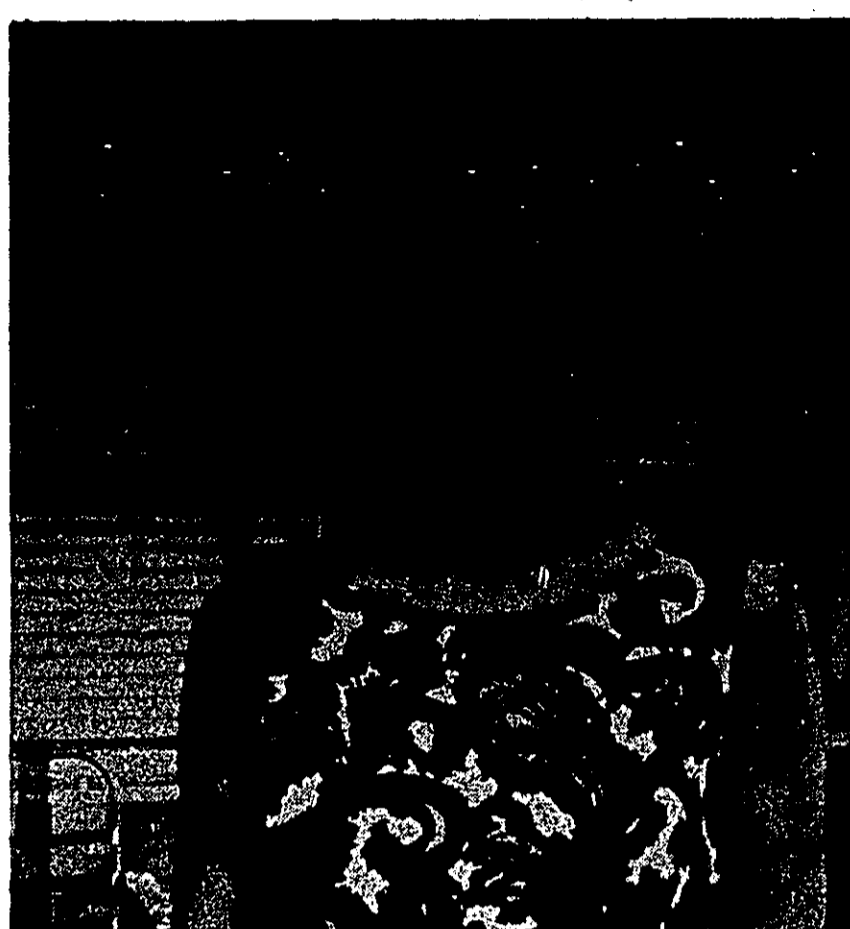

he said that valuations will have to be raised in order to retire the hospital bonds. This means that the state will get 42 cents of the 85 cent county tax rate on the higher valuations, as it does on all taxes collected by the county.

In other words, he said, since the county hospital bonds must be paid, it would be cheaper to vote the hospital district and let it levy a 40 cent rate.

He said that this year the county has been forced to raise property valuations to \$14,400,000 in order to have a high enough valuation to be able to sell bonds to pay for the construction now going on which was authorized by the commissioners court December 31, but for which no funds were provided.

The chamber members endorsed the creation of the hospital district with one dissenting vote, that of Mr. Kelley, who said that to him it appeared to be the addition of one more taxing agency to those we now have.

Among other business discussed was a proposal by Frank Robinson that the chamber sponsor the sale of ceramic house numbers by the Boy Scout Troop 37. The Scouts will receive a commission, and it will help in the projected house numbering work of the chamber.

Dr. R. E. Swearingen, president, appointed a committee to work with the Scout troop on the sale of the house numbers. Committee members are Mr. Robinson, Joe Kelley, Clyde Gray and Pete Watts.

James Best proposed that the chamber authorize two more of the Christmas decorations which were used for the first time last year. Mr. Best said that one more

was needed at each end of the Beaumont highway.

