

Postmasters Announce ZIP Code Numbers for Area Mail

Tyler County postmasters this week announced the five digit ZIP Code numbers which the post office department will use beginning July 1 to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of missent mail.

The ZIP Code number will be added to the address to enable the post office department to short-cut repeated address reading. With ZIP Code the clerk needs only to glance at the number to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined.

Since the address on mail may be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, the use of the ZIP Code number can cut up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

The ZIP Code number for Woodville is 75979, Postmaster H. M. Durham said, and everyone in Woodville will add the ZIP number after Woodville, Texas on their return addresses. In answering mail, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used,