This proposal was adopted. Ed Miller reported on a brochure advertising the city and area and Morris Clemmons, Jr., reported that a new dude ranch was being built near Warren.

The descendants of Warren and Jane Phillips will have the family reunion Sunday at the C. V. Phillips lake.

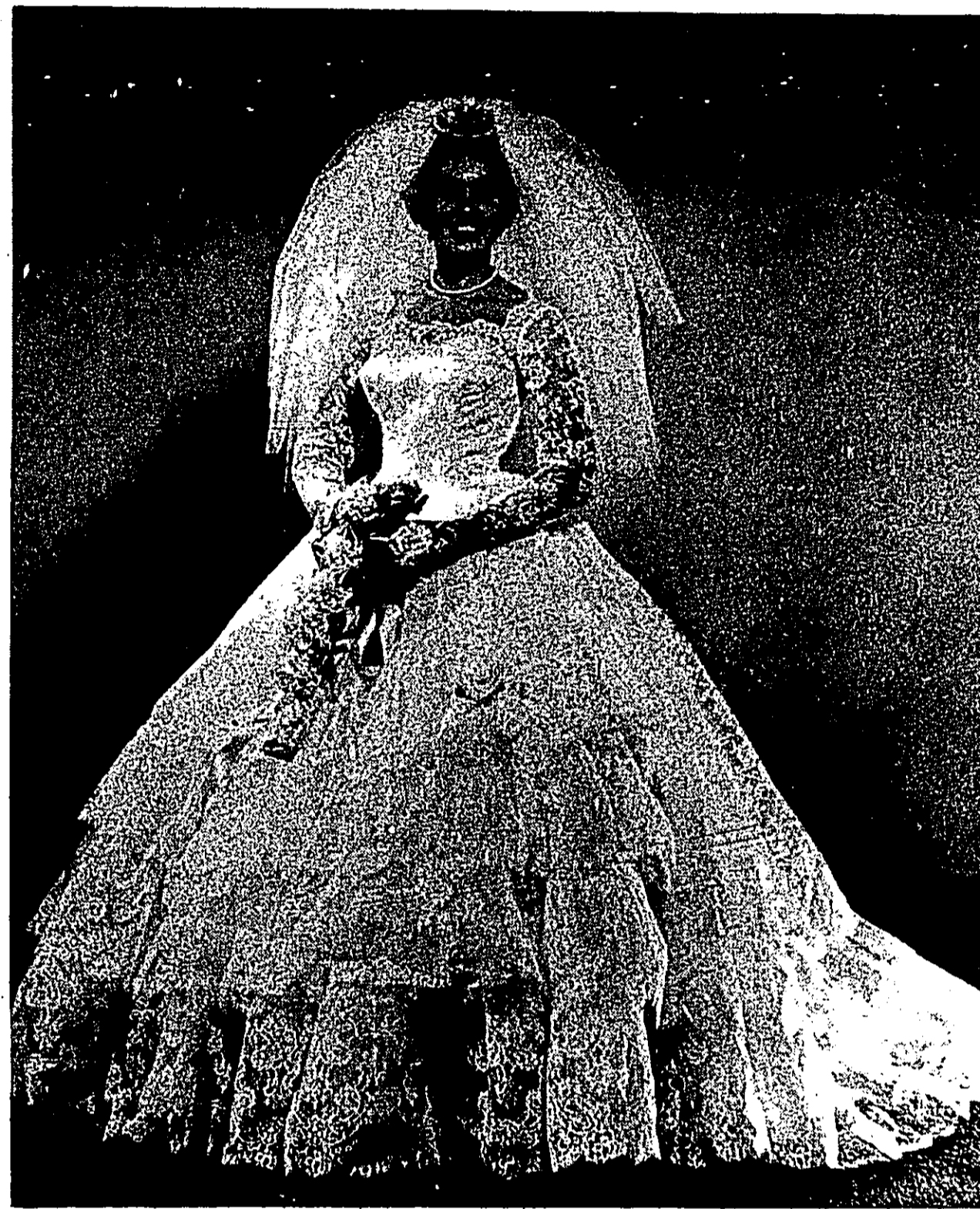

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Sugar Substitutes Given by County Agent

The sudden advance in price of sugar has forced the housewife to look around for substitutes for cane sugar to use in baking, canning and freezing.

Mrs. Maurine Mooney, county home demonstration agent, offers housewives a conversion table in substituting other sweets for cane sugar. Her hints:

For one cup of sugar in baking use:

Honey: One cup honey and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup honey used. To insure a quality product, about one-half of the sugar should be retained in a recipe and honey substituted for the other half.

In baking, use 1/4 teaspoon of soda for each cup of honey used, this in addition to baking powder in recipe when honey is substituted for sugar.

Molasses and sorghum: one and one half cups molasses or sorghum, reduce liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of molasses and sorghum used.

Corn syrup: one and one-half cups of cane syrup is equal in sweetness to one cup of cane sugar. In cakes and cookies, replace sugar with syrup measure for measure and reduce liquid one-third. Cakes and cookies made with corn and cane syrups are not as sweet as when sugar is used.

Canning fruit with corn syrup or honey. Fruits will have a better flavor, texture and color when canned in syrup, but they keep as well without sugar as with it. The final product will be slightly different when using corn syrup. The liquid in the jars will be slightly stickier. Corn syrup is especially good for canning pineapple and peaches.

Syrups Made with Honey and Sugar: Thin syrup, use 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup honey to 2-1/2 cups water; For medium syrup, use 1 cup sugar and 1 cup honey to 4 cups water. Method: Bring water and sugar to boiling, add honey, stir and return to boiling.

Syrups Made with Corn Syrup and sugar: Use 1 cup sugar, 2 cups corn syrup and 6 cups water. If corn syrup is to replace all the sugar, use 3/4 cup syrup to 1 cup water.

Preserves, Jams, Jellies

Jelly: One-fourth of the sugar required for making jelly may be replaced by corn syrup.

Preserves: One-half of the sugar required for making preserves may be replaced by corn syrup.

Jams: one-fourth of the sugar required for making jam may be replaced with corn syrup.

Honey may replace up to one-half the sugar in jams and preserves.

Freezing Fruits with Corn Syrup: Use 1-1/8 cups corn syrup to 3-1/2 pounds of fruit. Treat for discoloration.

Canning Fruit with Non-Caloric Sweetener (not saccharin): In home canning procedures, you use the non-caloric sweetener in

much the same way you would use sugar, adding it during the preparation for processing. Either the liquid or tablet form may be used for this purpose.

Fruit put up with non-caloric sweeteners will taste sweet, but since it provides only the sweetness and not the bulk or other properties of sugar, the fruit will not have the heavy syrup characteristics of fruit put up with sugar.

Allow 3/4 to 1 cup liquid for every 2 pints (or 1 quart) of fruit. Sweeten according to the table below, depending on personal taste preference and the natural sweetness of the fruit.

For each cup of liquid, use:
For moderate sweetening: 12 to 16 tablets, or 1-1/2 to 2 teaspoons solution.

For tart fruit or greater sweetening: 20 to 24 tablets, or 2-1/2 teaspoons solution.

If tablets are used, always be sure they are completely dissolved.

RECREATION POSSIBILITIES

A preliminary study of selected on-farm recreational enterprises in East Texas Economic Area XIII indicates that farm-operated facilities have considerable potential but that development of this type of operation is just beginning.

This area includes Angelina, Hardin, Montgomery, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Trinity, Tyler and Walk counties.

Outdoor recreation activities of various types had a steady increase in demand in the U. S. during the past decade. Such factors as increased income and more leisure time caused many Americans to turn to the outdoors for recreation.

One of the problems has been to provide recreation close enough for weekend users. According to the 1960 census, population of the counties contiguous to Economic Area XIII increased approximately 40%. The total population of this adjoining area is nearly 2 million.

With available resources providing large quantities of relatively inexpensive recreation, and being located near large population centers, this area has the potential of becoming a major center for outdoor recreation in Texas.
